Small Entity Compliance Guide

Dear Limited Access Northeast (NE) Multispecies Permit Holder:

This letter is to inform you that the National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) is increasing the Georges Bank (GB) yellowtail flounder trip limit. As of November 27, 2007, the GB yellowtail flounder trip limit for NE multispecies days-at-sea (DAS) vessels fishing in the U.S./Canada Management Area is 7,500 lb per trip.

NMFS is authorized to make changes to the GB yellowtail flounder trip limit in the U.S./Canada Management Area to prevent under-harvesting the TAC allocation. Based upon Vessel Monitoring System (VMS) reports and other available information, the current rate of harvest will result in the under-harvest of the GB yellowtail flounder total allowable catch (TAC) for the 2007 fishing year (May 1, 2007 - April 30, 2008). Therefore, the current 3,000-lb trip limit in the U.S./Canada Management Area is being increased to 7,500 lb. This action will provide additional opportunities to fully harvest the GB yellowtail flounder TAC.

GB yellowtail flounder landings will continue to be closely monitored. Further inseason adjustments to increase, or decrease, the trip limit will be considered based upon updated catch data and projections. Should 100 percent of the TAC allocation for GB yellowtail flounder be projected to be harvested, all vessels will be prohibited from harvesting, possessing, or landing yellowtail flounder from the U.S./Canada Management Area. The rate of harvest of the GB yellowtail flounder TAC in the U.S./Canada Management Area is updated weekly on the internet at http://www.nero.noaa.gov.
