

Send Something Special

Topic: Send a Letter to a Service Member | Grade Level: Elementary (1st-4th Grades)

Subject: Social Studies | Time: 25 minutes

OBJECTIVE(S):

Students will recognize the importance of remembering our military service members deployed overseas and will write a friendly letter to a service member stationed abroad.

MATERIALS NEEDED:

- Holiday Cheer video from the MilitaryKidsConnect.org website
- Deployed service member names and addresses (one per student) (see Tips below)
- "Send a Soldier a Letter" Worksheet
- · Pencils, crayons and scissors
- Envelopes with first-class stamps

LESSON

Suggested Activity Set-up and Discussion (3 minutes)

- Teacher introduces lesson by exploring with students how exciting it can be to receive a letter or card.
 - Ask students if they have ever received a card or letter. Do they remember how it made them feel? Happy?
 Loved? Appreciated?
 - It's not only our friends and family members who deserve to be recognized. There are many members of our military forces who are sacrificing a lot to help our country. Some work thousands of miles from home, separated from the people they love. They can be away a year or longer and might miss every holiday and family celebration during that period. Can students imagine how that would feel?
 - Tell students that they're going to watch a video about a teenage girl who did something special to show her appreciation for a group of U.S. soldiers.

Video (4 minutes)

• Cue and screen Holiday Cheer video

Class Discussion/Activity (12 minutes)

- Give each student a "Send a Soldier a Letter" Worksheet and envelope addressed to a service member
- Instruct students that:
 - They are each going to write a friendly letter to a deployed soldier
 - They should address the letter to "their" soldier, whose name is on the envelope
 - When finished writing, they should color the picture and cut it out
 - They should raise their hands when finished, and the teacher will review the letter before it goes into the envelope
 - At the end of class, the teacher will collect envelopes to be mailed
