Course Evaluation Methods

This course will utilize the following instruments to determine student grades and proficiency of the learning outcomes for the course.

Post-Quizzes (50 pts. each): These activities will be completed at the ending of each week (excluding exam weeks). You have 4 attempts on each quiz. They will help you prepare for the exams during Week 4, 8, and 14.

Short Essays (50 pts. each): Each week (excluding exam weeks) you will find a Turnitin writing assignment. You must submit your assignment and review two of your peers. If you do not review two of your peers, you will lose 10 pts. for each review not done. Peers' assessments of your submission do not impact your grade on the assignment. Your submission will be evaluated by the instructor using the rubric. It is in the syllabus, in Course Information in BB Learn, and on each assignment.

Module Assessments (Short Answer: 250 pts.): There are 3 Module Assessments. They are assigned during Week 4, Week 8, and Week 14. I highly recommend that you take these exams seriously. Exams are online and closed book. Note: Be sure to read the online exam instructions. If the instructions are presented and you do something that is not allowed (i.e. hit the back button), I will not reset your exam.

Final Reflection Paper (50 pts.): The Final Reflection Paper is due the final week of class. In the Final Reflection Paper you should identify of the personally relevant themes in the readings and then integrate these themes with your online classroom experience, and finally describe how both may affect your future thinking and practice.

Extra Credit:

Sematic Maps Discussion Boards (10 pts. each): In Weeks 5 - 12 (excluding exam weeks) there is a Discussion Board, called 'Semantic Maps (DB)'. Each week you can earn 10 pts. by following the posting instructions.

No Credit: If at the end of the course you are on the border of two letter grades, these assignments will be used to determine if you have earned the higher grade.

Pre-Reading Discussion Questions: Each week there are pre-reading discussion questions.

Self-Assessments Quizzes: Each week there is a self-assessment quiz.
