Course (Goals or Overview:
	Overview: This course will examine the fundamentals of positive psychology, with emphases on the development of strengths and virtues, positive emotion, positive cognition, prosocial behavior, positive interventions, and positive environments. Students will gain an understanding of the field of positive psychology, which is the study of optimal human functioning, including individual strengths and values, such as optimism, resilience and courage. We will also explore subtopics, such as life meaning, religion/spirituality, career development, and positive psychology interventions. Students will gain an understanding of scientific research relating to different dimensions of happiness and subjective well-being, and will be able to implement positive psychology based concepts in their everyday life.

1	Understand history, aims, and scope of positive psychology.
2	Understand the major areas within positive psychology that have received a considerable amount of attention in the literature.
3	Understand the what kinds of experiences fulfill people, what human characteristics lead to personal effectiveness, and what social conditions appear to elicit these qualities and experiences.
4	Assess and evaluate their own well-being, strengths, and limitations.
5	Apply positive psychology to important domains in their own lives and the lives of others with whom they interact.

Course Evaluation Methods

This course will utilize the following instruments to determine student grades and proficiency of the learning outcomes for the course. Your individual grade for each assignment will be provided via Blackboard. Please feel free to contact me should you have any questions or if you are having difficulty understanding the course material or requirements.

Introductions

In the first week of class you will be asked to provide a personal biography. In an online setting it is important that we get to know and welcome one another early in the course, since the course will rely heavily on discussions with peers. Please see Blackboard for instructions.

Discussion Board Questions

At the beginning of the week, questions will be posted to the discussion board to which you will offer a thoughtful response. Each question will relate to the topics being covered in the readings and other material for that particular week and will require critical thinking and/or application of the course material. You must answer all the questions posted for the week.

Discussion Board Participation

In addition to responding to the questions, there is an expectation that you will also respond to the posts of *at least* two of your classmates. The responses to your classmates must be thoughtful, and ones that relate what you have learned to their post. Simple statements of agreement or "wow, that is interesting" will not count. You are encouraged to respond to more than the minimum required peer replies. Students will NOT be able to make up participation points once the week has ended.

Weekly Assignments

Each week you will be asked to complete a small activity related to the topic discussed. The purpose of these activities is to apply the information learned in class and to gain a deeper understanding of the material. You will be asked to submit written responses about these activities. See Blackboard for specifics of each activity.

Weekly Quizzes

Instead of traditional Exams, students will comple weekly quizzes during the semester. The quizzes will be made up of multiple choice questions and focus on the material learned in the course each week. All quizzes will be administered on Blackboard. You will have a 48 hour period to take each quiz. You must log on to Blackboard during that time in order to take the quiz. Please do not leave the quizzes to the last minute as Blackboard may have downtimes. You will not be allowed extra time to take the quiz if you have problems logging on at the end of the period.

Make-Up Assignments

No make-up activities are allowed without proper documentation (e.g., doctor's note, automobile accident report, funeral announcement, etc.). Additionally, make-ups will not be allowed until your documentation has been verified, which means that documentation must provide a contact

name and number. Computer problems, like crashes or lost/corrupted files, are not acceptable emergencies. Be sure to make back-up files of your work. Legitimate make-up work will only be allowed within one week of the missed assignment. If arrangements are not made in a timely manner, I will need documentation (e.g., hospital notice, etc.) explaining the delay. Otherwise, make-ups will not be allowed beyond one week. Since participation must involve classmates, missed participation cannot be made up once a week has ended.
