Course Goals or Overview:	
The aim of this course is to explore the relationship between culture, technology, and language change. We will consider how words enter into a language’s lexicon, how they are indexed in dictionaries, and how they reflect our culture. We will also examine the linguistic significance of new technologies such as texting, gaming, IM, and social networking.	
Learning Objectives/Outcomes: At the end of this course, the student will be able to . . .	
1	Clearly state the defining features of language variation and change.
2	Demonstrate evidence of adjustment in their own attitudes and beliefs about diverse communities and cultures.
3	Articulate issues or problems comprehensively and convey all relevant information necessary for full understanding.
4	Identify different cultural systems of speakers of minority languages/dialects who live in the United States.
5	Systematically analyze one’s own and others’ assumptions and evaluate the relevance of contexts when presenting a position.
6	Extend novel ideas and questions that create new knowledge that crosses boundaries.
7	Recognize ethical issues when presented in a complex, multilayered (grey) context and also recognize cross-relationships among the issues.
8	Discuss in detail both core beliefs and the origin of core beliefs as it relates to language and attitudes about language use.
9	Interpret intercultural experience from the perspectives of their own (and more than one worldview); demonstrate ability to act in a supportive manner that recognizes the feelings of another cultural group.
10	Improve their writing skills by demonstrating a thorough understanding of context, audience, and purpose that is responsive to the assigned tasks.

LOL Project – an individual learning assignment that includes an online research notebook (in blog format) that culminates into a research paper on e-laughter

In-Class Presentation – a collaborative learning assignment that includes a brief (<10 minutes) presentation in front of the class during a face-to-face session
