Course Evaluation Methods

This course will utilize the following instruments to determine student grades and proficiency of the learning outcomes for the course.

This course will utilize the following instruments to determine student grades and proficiency of the learning outcomes for the course. Grades will be based on **four out of five tests and a project grade**. Instructor will drop your lowest **test** score. The tests will consist of approximately 30 multiple choice questions with each question counting 2 points, there may also be tables, graphs, or drawings for students to label as well as short answer, short essay, and matching. The final exam will be a comprehensive exam. **There will be no make-up exams unless excused by the University.** If you miss an exam, that exam will be your one exam that is dropped. **Students must have at least 450** points to opt out of the final exam. Overall grades will be based on the amount of points you have accumulated divided by the total amount of points offered for the semester. Each exam is worth 100 points; project is worth 100 points.

Project: Students will work in groups on a Public Health Service presentation related to stress and health topics. The presentation will be a powerpoint presentation that will be presented to the class at the end of the semester. The project is required for all students. Detailed information will be given during the semester along with a rubric for the project.
