<u>Discussion Posts:</u> - throughout the semester, students will respond to the prompt provided under the 'discussion board' section on blackboard. These posts will include a variety of topics and materials asking students to bring to bear their own unique perspectives and understandings of the course material. Sometimes supplemental materials will be provided for students to read or listen to. The posts will asks students to respond thoughtfully demonstrating conceptual and applied understanding of the material. Students will post their own original content and also respond to at least two other students' posts to engender a conversation about the topics. Your reply must be respectful and courteous to the other students and inappropriate and/or offensive replies will not be tolerated. Please see the student handbook for more details.

Your discussion post will be graded on completeness (answering all components, replying to two other posts), accurate and correct responses (including being on topic, correctly identifying examples, etc), and thoroughness (thoroughly taking up the question, providing a thorough response). See the guidelines for the discussion posts under Course Information on Blackboard.

<u>Quizzes:</u> - students will complete the chapter quizzes for the assigned chapters as indicated on the outline above. For each assigned chapter, complete the online quiz (available on blackboard). These quizzes are an opportunity

to review your understanding of the material read in the chapters. Review the questions you missed to not only study and prepare for the exam, but also to go back and re-read these sections in the chapter.

Exams: - there will be 4 online tests throughout the semester as noted on the course outline above designed to measure knowledge of presented course material. These exams will over the assigned chapters in the textbook, the assigned videos and links, as well as the material presented in the lectures. The exams will contain multiple choice, matching, true/false, and/or short answer responses. No make-up exams will be given and exams turned in after the due date will not be accepted.
