Kunia's victory puts team back on winning track

Army Staff Sgt. Nathan Berry knocked in three goals and recorded an assist on another score to help the league-leading Kunia Gallos earn a 5-1 win over Naval Health Clinic Hawaii (NHCH)/Lunch box in an Intramural Soccer League game at Ward Field, Joint Pearl Harbor-Base Hickam, on June 26.

The triumph increased the defending champion Gallos' league record to 12-2. while NHCH saw its mark fall to 7-5.

Berry said that Kunia's victory was an important step in the right direction after the team suffered its first loss at Ward on June 19. The Gallos' other defeat came on a forfeit.

"We lost last week because we came out lackadaisical," Berry stated. "I think the World Cup has everybody in a frenzy. We're all watching it and a lot of our guys came out tired."

At first, it appeared that Kunia was still fighting off the doldrums when NHCH got on the scoreboard first on a goal by Marine Cpl. Christopher Goecks, who booted in a shot at around the midway point of the first half.

"I drew the defense to one side and I got a nice over the top ball on the left side," Goecks said. "I made a diagonal run, trapped the ball and saw that the goalkeeper was out of the goal. So I just chipped it in."

However, from that Kunia moment on, responded by dominating the rest of the first half with Berry putting the

"A lot of these guys had gaps in the back (field) and I just wanted to try to hit those gaps and work hard when I got in those positions," Berry said. "Once I get behind them, they're not going to catch up."

Berry also said the defensive scheme of NHCH gave Kunia room to attack and keep moving forward.

"They (NHCH) kind of sat back, which gave us the ability to hold the ball in their half and keep pressing," Berry pointed out.

Kunia's final goal came on a pass from Cryptologic Technician (Collection) 2nd Class Douglas MacLean to Cryptologic Technician (Interpretive) 2nd Class Allen Noel, who finished off a point blank header.

While Kunia's offense seemed to be running on all cylinders, the team's defense was just as dominant in shutting down NHCH for most of the game.

"They had a really good defense," Goecks acknowl-edged. "They (Gallos) pressure the ball a lot. I was under pressure constantly."

By decisively beating NHCH, Bloom said he hopes that Kunia is back on track as the team looks forward to the playoffs and defending its title.

If everybody on the team can get on the same page, Bloom said, then the Gallos should have a good shot at repeating.

"We have a lot of good players with experience,' Bloom admitted. "We played with each other for a long time and the quality of team is obviously in our favor. But we have still got quite a bit more work to do."

Federal Fire Department (FFD) Hawaii would like the public to enjoy the Independence Day holi-day and asks that people understand the dangers of fireworks. Improper use of fireworks can cause severe injuries and present a significant risk of starting fires.

According to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), thousands of people are injured nationwide while using consumer fireworks on Independence Day. The NFPA also reports that there are more fires reported nationwide on Independence Day than



any other day of the year. Half of these fires were caused by fireworks.

If you do use consumer fireworks, please review these safety tips, follow all rules, and be considerate of your neighbors. Remember, it is illegal to use

personal fireworks while on Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam or any military base or installation.

The best and safest way to enjoy fireworks is to attend one of the many professional, public displays conducted on Oahu.

The Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam is conducting a firework displays at Hickam Beach at 8 p.m. and at Pearl Harbor's Ward Field at 9 p.m. Both shows are free and open to all military and Department of Defense personnel.
