KONA-KAILUA, Hawaii - U. S. military members made a strong showing at the 2010 Ironman Triathlon World Championships held in Kailua-Kona, Hawaii on Oct. 9.

The United States Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines and Coast Guard sent representatives to the annual Ironman World Championships in Hawaii to battle it out for the military division championship. The nine officially sponsored military competitors joined more than 1,800 other competitors in completing what is conhardest individual sports in the world. There were 55 countries represented across various categories including pro, age and military divisions. There were individual winners for the male and female military division as well as a team award. The Air Force team of Maj. William "Kidd" Poteet, a former Thunderbird pilot and current instructor at the Air Force Academy in Colorado, and Capt. Jamie Turner a Joint Base Charleston, S.C. C-17 Globemaster III pilot, won the team honors with a combined time of 20 hours, 27 minutes and 36 seconds. U. S. Army Capt. Robert Killian, a signal officer with 2nd Battalion, 185th Division, Colorado National Guard, finished first in the military male division with a time of nine hours, 30 minutes and 50 sec-onds, and Turner won the military female division with a time of 10 hours, 48 minutes and 31 seconds . Joining Poteet, Killian and Turner in the competition were U.S. Army Capt. Erica Chabalko of Baylor University, Texas; U.S. Navy Capt. Scott Jones of Port Hueneme, Calif. and Cmdr. Kristin Barnes of Virginia Beach, Va.; U.S. Coast Guard Command Master Chief Michael Ferreira of 14th closer to your goal," Beckman District, Hawaii; Lt. "There's nothing like being able to come out here and do well and represent the Air Force at the same time," Turner said.

Hail Mary lifts Lake Erie past Port Royal

USS Lake Erie (CG 70) scored on a last-second 30yard touchdown pass, before converting the extra point to pull off a stunning comefrom-behind victory over the previously undefeated USS Port Royal (CG 73), 27-26, in an Intramural Afloat Flag Football League game at Ward Field, Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam, on Oct. 9.

The win raised Lake Erie's league record to 2-0, while Port Royal's mark now stands at 2-1.

Lake Erie began its improbable comeback with only a minute remaining in the game after Port Royal seemed to have put the game away by scoring the goahead touchdown on a fouryard pass from quarterback Electronics Technician 3rd Class Collin Vidal to Information Systems 2nd Class Technician Marshall Williams on a seven-play drive that covered 65 vards.

Starting with the ball resting on its own 15, Lake Erie quarterback Chief Operations Specialist Lateef Day connected on three straight passes to place the ball on the Port Royal 25, before being sacked for a five-yard loss.

With time running out, Day handed over the reins to playmaker Information Systems Technician 1st Class Gennaro Hawkins.

On second down at the Port Royal 30, Hawkins escaped a heavy pass rush before hoisting a spiral toward the end zone where Boatswain's Mate Seaman Devlin Dones set up behind a wall of defenders. At the last second, Dones timed the pass perfectly and stretched up above the Port Royal secondary to make the game-tying grab.

"They just called trips right and told everybody to go deep," said Dones about his touchdown. "I had a lot of energy left, so I ran as fast as I could. I saw the ball in the air; I snatched it and came down with it for the TD. It felt good."

Hawkins then ran in the point-after-touchdown attempt as the game-ending whistle sounded to secure Lake Erie's second victory in a row.

Hawkins said that even with time running out, he still felt that the team had a chance to walk off the field with the win.

"We have faith in ourselves that we can drive it down," Hawkins said. "We wanted to throw the Hail Mary, but after having to scramble, I saw him (Dones) break down towards the left. I threw the ball and he snagged it."

Although Vidal said that he was disappointed in the final outcome, he wasn't surprised about the way Lake Erie responded after falling behind late in the game.

Once he saw Hawkins' pass sail past the outreached fingertips of his defenders, Vidal said he knew that his team was in trouble.

"As soon as I saw our guys jump, I knew they were jumping early," Vidal said. "I saw it all unfold and I just started walking over to the other side to shake their hands."

The game ended on a fitting note as the teams exchanged leads six times throughout the contest.

Port Royal scored first on a 20-yard toss from Vidal to Sonar Technician (Surface) Seaman Joseph Gilmore, but the lead was short-lived as Lake Erie would go ahead on a 10-yard pass from Day to Fire Controlman 2nd Class Chris Robinson, which was followed by a two-point conversion after the touchdown.

Port Royal went back out on top at 12-8 on a 32-yard catch-and-run for a touchdown from Vidal to Ensign Greg Shinego, but back came Lake Erie as Day connected with Gas Turbine System (Mechanical) Seaman Brandon Reed on a 21-yard pass play that sent the CG 70 Sailors into halftime with a 14-12 advantage.

Following the break, Shinego picked off Hawkins on Lake Erie's second play from scrimmage to set up Port Royal in good field position at its opponent's 39-yard line.

Four plays later, Vidal hooked up with Sonar Technician (Surface) Seaman Michael Larzarz for a 15-yard scoring strike, before coming up with a twopoint conversion to take a 20-14 lead.

Lake Erie would tie the score at 20-20 on a 17-yard pass play from Day to Reed, before Port Royal's final touchdown led to Lake Erie's dramatic comeback.

While Hawkins said that he wasn't surprised at the way Port Royal battled throughout the game, he indicated that the outcome might not have been as close if one of Lake Erie's key defensive players hadn't been ejected after the first play of the game.

Lake Erie defensive linemen Damage Controlman Fireman Daniel Mancine, who along with Information Systems Technician 2nd Class Dan Drury form one of

Inter-service rivalry: Air Force claims Ironman military division

KAILUA-KONA, Hawaii -- A pair of Air Force pilots pushed the envelope of mental and physical toughness to claim the 2010 Ironman World Championships Kona Military Division on a 140.6-mile grueling course, held Oct. 9 at Kailua-Kona, Hawaii.

Maj. Scott Poteet and Capt. Jamie Turner combined for a 20:27:36 time to claim this year's top honors for the armed forces. Poteet, U.S. Air Force Academy Cadet Squadron 02, Colo., finished the course in a few ticks over nine-and-a-half hours at 9:39:05, placing second to the U.S. Army's Robert Killian at 9:30:50. The Airmen are part of a special group at the mecca of triathlons. There were a total of nine individuals hand-picked from each of the services, including the Coast Guard, who take physical fitness and mental toughness to new lengths – all 140.6 miles to be exact. They started their day with a 2.4-mile swim in the choppy saltwater of Kona Bay. They climbed from its depths to begin a ride 112-mile bike through the heat-emitting lava fields along the Kona and Kohala coastlines. The marathon of 26.2 miles spanned the same path as the bike ride, the Ka'ahumanu Queen Highway. "This is a very unforgiving environment, especially once you get out on the highway - There's no hiding from the elements," Poteet said. "One of the biggest challenges is the sun and unforgiving heat radiating off the lava fields." These nine military competitors, five males and four females, were selected from their ranks to represent the U.S. Armed Forces in the 2010 World Ironman Championships, a race dubbed ke alahele o ke koa, a Hawaiian saying meaning "The Way of the Warrior.' 'I think Ironman is one of the greatest displays of what the armed forces is about," said Navy Capt. Jones, Scott Hueneme, Calif., who cheered for their service. posted a time of 9:46:00. "It's about discipline. It's about being extraordinary when called upon to be extraordinary.
