Course Evaluation Methods

This course will utilize the following instruments to determine student grades and proficiency of the learning outcomes for the course.

Discussion Posts

There will be required discussion posts for each week in the semester. Students are required to post an initial post to the question(s) for the unit (by Thursday midnight) and post a response to a classmate (by Sunday midnight) within the assigned weekly unit. Weekly discussion posts will be graded on a 100-point scale with the total discussion grade comprising 30% of the final grade. Late discussion posts are not accepted due to the nature of online classes.

Quizzes

There will be a total of 5 quizzes worth 10 points each. Quizzes cover the reading material from the textbook, assigned readings, activities, and lecture, and will typically consist of multiple choice questions. Quizzes will allow three attempts to improve your grade. These are open book without a time limit and are designed to help you study for your exams. Total quiz grade will comprise 10% of your final grade. Quizzes are due by the close of the unit they are assigned (by Sunday midnight). No late quizzes allowed as they are open for an entire week.

Exams

There will be a total of two exams worth 100 points each (each exam is worth 15% of your final grade). Exams cover material from the texts, assigned readings, lectures, and class discussions, and will typically consist of multiple choice, short answer, and/or essay questions.

<u>Paper</u>

Students will write a paper from a list of topics that will be provided in the Blackboard classroom. Papers are required to be written in APA format with a minimum of 5 scholarly references (websites will not count but can be used if scholarly, no sites like Wikipedia). Paper should be 4-5 pages in length not including

title, table of contents, or reference page. Due dates are on the schedule. Paper will be accepted early, no late papers accepted.

Powerpoint Project

Project: Students will work in groups presenting a case study on a Serial Killer. The project will consist of a powerpoint presentation that will be posted to the class at the end of the semester. The project is required for all students. Detailed information is located in the project section of the courseroom. There will be 3 parts to the project: Serial Killer Choice, Draft, and Final PPT.
