
"Everything ran smoothly, according to plan, and everyone really seemed to enjoy themselves," said Josh Wendall, Keystone officer.

"Anytime we could get together and play some soccer, it's a good thing," he said. "I know that they're coming from a long deployment and you know, just for them to relax, it's a good thing.

Campos said that like the military is a worldwide fraternity, soccer is the perfect sport to build bridges between all cultures.


