70 Years of Peace commemoration to feature performances, fireworks

As part of the Nagaoka-Honolulu 70 Years of Peace commemoration, an area of Ford Island will be open to the public from 4 to 8:20 p.m. Saturday.

From 4:15 to 6:40 p.m., the event will feature on-stage entertainment. Performers will include Ryukyukoku Matsuri Daiko, U.S. Pacific Fleet Band "Big Wave," Nagaoka Aloha Club and Local Musician Mark Yamanaka.

A commemorative ceremony program with Japanese/English translation will take place from 7 to 8 p.m. The program will include welcoming remarks and the introduction of special guests by Ed Hawkins, the master of ceremonies. The U.S. Pacific Fleet Band bugler will provide evening colors at 7:02 p.m.

Rear Adm. John Fuller, commander of Navy Region Hawaii and Naval Surface Group Middle Pacific, will deliver the opening remarks.

Commemorative remarks will be offered by Mayor Kirk Caldwell of Honolulu and Mayor Tamio Mori of Nagaoka City, Japan.

The event will then feature a youth peace summit declaration by students from Honolulu and Nagaoka, choir performances by the Nagaoka Boys and Girls Choir and HEARTS Hawaii Choir, and a performance of "Jupiter" by Japanese singer/songwriter Ayaka Hirahara.

Master of ceremonies Hawkins will introduce the fireworks display, and the Nagaoka fireworks display will light up the night sky from 8 to 8:20 p.m. Accompanying music will be broadcast live on 105.1 KINE-FM.

Parking is available on a first-come, first-served basis. Pearl Harbor Visitor Center will open at 5:30 p.m. as an alternate fireworks viewing location, and Neal Blaisdell Park in Waimalu will be open until 10 p.m. as another viewing location.

Wahine Koa re-capture flag football championship

Quarterback Aubrey Kiemnec threw touchdown passes to start off the first and second half and then let her defense go to work as Wahine Koa held off a strong challenge from Khaos to earn a tough 13-6 decision and capture their second Hawaii's Finest Flag Football (HF3) women's division championship in a row.

For the season, which just closed with a full day of championship men's and women's games on Aug. 8 at Mililani Mauka Community Park, the Wahine Koa finished the regular season at the top of the division with an 8-2 record before winning back-to-back games to take their second title in a row.

Khaos ended up two games behind Wahine Koa in the regular season and then proceeded to win their semifinal matchup against the War Dawgz to set up the bracket for the championship final. The HF3 is the only flag football league on Oahu that accommodates both men's and women's teams.

The league is also well known for its vision of creating a sports organization that intermingles military family members with the islander community.

While the Wahine Koa, which first competed in the All-Military Women's Flag Football League as the Navy Sharks four years ago, has lost many of their active-duty players over the past few years, the team is still stocked full of women with direct ties to Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam as family members or spouses.

Head coach Marine Staff Sgt. Marques Nelson said that no matter who has been left to hold down the

fort, the team has one big plus on its side: it knows how to win. "The main thing is that they already had the confidence," Nelson said. "They won before and they can win again. We just had to make sure they didn't get complacent."

Not getting complacent was the least of the team's worries as Wahine Koa was ready for business from the very first snap of the ball. Up first, the defense made its presence known by stopping Khaos on

downs with linebacker Mili Polite, an Air Force spouse, coming up with a huge sack on quarterback Army Staff Sgt. Jenna Martin on fourth down to take over possession.

Then starting at the Khaos 28-yard line, Kiemnec got the ball in motion with short passes to Shardae Ingano.

On fourth down from the 10, Kiemnec made a clutch pass into the arms of Staff Sgt. April Kelley, who made the grab in the corner of the

end zone for a 6-0 lead that stood up through halftime.

Straight out of the break, Wahine Koa set up their first drive from the Khaos 29 and like their first drive in the first half, Koa struck pay dirt once again.

Kiemnec was six-for-six on passes and hit Tina "Ling-Ling" Brady, a Navy spouse, with a three-yard toss over the middle for a touchdown and 12-0 lead.

Kiemnec completed another pass to Kelley after the touchdown to convert the

point-after-touchdown and take a 13-0 advantage.

Khaos finally broke through the tough Wahine Koa defense on a score pass from Martin to Spc. Kodie Robins to cut the lead down to seven at 13-6. Things really got interesting when Martin came up with her third interception of the game and returned it to the Wahine Koa 10-yard line.

However, with time running out, Wahine Koa came up with an enormous defensive stop to seal the win.

"That was a big stop," Nelson admitted. "The main thing is that we prepared for this. We worked on our goal-line defense and we made sure to stop certain teams." Martin, who appeared more frustrated than dejected over the loss, said that the team just couldn't get over the hump.

"We just weren't catching the ball," Martin said. "We had maybe two completions the whole game. You can't score touchdowns if you don't catch the ball."

"Next season starts in September, so we're going to take a couple weeks off. We'll relax and start practicing again," Martin said. For Nelson and his team, the routine would be the same, except for one little change.

"We're going to start doing some off-season workouts," Nelson disclosed. "I think we need it, and it will

Combat Medics sweep past MidPac for first win

The 15th Medical Group (15MDG) Combat Medics put together their best game of the season and defeated Middle Pacific (MidPac) First to 25 in straight sets, 25-9 and 25-20, on Aug. 6 in a Blue Division intramural volleyball match at Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam Fitness Center.

The two-set win was the first of the season for the Combat Medics, which entered the contest in a tie for last place in the division with First to 25, with both teams starting off the game at 0-4.

"I'm super proud of how all of us played," said Combat Medics hitter Airman 1st Class Sarah Sanborn. "We all worked very hard today. We had good communication. I think that was our biggest fault in the other games. Today we just came out, worked hard and brought it home as a team."

Sanborn was a big reason

why the Combat Medics performed so well, especially in the first set.

The Medics got out to a quick 3-1 start, and then after getting a side-out to get the ball back, the team really began to take

over behind the service of Sanborn.

During her first six serves, Sanborn delivered three aces and forced three more hitting errors by First to 25 to take a dominating 10-1 lead.

Later, with Tech. Sgt. Steven Mata holding service, the team ran off another four straight points to move ahead at 18-4.

Sanborn finished up the set from behind the back line by serving up back-to-

back aces to secure the set at 25-9.

"That was huge," said Sanborn about the team's effort from service in the first set. "If we could have gotten our serves in our second game, that second game would have been just like the first."

At first, the second set did mimic the first, with Jared Taniguchi, a Department of Defense civilian, starting off from behind the line.

In five serves, Taniguchi spiked away four aces and forced a hitting error to push Combat Medics out to a 5-0 lead.

However, from that point on, First to 25 pushed the Combat Medics to the brink and even caught up with their opponent at 17-17.

With the game on the line and Combat Medics in need of a side-out, Taniguchi delivered a kill from the backline to put his team back out in front by one.

"I was just trying to get it in," Taniguchi said about the clutch side-out. "The ball was nice and high and

that's just the way I like it. Other ones were a little shorter, so I had to control it a little bit more."

The teams fought back and forth, until finally, with Combat Medics holding a 23-20 lead, the team got back-to-back kills from Sanborn and Staff Sgt. Megan Pinero to seal the win.

Sanborn said that getting close to their first win may have caused some butterflies, which allowed First to 25 to come back in the second set.

"I think we got excited and we lost focus for a little while," Sanborn said. "But we regrouped in the end and came back together as a team."

After putting away First to 25 for their first win, Sanborn said that she believes the Combat Medics are now prepared and ready to take the next step up the ladder.

"I hope so," she said. "Now we're kind of getting consistently the same people showing up to practice and games. And that really helps."

HIANG dismantles tough DISA-PAC in straight sets

The Hawaii Air National Guard lived up to their billing as the team to beat by spiking their way past Defense Information Systems Agency Pacific (DISA-PAC), 25-13 and 25-14, on Aug. 6 in a Blue Division intramural volleyball showdown at Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam Fitness Center.

HIANG improved their record to a perfect 6-0 to remain in a two-way tie for first place with Pearl City Peninsula, while DISA-PAC fell to only their second loss of the season and is currently in seventh place with a 3-2 mark.

"I think our team has a lot of the fundamentals down. Getting a good pass from the setter, setter putting the ball up for the hitter to attack it," said HIANG setter Senior Airman Braden Park. "If you put up a bad set, the hitters won't have such a great attack."

The exchange between

Park and the HIANG's potent set of hitters was especially clicking against a usually tough DISA-PAC squad.

Able to pick and choose who to send the ball to, Park frequently, although not exclusively, found Tech. Sgt. Stephen Lorenzo, who was practically automatic every time he got a chance to swing away.

Lorenzo picked up the team's first two points on kills and accounted for five of the team's first 11 points.

Then up by 12-7, Lorenzo picked up back-to-back kills to make it 14-7, which spelled the beginning of the end for DISA-PAC.

Navy Lt. Chuck Wood, a new addition to the HIANG's arsenal of weapons, put his team up by its largest margin at 19-10.

And when Wood was handed the ball for service with the score at 21-13, the Navy lieutenant got the next four points, with kills from Lorenzo and Lt. Col. Rick Cox, to wrap up the first set.

"For the hitters, they

have a certain set that they go to," Park explained about the team's bevy of missile launchers on the court. "Everybody tonight was feeling the flow. The ball was up there and everything was just flowing great. The hitters depend on a good set to make them look great, so it's not just one person that makes a team. It's everyone working together."

With set one in the bag, HIANG came out in the second set and appeared determined to end it quickly.

HIANG got off to a 7-2 lead and then with Airman 1st Class Shane Hipa holding service, the team ran off the next nine points to take a commanding 16-2 advantage.

Hipa recorded three aces during the run and seemed to handcuff DISA-PAC with each and every serve.

Although DISA-PAC managed to slow down HIANG just a little bit and outscored their opponent 8-7 over the next 15 points, it was too little and too late.

"We started getting some more people on our team and some are not at the same skill

(level)," explained Information Systems Technician 2nd Class Jenna Welsh about DISA-PAC's struggles. "Defense became an issue. We couldn't hold our serves."

Welsh said while it wasn't the game they wanted to play, she assured that DISA-PAC would be fine and ready to play against HIANG the next time around.

"We'll take the loss," she said. "I definitely wouldn't count us out. We know they (HIANG) are still in our bracket and maybe we'll see them again."

Park said that even with new players on the team, HIANG has made the adjustments well and are looking to get even better before the playoffs.

"At first, playing with new players, we don't get a chance to practice outside, so games are kind of like when we get to play with each other," Park noted. "The first several games was a bit rough, but now we're getting into that flow. Everyone knows where they need to be and communication is great."

19th Amendment granting women the right to vote was certified as part of the U.S. Constitution.

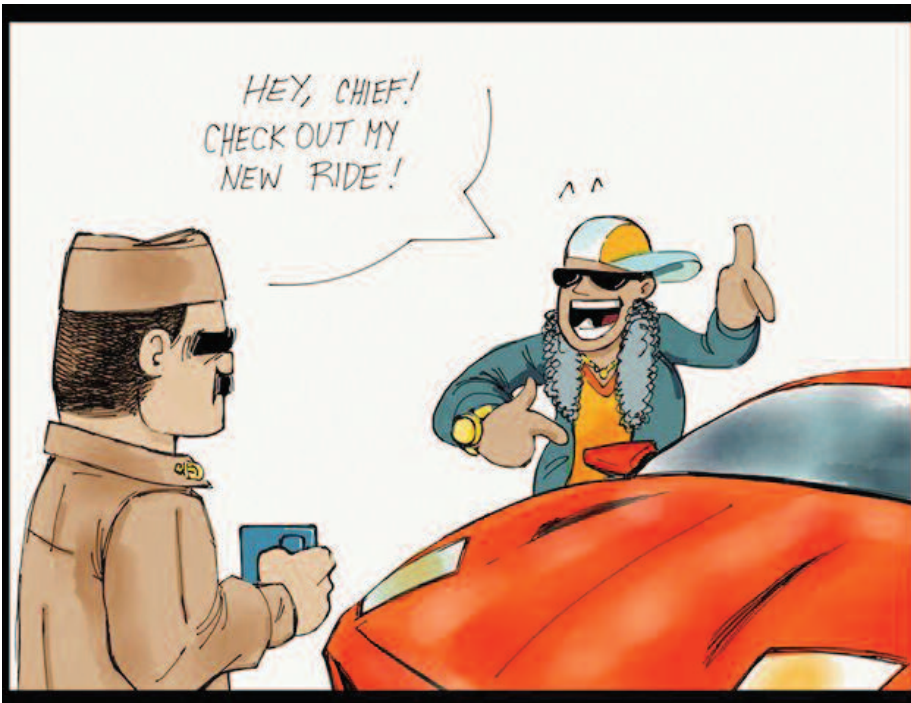
