

Course Goals or Overview:

The goal of this course is to introduce psychology as a scientific discipline and a profession. Emphasis will be placed on the diverse theoretical approaches within psychology and applications of these theories. We will broadly cover many core areas in psychology in academia and the real world including the historical basis of psychology, psychological research methods, memory and learning, sensation and perception, mind and consciousness, personality, social psychology, psychological disorders and treatments, health psychology,

and human development. By the end of the course, students should be familiar with the basic methodologies and theories of the topics presented in class and be expected to apply critical thinking and effective communication, both written and verbal.

Student Learning Objectives/Outcomes: At the end of this course, the student will:

- 1 Be able to demonstrate effective writing for different purposes, exhibit effective presentation skills for different purposes, and interact effectively with others.
- 2 Be able to use scientific reasoning to interpret psychological phenomena, engage in innovative and integrative thinking and problem solving, and interpret, design, and conduct basic psychological research.
- 3 Be able to apply ethical standards to psychological science and practice and adopt values that build community as local, national, and global levels.
- 4 Be able to describe key concepts, principles, and overarching themes in psychology, and will be able to describe applications of psychology.
- 5 Be able to apply psychological content and skills to career goals, exhibit strong teamwork capacity, and develop meaningful professional direction for life after graduation.

Course Evaluation Methods

This course will utilize the following instruments to determine student grades and proficiency of the learning outcomes for the course.

EXAMS (4 at 100 points each)

There will be four exams during the semester for this course, including the final exam. They will be worth 100 points each. The final exam will NOT be cumulative and will only cover material in the last two chapters and material discussed in class after the fourth exam. Each exam will consist of 50 multiple choice questions worth 2 points each. Anything discussed in the text or in class is fair game for testing purposes. Please be sure to bring a scantron (882-E) and pencil on test days.

STRESS JOURNAL (50 points)

During the health psychology chapter, we will be discussing stress and its effects of both physical and psychological well-being. Prior to that chapter, you are asked to keep a stress journal for a week. For that journal, you are asked to record your stress levels twice a day, the causes of said stress levels (or lack thereof), and what coping techniques you utilized to manage your stress. I will provide a template during this semester in preparation for this assignment.

END OF COURSE PAPER (50 points)

At the end of the semester, you will be required to submit an end of course paper. This assignment is a reflection of sorts and must be at least 2 pages in length. To complete this writing assignment, please reflect over the chapters we have covered. Select one chapter that you found interesting and explain why this chapter was important to you. How can you apply the information covered here in your personal and professional life? Then, please write in-depth on at least 3 concepts covered within the chapter. Please use 12-point text and 1-inch margins. While additional references are not required, please include in-text citations and a reference sheet in APA format if you decide to use any sources beyond the textbook.
