2010 FINAL SPECIFICATIONS FOR SUMMER FLOUNDER, SCUP, AND BLACK SEA BASS; NOTICE OF 2010 COMMERCIAL SUMMER FLOUNDER CLOSURE IN DELAWARE

Dear Permit Holder:

NOAA's National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) has approved final 2010 specifications, including commercial quotas and possession limits, and recreational harvest limits, for the summer flounder (fluke), scup (porgy), and black sea bass fisheries. The specifications will be effective January 1, 2010.

See the attached tables for specific information regarding the 2010 initial commercial quotas, the commercial quotas less the research set-aside (RSA), any applicable overages, the resulting 2010 final commercial quotas, and scup possession limits.

SUMMER FLOUNDER

For 2010, the summer flounder total allowable landings (TAL) are 22.13 million lb. After deducting the RSA of 663,900 lb, the TAL is divided into an initial commercial quota of 13,278,000 lb and a recreational harvest limit of 8,852,000 lb. The commercial quota is allocated to the states according to the allocation percentages identified in Amendment 2 to the Summer Flounder, Scup, and Black Sea Bass Fishery Management Plan (FMP). Individual state commercial quotas are adjusted to account for overages in previous years, where applicable, as outlined in the FMP to produce the final 2010 commercial state-by-state quotas (see Table 1).

Due to overages in previous years, Delaware has no 2010 commercial summer flounder quota. Fishing vessels issued a Federal moratorium permit for the summer flounder fishery <u>may not land summer flounder</u> in Delaware during the 2010 calendar year, and dealers issued Federal dealer permits for summer flounder are advised that they <u>may not purchase summer flounder from federally permitted vessels</u> that land in Delaware during the 2010 calendar year, unless additional quota becomes available through a transfer.

SCUP

The scup TAL for 2010 is 14.11 million lb. After deducting the RSA of 423,300 lb, the commercial quota is 10,675,626 lb, and the recreational harvest limit is 3,011,074 lb. There are no applicable commercial quota overages to deduct from the 2010 scup period quotas. The commercial scup Winter I (January-April) Federal possession limit remains at 30,000 lb per trip for 2010, and will be reduced to 1,000 lb when 80 percent of the quota is projected to be reached (see Table 2).

The Winter II (November-December) initial Federal possession limit will remain 2,000 lb. The Winter II possession limit-to-rollover amount ratios will be 1,500 lb per 500,000 lb of unused Winter I period quota transferred to the Winter II period (see Table 3).

BLACK SEA BASS

For 2010, the black sea bass TAL remains 2.30 million lb. After deducting the RSA of 69,000 lb, the TAL is divided into a commercial quota of 1,093,190 lb and a recreational harvest limit of 1,137,810 lb.

Proposed 2010 recreational fishery management measures for all three species will be published in the *Federal Register* in the first quarter of 2010.

This letter does not contain all the regulatory provisions that pertain to these species, and consequently, has no legal force or effect.
