# **Course Goals or Overview:**

This course meets the requirements of the university core curriculum and its overarching purpose is to utilize a theoretical framework to examine the design of American federal, state, and local governments and the extent to which each fulfills its purpose. The course will systematically study institutions and processes by learning who the players are, and their respective roles. The course will also (1) increase awareness of a number of contemporary issues in American federal and Texas politics in order to illustrate how public officials and citizens address those issues, (2) learn how government decisions have farreaching effects in our everyday lives, and (3) highlight linkages so that we are familiar with the multiple access points from which we as citizens *can* affect government.

	and civically engaged through enhanced knowledge of local and global governments and issues, and			
	through various culture-based approaches underlying government institutions and policy.			
9	The course promotes personal responsibility through discussions of ethical problems and reasoning in the			
	public sphere.			
10	Taken together, these general education objectives are designed to achieve the ultimate goal of the			
	university, to provide skills and a conceptual foundation that allows graduates to continue learning long			
	after leaving the university.			

# **Course Requirements and Due Dates**

The course uses an online format. The course begins on July 11, 2016 and ends on August 12, 2016.

Since this course is web-based, you will complete all course work from your home (or anywhere else) as long as you have an Internet connection, and are able to master the features of the university's online course management system, **BlackBoard**, and Cengage's the **MindTap** program.

It is each student's responsibility to submit all the assignments/quizzes properly, accurately, and on time.

Being a 5-week summer session, the pace of this course will be intense. Each week, you will need to read and finish the assigned readings and assignments/quizzes for that week. Access to the assigned readings and assignments/quizzes will be given on the day that the previous set of assignments are due.

<u>Purchase the access codes before the beginning of the course since the first set of assignments/quizzes that include two chapters are due within 5 days of the beginning of the course.</u>

If you do not submit all the required assignments by the due date, you will not be able to complete that week's readings and assignments/quizzes. They will not be reopened except for documented medical or work related reasons, with prior approval. See the syllabus for the dues date for the readings and assignments.

You also will need to participate in two discussion sessions as outlined later in the syllabus.

Please note that this course includes <u>FIRM</u> deadlines scheduled throughout the course dates. You will be required to adhere to a weekly schedule that includes readings, activities, assignments, and class discussions. Please review the syllabus and *pay careful attention to deadlines*. <u>Due to the nature of this course, deadlines will not be extended except for documented medical or work related reasons, so please do not ask for an extension</u>. If you miss an assignment or activity, work very hard to earn the maximum number of points on all subsequent activities. Extra credit is not available in this course.

One word or one sentence answers will not suffice. You will receive a zero for those types of answers. A sound answer should address the issue and should contain at least 3 or 4 sentences. The rubric listed in the discussion session below will be used to sore your answers.

#### **Discussion Sessions**

Each student will be required to post to (2) different discussion board postings during the semester. The discussion board topics will correspond with information from the appropriate chapters. Each student will be required to post to the discussion question asked. **Postings will be graded according to the Critical Thinking Value and Written Communication Value in each posting.** The (2) discussion board postings will count up to (15) points each, for a total of 30 points toward a student's final grade. A completion date will be posted on each discussion question located inside the Discussion Board link.

Only thorough responses will earn participation points. Your responses must be thoughtful and either expand on another student's ideas or discuss why you agree or disagree with some points of the discussion. Only posts in the

Discussion Board will count towards your class participation score. Any other posts will not earn credit

The purpose of the discussion board is to exchange ideas with other students. That being the case, submitting All your posts on the same date only defeats the purpose of the assignment. Consequently, I will not give any points on the discussion assignment if all your posts on the same date.

<u>Discussion Session Grading:</u> Discussion board activities and any other grading activities will be graded within 48 hours after the closing of each unit. Instructor will also respond to student Blackboard questions within 24 hours of student posting in the Blackboard's messaging tool.
