Course Evaluation Policy:

Student's evaluations of teaching effectiveness is a requirement for all organized classes at UNT Dallas. This short survey will be made available to you at the end of the semester, providing you a chance to comment on how this class is taught. I am very interested in the feedback I get from students, as I work to continually improve my teaching. I consider students' evaluations to be an important part of your participation in this class.

Course Participation: I expect every student to read the assigned material and to be prepared to discuss the material in an informed and respectful manner. You are required to read/watch the news daily. You are encouraged to bring relevant articles to class and to share your thoughts and opinions on those articles. You may get articles from any legitimate news source (i.e. Local new papers, FOX, New York Times, MSNBC, etc...). We will be using current events to explore aspects of contemporary policing. Class participation will be evaluated on the basis of regular attendance and participation in class discussion and activities. Class activities may include in-class exercises and homework assignments. Instructions for these activities will be presented in class. Each of these activities will contribute to the overall class participation grade. Participation is worth 30 points toward your final grade.

Journal Policy. You are required to write up (10) worth 7 pts. each. The journals entries must be 2-4 pages and relate to this course (e.g., police misconduct, use-of force, technology in law enforcment). Hint: Use the articles that you are bringing to class. **You will be required to provide proper (APA citation)** for the source and attach a copy if possible. You will need to provide a summary of the article or new story. Reflect on the topic and relate the article to topics we have covered in this course and demonstrate familiarity course material (i.e., apply critical). Simple why is this important!!!! Journals are due by the beginning of class on December 6. As a general rule, JOURNALS WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED LATE.

Exam/Quiz policy. There will be a quiz every week, except designated test days. There will be total of 12 quizzes at the beginning of class. Quizzes will be over the assigned readings for that week's discussion. The lowest two will be dropped. There will be (3) non-cumulative tests covering assigned chapters and class discussions. Both quizzes and exams may consist of multiple choice, true-false, fill-in-the-blank, short answer, and essay questions and will be taken and graded in class. Questions will come from assigned readings, lecture, and learning activities. Exams should be taken as scheduled.

Late Policy:

No makeup examinations will be allowed except for documented emergencies (See Student Handbook). If make-up exams or quizzes are allowed by instructor for excused absences, all will be completed during finals on the scheduled time and date for this course (TBA).
