	among the issues.
8	Discuss in detail both core beliefs and the origin of core beliefs as it relates to language and attitudes about language use.
9	Interpret intercultural experience from the perspectives of their own (and more than one worldview); demonstrate ability
	to act in a supportive manner that recognizes the feelings of another cultural group.
10	Improve their writing skills by demonstrating a thorough understanding of context, audience, and purpose that is
	responsive to the assigned tasks.

In-Class Presentation – a collaborative learning assignment that includes a brief (<10 minutes) presentation in front of the class during a face-to-face session
