Chosin shows Chicago no mercy

USS Chosin (GC 65) scored on their opening drive, while the defense recorded five interceptions and returned three for touchdowns in gaining a mercy-rule victory over USS Chicago (SSN 721), 33-0, during an Afloat Flag Football League game at Ward Field, Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam, on Sept. 25.

According to Chosin coach, Information Systems Technician 2nd Class Joe McGill, the win represented more than two months of hard work in which the team honed its skills for the tough schedule ahead.

"We knew it was coming up," McGill said. "So we came out here to run different plays and try to be versatile."

The long months of practice seemed to have paid off as Chosin took advantage of every opportunity in gaining the lopsided win over Chicago.

Chosin opened the game by moving the ball 65 yards on eight plays with the final three yards coming on a scoring toss from quarterback Information Systems Technician 2nd Class Tony Reid to Fire Controlman 2nd Class Brian Jones.

On the drive, Reid said that he focused on keeping the chains moving, while maintaining control of the ball.

Although Tindle was stopped short of the goal on his first steal of the day, he would not be denied on his second pick, as he stepped in front of a pass and rambled 21 yards for the game's final touchdown.

Reid said the team's tough defensive play also contributed heavily to the way Chosin performed on offense.

While everyone on Chosin was elated to walk off Ward Field with such a convincing win in its first try, Reid cautioned that the season is long and the team still has a lot more to do.

Each of Shipyard's goals was chipped into the back of the net with little traffic surrounding the shooter.






