

Chafee crushes previously unbeaten Lake Erie

Quarterback Operations 2ndSpecialist Class Solomon Pulu played catch Ship's receiver Serviceman 3rd Class Dontavius Wright to the tune of five touchdown as USS Chafee (DDG 90) manhandled formerly undefeated USS Lake Erie (CG 70), 35-7, in a battle of Intramural Afloat Flag Football League top guns at Ward Field, Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam, on Nov. 6.

With the win, Chafee leapfrogged over Lake Erie into second place with a 5-1 record, and trails only the 6-0 USS Chosin (CG 65), who defeated USS Port Royal (CG 73), 25-6, in its game on Nov.6.

"Everybody knows about us now," said Chafee coach Personnel Specialist 1st Class Brian Harper after the team's mercy-rule victory over Lake Erie. "Thirtyfive to seven over an undefeated team? It doesn't get any better than that."

In the surprising rout, Chafee dominated the action on both sides of the ball as the team's option kept the ball moving on offense, while its defense produced four interceptions to handcuff Lake Erie's usually potent attack.

After an option to Operations Specialist 1st Class Phillip John put the ball at the 18, Pulu connected with Wright for the first of the pair's five touchdowns to take a 6-0 lead.

On the ensuing series, Lake Erie stepped up to the challenge as Day led the team on a seven-play, 65-yard drive that ended with the signal caller tossing a 22-yard pass for a also go on to pick off a touchdown to Information Systems Technician 1st Class Gennarro Hawkins.

Although the converted extra point gave Lake Erie a 7-6 advantage, the rest of the game belonged to

Pulu immediately put his eam back on top with a 65yard drive that took only five plays to reach the end

This time Pulu zeroed in on Wright on a catch-andrun play that covered 31 yards to give the Chafee a 12-7 lead.

Day tried to help Lake Erie regain the upper hand

by leading a drive to the Chafee 22, but instead, turned the ball over when Pulu pulled down the team's second interception of the game.

Then as time ticked down in the first half, Pulu marched Chafee down to the Lake Erie 11.

After misfiring on his first three passes, Pulu, on fourth down, forced in a throw to the goal line, but had the ball batted up into the air.

Standing in the middle of the pack, Wright jumped up and snatched the ball away from Lake Erie defenders, before breaking the plain to give Chafee a 19-7 lead at intermission.

"That was a big turning point," Harper said. "We wanted that touchdown. Wright came through. He went in there with his big, long body,

then caught it over everybody. That was the dagger in their (Lake Erie) heart. In the

s e c o n d half, Lake Erie tried its best to get back into the game, but each time the team threatened, defense out a stop.

On Lake drive after halftime, Chafee Chief Ship's Serviceman Corey Lathan got the ball back for his team when he stepped in front of a Day pass and picked it off.

Lathan would pass from Hawkins, who took over QB duties from Day later in the

While Chafee's defense was taking care of business on its side of the ball, Pulu and Wright continued its assault on the Lake Erie secondary in the second half.

Pulu hooked up with Wright for two 16-yard scoring strikes to round out the tandem's outstanding effort and game.

"We had mismatches and the quarterback just kept finding me in the right spot," said Wright about his quintet of catch-

es for touchdowns. "This was a big game for us because they beat us last year and I thought we should have won. I just wanted to make sure we took care of business."

Although Lake Erie suffered its worst defeat in two

years, Day, who offered his congratulations to Chafee, remained optimistic and promised that Lake Erie would be back.

"I don't take anything away from the Chafee," Day said. "But it's not a setback. We still feel like we're the best team and we're still going to be pushing forward.'

Meanwhile, both Wright and Harper agreed that while Lake Erie may downplay the loss, no one could deny the lopsided win should send a clear mes-

sage throughout the rest of the league.

"We got a little swagger going right now, so it feels real good," Harper said. "We know that we can go in there and dominate any team, and that's what we're going to do the rest of the way."

Bold comeback leads Security over 15th MXG

When it comes to flag football, 647th Security Forces Squadron (647 SFS) Senior Airman Kyle Shy's aggressive style of play is the antithesis of his birth

On Nov. 8, Shy's bold and leave-nothing-on-the-field attitude may have tipped the scales in favor of the 647, as the team went on to earn a tough 20-18 win over the 15th Maintenance Group (15 MXG) in a Hickam Intramural Flag Football League game at Hickam Football Field, Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam.

In helping the 647 to victory, Shy picked off a pass in the red zone, caught two passes for touchdowns (including the game winner), and made the gameending tackle that sealed the win for his team.

"They were a tough team, but we just had to come out and get it," Shy said. "I really wanted that one."

Shy's effort minimized a monster game by 15 MXG Airman 1st Class Aaron Maxwell, who came up with three interceptions and was on the receiving end of a 65yard catch-and-run for a touchdown that put the 15th up by five points with just over two minutes remaining on the clock.

"We just couldn't execute on offense," Maxwell stated. "We had the plays there, but just couldn't make it when we needed to make

Although both teams got off to a slow start, things changed in a hurry when Maxwell stole his second pass of the game with the 647th knocking at the door Maintenance Group's three-yard line.

After the touchback placed the ball at the 15th's own 20, quarterback Senior Airman Even Wilson led the team on a five-play, 65yard drive that ended on a 28-yard scoring strike to Staff Sgt. Ricardo Goodwyn to take a 6-0 lead.

6 as he marched the team 65 yards, before connecting with a wide open Airman 1st Class Tyran Autman on a 41-yard scoring toss.

The 15th quickly drove down to the 647's 14 and almost re-took the lead before halftime, but Shy stepped up and picked off a Wilson pass to end the threat.

Following intermission, another interception by Maxwell setup Maintenance Group's second touchdown of the game, With time running out in but Wooderson quickly put the 647 back on top by fashback Tech. However, on the 15th's first play from scrimmage at its own 15-yard line, Wilson hit Maxwell on a short cross pattern down the middle.

Somehow, Maxwell spun out of coverage with his flags still attached and sped downfield for a 65-yard touchdown to put his team ahead at 18-13.

The play left Maxwell out of breath, which forced him to sit out, as the 15th's defense took the field to try and stop the 647 from retaking the lead.

"I just had to get a feet barely inbounds.

> On second down, with the ball resting on the 15th's eight-yard line, Wooderson shook off two receivers before spotting Shy breaking to the right corner of the

end zone. Wooderson let loose of the ball in Shy's direction, who stretched out to nab the pass in midair, before touching down with both

"He made something happen. All I did was throw it up," said Wooderson as he replayed the game-winning catch. "I was kind of thinking either throw it away or they're going to get an interception. I didn't think he (Shy) was going to jump that high.'

Shy said that, with the team down by a score, he knew that he had to make the catch.

"I just saw the chalk and ran over there," Shy explained. I thought it was going to be a zip, but he (Wooderson) lofted it up and I had to go up and get it. I saw it coming, I caught it and kept it in."

The 15th had one final attempt to retake the lead, but on fourth down and 10 yards to go for a first, Shy came up with another big play, as he yanked the flag off of Wilson two yards short of the first down.

A relieved Wooderson credited the play of his teammates for the nail-biting win and added that there is more to come from the 647 this season.

"We're definitely the top seed, but I don't want anybody to even pay attention to the cops," Wooderson noted. "Just wait until the playoff and we'll show you a

Help environment on America Recycles Day



Want to help the environment?

You can - by spending some time this America Recycles Day on Nov. 15 learning about the existing opportunities to reduce, reuse and recycle (RRR) throughout $_{
m the}$ year. Adopting good recycling habits at home, work and on the go will help preserve our environment for future generations. Using RRR as a guiding principle, people can save energy, use fewer natural resources, and reduce greenhouse emissions.

Thousands of Americans across the country are making a difference, simply by keeping plastic bottles, paper, unwanted electronics and other recyclable materials out of the waste stream. According to the EPA's Individual Waste Reduction Model (iWARM), the lifecycle energy savings of recycling rather than landfilling one aluminum can is equivalent to the energy use of a laptop for five hours, a 60watt incandescent light bulb for four hours, or a 60watt compact fluorescent



light bulb for 20 hours.

America Recycles Day is a time to think about your role in creating a sustainable environment by being responsible consumers. Products are created from raw materials that are transported and processed, distributed, consumed, reused or recycled, and ultimately disposed of in a landfill. Each stage of this matelifecycle impacts on the environment. By making smarter choices, consuming less, and reusing and recycling, each of us can contribute to a healthier and more sustainable environment.

The Commander Navy Region Hawaii Recycling Program accepts cardboard, paper (office white, newspaper, mixed/color, magazines), aluminum, other metal, glass containers, printer cartridges, plastic containers (PETE 1 and HDPE 2) and wood pallets.

Here are two suggestions to help you do your part for America Recycles Day:

Clean out your old files today (make an appointment at 449-5754). Both recycle center locations (building 1715 on Hickam and building 159 on Pearl Harbor have large capacity, high-speed paper shredders certified for FOUO and Privacy Act material). It's much faster than shredding five sheets at a time on a small office shredder.

- Dispose of those old personal computers, cell phones and other outdated unused electronic equipment in an environmentally safe way. Check out www.ecosquid.com for information on local retail stores and charitable organizations that accept used electronic devices at no charge. Some local companies will even pay for operable used cell phones, up to \$70 for some brands. Recycle center personnel will be available to provide additional information and help on Nov. 15 at the grand opening celebration of the new Navy Exchange Fleet Store.




