<b>Course Goals or Overview:</b>			
	This course introduces students to basic research methods commonly employed to answer questions about social life. Students will be exposed to the theoretical principles of scientific research and subsequently examine how these principles are reflected in various methods or techniques of conducting quantitative social research. However, the overriding focus in this course will be to develop students' critical thinking and analysis skills.

8	critically assess empirical research of others.
9	Be able to use technology and computational skills to use SPSS or Excel to evaluate basic research and data relevant to a social issue.
10	identify the critical ethical issues in research such as confidentiality, informed consent, and minimization of risk to subjects.
11	Be aware of various professional codes of research such as the code of ethics from the American Sociological Association.

## Course Evaluation Methods

This course will utilize the following instruments to determine student grades and proficiency of the learning outcomes for the course.

**Exams:** There will be a total of three exams worth 50 points each. Exams cover material from the texts, assigned readings, lectures, and class discussions and will typically consist of multiple choice, short answer, and/or essay questions.

**Survey construction:** Students will be required to construct and turn in a written questionnaire.

**Module Lessons:** All students will be required to complete weekly module assignments, consisting of PowerPoint Lecture, video reviewing, discussion boards, and assessment (quiz).

**Final Exam:** All students will be required to complete the semester final exam. The final will be selectively comprehensive, meaning some previous chapters will appear on the final exam.
