I support the Proposed Action alternative with two suggested changes: 1) that a breakwater be included at the existing boat ramp for public safety and 2) that an amendment to the Proposed Action Alternative should be made to facilitate a more timely opening of Lake Nighthorse to public recreation.

Consistent with the concept of phased implementation, an accelerated schedule for opening Lake Nighthorse to public use should be considered that still provides the most basic of public safety and environmental protections, without the added delay of time-consuming construction of an overflow parking area, connector trail, and permanent entrance station. Considering it has been 4+ years since the existing boat ramp, parking lot, and restrooms were completed, it is not necessary nor is it in the public's best interest to further delay opening until all aspects of the Proposed Action Alternative are fully completed. Under this schedule, Lake Nighthorse could be opened as early as summer 2016 for limited boating and fishing use only, with the public use limit defined by the capacity of the existing boat ramp parking area. The simple, "bare bones" operation of Lake Nighthorse for fishing and boating access would mimic the way dozens of existing State Fishing Areas around the state have successfully operated for decades, and does not require construction of an overflow parking lot or a permanent entrance station structure to be in place before public use is allowed. Specifically, a temporary entrance station consisting of a portable shed or sun shade can be placed at the existing gated entrance off CR 211. Similar arrangements have been in place for many years at Vallecito and McPhee Reservoirs and have functioned well. This temporary structure can double as an aquatic nuisance species (ANS) inspection station, using the

- 4 enlarged gravel parking area outside the entrance gate as the boat inspection area. With regard to parking, the existing parking lot at the boat ramp would serve as a self-regulating daily limit to the number of users allowed at Lake Nighthorse. Once the parking lot is full, the ANS attendant or park ranger at the entrance gate would temporarily close the gate to additional boaters or anglers until someone leaves, thus preventing unauthorized overflow parking along the boat ramp access road. From May to November, specific hours of operation can be established, after which the entrance gate will be closed for the day. With the addition of a single portable shed or covered structure and hiring of seasonal ANS inspectors/entrance gate attendants, the existing boat ramp, restrooms, parking area, and access road will serve admirably well until the overflow parking lot and permanent entrance station envisioned in the Proposed Action alternative can be constructed. This will avoid years more delay and growing public resentment at being prohibited access from a facility built with U.S. taxpayers dollars and (in the case of the boat ramp project) Colorado sportsmen's dollars.
- 5 With regard to the related issue of the continuing noncompliance of Reclamation with regard to allowing public access to the public access facilities built at Lake Nighthorse with funds from the Motorboat Colorado Access Fund, under all the alternatives considered in the Lake Nighthorse Recreation Plan, Reclamation should be required to reimburse Motorboat Colorado for the cost of the boat ramp, parking lot, and restrooms that have been sitting idle since they were completed in 2012. While unused, these facilities are no longer new, and their useful life has been diminished while Reclamation dithers on "someday" opening Lake Nighthorse. Reclamation is ultimately responsible for the delay in getting this issue resolved. The Wallop-Breaux Act approved an excise tax on fishing and boating gear paid by Colorado anglers and boaters. Wallop-Breaux funds were used to build the boat ramp facility, with the express intent of improving public fishing and boating access in Colorado. This intent has clearly not been met at Lake Nighthorse. Accordingly, Reclamation should be required to immediately reimburse the Motor Boat Colorado fund for the cost of the Lake Nighthorse boat ramp project so these funds can be used at other reservoirs where public access is allowed.

If the accelerated opening of Lake Nighthorse could be accomplished in 2016 under an amendment to the Proposed Action alternative, perhaps the full reimbursement of funds used for the boat ramp project could be scaled back to include only the four years of depreciated value lost since the 2012 completion of the project. As time slips by however, and Lake Nighthorse still remains closed to the public, the clock is ticking on the useful life of the boat ramp project and the likelihood of a public appeal to the Colorado administrator of Wallop-Breaux Federal Aid funds for misuse of funds by Reclamation looms large.

First of all, I'm happy to see progress is being made toward opening Lake Nighthorse to public access. While I'm very concerned about the impact people will have on the basin, I'm equally enthusiastic about having a "lake" in our backyard.

As a 15 year resident of Durango, and an avid sailor with a motor-less 15' sailboat, I would prefer to have Lake Nighthorse limited to wind-powered, self-powered, and possibly battery-powered vessels. Basically, cap the speed limit on the lake to 10 mph.

1 At the very least, it would be great to have a separate non-motorized boat ramp instead of the chaos of rude and often inebriated boaters on Vallecito and Navajo Lakes who will barge in while I'm trying to maneuver to the launch dock. With summer thunderstorms and erratic winds, it can be incredibly challenging to get my boat with a tall lightening rod off the water in a timely manner.

I also think day-use only is the right place to start.

In my opinion, that would be the least disruptive, most cost-effective approach. It would preserve the elemental aspects of the area, and lessen the impact on wildlife. It would keep the need for infrastructure and law enforcement to a minimum. Which in turn would keep usage fees down and promote a wider range of family friendly activities across all socio-economic levels.

Pls note my comments below wrt the USBR solicitation of comments in the Durango Herald on Fri, Apr 1,

- 1. If the following is allowed without sufficient restrictions please note my comments below as recommended in the public meetings coordinated by the Nat'l Park Service and local government agencies at the Durango Fairgrounds large meeting room in April 2011 - Pls see Lake Nighthorse PPT attached which was prepared in conjunction with others on the Historical committee.
- 1. Horsepower or sound decibels should be limited for any boats or vehicles that create waves and noise with respect to the numerous homes and residents on any of the land that can be from anywhere on the Lake. I recommend no jet boats and that boat or any motorized vessels on the Lake have horsepower limited to 10HP;
 - 2. A quite area should be created in the SW sector where no motor boats/vehicles are allowed
- II. If the following is NOT allowed or restricted I recommend the assessment be modified to allow:
- 1. A "Leave No Trace" Wilderness Camp for Kids. I envision a Tepee village with support for cooking outside, excursions on the Lake and land by canoe or horseback to fish and view game, etc. to give kids an experience of what it was like a 100 or more years ago. All heavy provisions must be carried in by boat (provided as an exception to I. above for certain times in late/early Spring, early Fall) or horseback with food and other incidentals transported by horseback during the season. I envision Universal Studios, Disney or a similar large or smaller organization that would entice families to Durango while parents explored/toured, camped, fished, etc. in our area while the kids were exposed to a unique but realistic wilderness experience. Therefore, providing a once-in-a-lifetime experience bringing significant economic resources to the community with little, if any, impact on the land or Lake environment.



Although my first choice would be a totally non-motorized lake I understand the desire of the City to promote tourism and the roll power boaters play as tourists.

I am pleased to see that the EA does such a good job of minimizing the impact of power boats and believe you have struck a good compromise that will work for most folks. I, however, wonder about the speed limit of 40mph. The portion of the lake open to this speed is not that big and it seems one would be across the lake in the blink of an eye at 40mph. It also seems that 30mph would be plenty fast for most skiers. Too many boats buzzing around such a small area could also be a challenge to some boaters and present safety issues to all boats.

I also wanted to mention a possible concern with the proposed use of chip seal for a portion of the road. I live in Rafter J and our chip seal roads are great EXCEPT for our cut-de-sacs where tight turns are required. I don't know exactly where chip seal will be used at Nighthorse, but I would suggest it not be used where tight turns are required - like in the boat ramp area or anywhere vehicle have to make tight turns. The turning action puts extra stress on the chip seal and greatly reduces the life of the road.

I hope you will find a way to include some singletrack, dirt trails for mountain biking. The Durango area has many trails, but people (myself included) still drive 60 minutes to get to Phil's World in Cortez and Boggy Draw above Dolores because these areas have what Durango doesn't - relatively easy, rolling terrain that's fun for all levels, but is notable for being friendly to beginner and intermediate or senior riders. 1 am writing regarding the potential opening of Lake Nighthorse to the public. I have reviewed the Draft Environmental Assessment, and based on my experience as a resident of Durango, Colorado and involvement as a Site Steward with the Bureau of Land Management's program in Canyon of the Ancients, I have serious concerns regarding enforcement.

Specifically, I am concerned regarding the City of Durango providing management services, as they pertain to enforcement. Living in Durango, the city government's philosophy regarding enforcement of the many ordinances is that enforcement is citizen initiated. That is, if a citizen sees a violation, they should report it. The city will not actively seek out violations, except in some cases. Not very proactive and this has been true for many years. In a recent council meeting, the next mayor reiterated that the city did not have enough staff to enforce the housing code, thus without citizen's complaints, little would be done. Furthermore, the city freely admits that it has difficult recruiting police and filling the many vacant spots. So, enforcement by the City of Durango is reactive, not proactive. I have also experienced that even when violations are pointed out, letters are sent but the violations remain. I not certain why such lax enforcement, likely a combination of the city's culture, years of passivity, and lack of staff, all of which are intertwined.

Before moving to Colorado, I lived on a lake in Maryland and witnessed the numerous violations of the law regarding boats. Fortunately, the State of Maryland Department of Natural Resources was very proactive in their approach to boaters by stationing officers on boats 12 hours per day. While this took care of many of the problems, swimmers and kayakers, like myself, found the motorboats often inconsiderate and violating the law. Given that motor boats will be allowed on the lake, I have concerns that the City of Durango can be proactive in ensuring the safety of all who use the lake.

Most important, I am concerned about the potential damage to the archeological sites, artifacts, and possible grave sites which, based on previous archeological research conducted prior to building the reservoir likely exist. Given the large numbers of people who will visit the area, there remains a strong possibility that sites will be disturbed and artifacts taken. As a site steward in Canyon of the Ancients, ensuring that sites remain protected is important and the presence of site stewards monitoring sites and the area supports the work of the BLM police staff.

Finally, motorboats on Lake Nighthorse will create both noise pollution, pollution to the water, and potential danger to swimmers, kayakers, and wildlife. While I would suggest only canoes and kayaks on the lake, I doubt that will happen, but at least I can suggest.

I have two suggestions. First and foremost, make certain that the City of Durango can present a very detailed plan regarding how they intend to enforce the laws that will apply to Lake Nighthorse. Make certain that they are going to hire and train enough staff so that monitoring can occur seven days per week during the hours that people will be utilizing the lake area. Make certain that they will be proactive in their enforcement both on the lake and in the area around the lake that people will use for hiking. Finally, periodically monitor their effectiveness at enforcement. Do not assume enforcement is happening... be keen observers and evaluate their performance periodically. What would be "icing on the cake" is to utilize the BLM police that ensure enforcement in Canyon of the Ancients. They are proactive though they are few in number. I have more faith they will ensure the safety of the ruins and artifacts.

Second, initiate some type of "site steward" program that would utilize volunteers to maintain a presence in the area and monitor whether archeological sites and artifacts are being abused. Such a program would require training and support from the various tribes and BUREC. Such a program could be modeled after the site steward programs in Canyon of the Ancients, New Mexico and Utah. The archeological sites are precious to the tribes and generations to follow.

After reading the Lake Nighthorse Recreation Plan/Draft EA, more than once, & attending numerous public meetings since the early 2000s, the following are my comments.

1 Lake Nighthorse has been compared (by meeting officials) to Vallecito Lake, as being 'almost as big' & '2/3 the size'. In fact, when full, Lake Nighthorse surface area is 1,490 acres, Lake Vallecito is 2,720 acres. That makes Lake Nighthorse just 260 acres over 1/2 the size of Vallecito. Basically 1/2 the size!

Use the boat ramp for small, fishing type, boats only. Our beautiful area does not need another lake full of large, noisy, gas producing, lake polluting boats. There are other lakes already in place that allow for this type of recreation. There are numerous other types of water recreation, that is far more appropriate for Lake Nighthorse. Fishing, kayaking, canoeing, sailboarding, paddle boarding, swimming, diving, just to name a few.

- 2Allow for day use only, with the capability of overnight boat housing. This is a very, very dry & windy area, with residents living very closeby. The possibility for fires in this beautiful, somewhat protected area is extremely high. There have been proposals, over the years, for up to 196 overnight camping sites. Vallecito Lake, which is almost twice the size, & is much higher in elevation, thereby having far less fire danger, has 79 camping sites. We participated in the series of community meetings held several years ago here in Durango wherein ideas were collected and vetted regarding options for future recreational use of Lake Nighthorse. With that as background, we are disappointed that so much of what was envisioned is not included in option #1. Among those items were a swim beach and the development of a reasonably scaled system of trails around much of the lake (it would help to have a clearer sense of how/when the 25 foot buffer zone around the lake will be in effect for hiking purposes).

It seems that only access for motorized boating is being considered at this time, and that other previously recommended (by the public) forms of recreation are on hold until some unspecified time in the future and with no indication of commitment from the Bureau that further enhancements will necessarily occur. Given the significantly reduced footprint of the area that can potentially be used for recreation by the public, it would seem that any significant positive impact on local/regional economic development or more broad use of this resource by the public has been curtailed to a large extent.

1 We wish that the Bureau and the other key stakeholders would commit to adoption of the first alternative plan presented in the assessment, along with a timeline for its implementation. As a corollary observations, we think

2 it is unfortunate that the decision to allow motorized vehicles on the lake includes gas/diesel propulsion, rather than limiting boating to electric motors only. Since water quality is a high priority, it will be interesting to see how the planned broader inclusion of various types of motorized boats will impact conditions at the lake over time.

Section 3.11.1 of the EA says in part "The Animas River from Junction Creek to the Southern Ute Indian Reservation boundary (which includes the intake structure for the Durango Pumping Plant for Lake Nighthorse) has been assessed as fully supporting agriculture and primary contact recreational uses, not supporting water supply use, and having insufficient information to assess aquatic life...". (my underline)

Secondly, section 3.11.2 says that under any of the development proposals "...water quality in Lake Nighthorse would be potentially affected by development and use of shoreline recreational facilities, motorized boating, and other waterbased recreational facilities".

I request assurance that before development is approved:

1 1. the water quality of Lake Nighthorse will be assessed as supporting water supply use, and

2. any additional water processing (caused by Lake Nighthorse water quality) required of Lake Durango Water Authority will be evaluated and made public.

I realize there are many opposing ideas of what recreation should look like at Lake Nighthorse, but considering the impacts on water quality and

the cultural/ historic resources my thoughts are:

1 Non -Motorized boating only to keep petro chemicals out of the water. If motorized boating is allowed it should be wakeless. With Vallicito, Navajo and McPhee

serving the waterski and speed boat community their redundant use at Lake Nighthorse is unnecessary. The non -motorized boating would have a

lighter impact on the water quality, serenity and wildlife (since the area was a wildlife area until "repurposed").

2 Developed camping on the northside should be low impact if it is set back far enough from the shore with adequate pit toilets and trails built to connect to the shore and

trails (so multiple "casual" trails do not develop).

Unpaved trails are appropriate unless a short paved handicapped access trail is necessary to avoid issues. Ideally there would be trails on both sides of the lake

with one possibly routing to the ridge on the southside of the basin. Trails should be able to be routed to avoid any historic/ cultural sites and sensitive wildlife

or wetlands areas. Trails should be non-motorized.

The Lake Nighthorse draft environmental assessment does not adequately address the non-motorized option. The value and attractiveness of a quiet peaceful lake is grossly under-rated. We have several large nearby lakes where motor boaters can recreate; but none where canoeists and kayakers can enjoy a lake without noise, waves, and potential collisions with speedboats. Elimination of motorboats could also mean saving the big expense of a mussel inspection station (doubt there is much risk with hand carried boats). A non-motorized lake would certainly offer better air and water quality benefits.

If the boat ramp represents some kind of claim for power boaters, then what is the costs to refund their "investment" and eliminate their claim? The public was never given the opportunity to choose if they wanted that ramp or not. Getting rid of powerboats and the cleaning station should lower the costs, making the recreation plan more financially attractive.

I am writing regarding the potential opening of Lake Nighthorse to the public. I have reviewed the Draft Environmental Assessment, and based on my experience as a resident of Durango, Colorado and

involvement as a Site Steward with the Bureau of Land Management's program in Canyon of the Ancients, I have serious concerns regarding enforcement.

Specifically, I am concerned regarding the City of Durango providing management services, as they pertain to enforcement. Living in Durango, the city government's philosophy regarding enforcement of the many ordinances is that enforcement is citizen initiated. That is, if a citizen sees a violation, they should report it. The city will not actively seek out violations, except in some cases. Not very proactive and this has been true for many years. In a recent council meeting, the next mayor reiterated that the city did not have enough staff to enforce the housing code, thus without citizen's complaints, little would be done. Furthermore, the city freely admits that it has difficult recruiting police and filling the many vacant spots. So, enforcement by the City of Durango is reactive, not proactive. I have also experienced that even when violations are pointed out, letters are sent but the violations remain. I not certain why such lax enforcement, likely a combination of the city's culture, years of passivity, and lack of staff, all of which are intertwined.

Before moving to Colorado, I lived on a lake in Maryland and witnessed the numerous violations of the law regarding boats. Fortunately, the State of Maryland Department of Natural Resources was very proactive in their approach to boaters by stationing officers on boats 12 hours per day. While this took care of many of the problems, swimmers and kayakers, like myself, found the motorboats often inconsiderate and violating the law. Given that motor boats will be allowed on the lake, I have concerns that the City of Durango can be proactive in ensuring the safety of all who use the lake.

I have read the draft EA for this proposed project. Please consider the comments below.

- 1. Prohibit all jet skis in the Proposed Action. These are the most objectionable motorized vehicles to other users. Enforcement will be a continued source of conflict and very difficult to do if jet skis are allowed access.
 - 2. Test all boat motors for decibel limits in the Proposed Action. If not done, t will be impossible to enforce and will cause continued conflict for users and neighbors. Testing decibel limits must be done before allowing access for motorized boats. The method for testing will need to be changed to do this on land. Law enforcement must have calibrated devises to continually monitor boat decibels while these users are on the lake.
- 2 3. Include a trail system that circumnavigates the lake in the Proposed Action.
- 4. Require law enforcement to patrol the lake continually during open hours in the Proposed Action. Law enforcement must be visible on the lake surface if rules are to be complied with. Otherwise there will be constant conflict between motorized users, neighbors, and non-motorized users.
- 4 5. Increase the no-wake zone to 300 feet from the shore along the perimeter of the lake.

1 I would like to add my voice to those who feel that Lake Knighthorse should be a quiet lake with either no motorized access or limited to trolling motors and a no wake policy. This process has been infuriating for the local recreational community. I am one of only a few scullers in the area, but we are part of a much larger paddling community. We usually travel to Lemon Lake to row our long gliding boats. Kristine Johnson's editorial in today's (May 1) Durango Herald has inspired me, despite my frustration, to get involved again. I attended almost all of the available meetings of 2010-11 and voiced my opinion. Unfortunately that was a doomed process due to the decision to take the boat ramp funding without consulting the public. To my knowledge we do not have a quiet lake in the area and thus the paddlers are left to deal with the wakes of the powerboaters. I even suggested that we have quiet morning and evening hours of use on Knighthorse, but that was dismissed as an unwieldy solution. One would like to think that local government would work more efficiently, smoothly and quickly than our state or federal governments but alas we suffer the same bureaucracy with what appears to be even more ineptitude on our local level. What's worse is that we seem to have a track record of not getting recreational projects done in Durango. (unopened fields at FLC, DHS Track, replacing tennis courts at FLC, Oxbow Park near the River to name a few) The surrounding communities of Bayfield, Cortez and Farmington seem to be able to build and maintain better recreational and athletic facilities well ahead of Durango despite lesser community financial means. I have been told that a Lake Knighthorse manager, a former Durango Parks and Recreation Director who used to get things done, was all but hired several years ago until the city got involved. I strongly urge that this Lake Knightmare project be resolved, that a quiet lake solution be reconsidered and that the decision be put to a community vote. Perhaps then, and only then, you will get quiet from us off the lake as well as on.







I'd like to add my voice in opposition to high speed watercraft on Lake Nighthorse. Kristine Johnson's article in the May 1st Durango Herald Opinion Section covered many good reasons to prohibit high power/speed watercraft on our newest, small, pristine lake. An addition, the wake from such watercraft will cause significant accelerated shore erosion and bank undercutting. This unnatural action creates turbid, muddy water with very negative impacts on shallow water-dwelling gamefish, birds, amphibians, and invertebrates, whose populations must surely be thriving in our currently quiet lake. Further, over time such accelerated erosion will likely wash out unidentified archeological or paleontological sites, to their detriment.

As Kristine Johnson pointed out, Lake Nighthorse is just too small to accommodate high speed watercraft. Aside from the safety and noise issues, its small size exacerbates the wake problem, providing insufficient distance to allow such wake to dissipate. I believe that a 10-15 HP size limit would accommodate causal boaters and fisherman with minimal negative impact.

1We would like to urge the Bureau of Reclamation to limit the use of gasoline powered watercraft on Lake Nighthorse to speeds that produce no wake. Better yet, the money that was obtained for the boat ramp should be returned and motorized watercraft should be prohibited altogether.

The Bureau has the unique opportunity to create an environment on the lake that is peaceful, quiet and healthy.

- This would keep the lake from being polluted by gasoline and oil and preserve the quality of the water for drinking.
- There are several other lakes close by where motorized boats are allowed Vallecito, Navajo, McPhee. We do not need to allow them in Lake Nighthorse as well.
- This could help prevent introduction of the invasive zebra mussel into the lake. The threat of the mussel alone is reason to decide against allowing motorized watercraft.
- This would promote the use of the lake for healthier pursuits such as swimming and paddling stand-up boards and kayaks.
- The resulting peace and quiet would allow people a place to relax and unwind. The mental health benefits obtained from this are well documented.

We think it is better for the Bureau to proceed slowly on the amount of activity allowed on this pristine lake. It would be virtually impossible to ban gas powered watercraft once they are allowed on the lake. It would be much easier prohibit their use at first and then re-evaluate the situation in a few years and decide to allow the introduction of motorized watercraft - or continue the ban.

- 1 support Action Alternative 2 in general, however, I also recommend a couple modifications to Alt 2 including 1) the reduction of the motorized use area to approximately 1/4 of the size noted on the map shown in the EA document, 2) a reduction in the speed limit for motorized use to 10 MPH maximum and 3) the lifting of a wholesale prohibition to foot/boat access of the dam structure while allowing specific closure areas for safety and security such as the spillway, intake/release structures, etc.
- 2 In general the Four Corners areas has many lakes/reservoirs for motorized use and too few for non-motorized use. As well, the restricted access to the dam area is overreach by BOR as this could be a popular fishing area that does NOT need to be completely off limits for security and/or safety purposes. The public paid for the project and it follows they should have maximum access excess for reasons related to public safety and security.

Upon my review of the 128 pages of the subject Assessment these concepts appear to be fully compliant or could be approved. If not, please consider them for incorporation into or modifying the two Alternative recreation plans in the Assessment, where appropriate, to allow "other project beneficiaries" to implement the following three concepts under these alternatives, the "recreation master plan in 2010¹, 2014 Conceptual Recreation Plan, other Plans, and any other governing ordinances, regulations, laws, etc.

- If not a part of the process in developing the Final Lake Nighthorse Recreation Plan, it is stressed that a Mission statement to provide overall guidance in making future decisions be eventually validated and established, stating the general purpose served in developing Lake Nighthorse to include the importance of preserving through education the natural environment, historical and cultural significance of the Ridges Basin² Volunteer support will surely be necessary to meet the Mission and sustainable objectives to preserve the values of the area.

- 3 If overnight use by children in camps are not compliant, an appropriate revision to Alternatives 2 and 3 are requested to allow overnight stays from May 15 to Sep 1 since it is presumed overnight camping would be considered as noted in Sec 2.1, p. 9 where the word "initially" was used in the statement, "The Lake and recreational area would be "initially" designated as day use only..." Or, may be parmitted subject to other requirements as noted in Appendix A, No. 20.
- 4 The permit would limit usage between May 15 and Sep 1, require all impacts from the concessioner and accompanying support, children and visitors to be limited to horses on designated trails and water transportation on designated water and land pathways, and to certain times. The permit would allow exclusive or water frontage rights and require adjacent Indian "Tepees Camps" to be within 200 yards and perhaps a wall-tent oriented site for shelter and cooking with the area to be designated the "Wilderness Site." Amendments Requested:
- 5 Since Tepees or similar temporary structures may be prohibited it is requested Alternatives 1 and 2 be amended (Wildlife (impacts to elk and deer winter range) Table 1, P.19) and elsewhere where appropriate by deleting the period [.] after the words, "such as cabin sites, shall be developed in the project area under any of the action alternatives.\(^1\) and adding ", unless they are specifically permitted for Tepees and/or temporary by the recreation manager, or appropriate or designated authority, and will follow the Leave No Trace doctrine."
- Since any trails on the south and west sides of the reservoir shall be designated for foot traffic only in Alternatives 1 and 2 (Wildlife in Table 1, P. 20), it is requested they be amended (and elsewhere where appropriate) to allow horses in the South or West side of the lake only for appropriate times needed to take supplies or riders into or out of the "Wildemess Site, or for access by the Southern Ute to tribal lands."
- A reasonable number of "maximum" user days would be allocated, i.e. 1,068 to 2136 = 10-20/day, mostly children, X 3.5 months X 30.5 days/mo. Under either Alternative 1 or 2 it is assumed restricting area usage and limiting/imposing "use periods" would constrain/limit the user days, especially in certain areas during elk calving or mule deer fawning times. Campfires for cooking and other accommodating functions such as athletic or other game areas must meet certain requirements, along with other environmental restrictions to maintain the pre-existing serenity of the area to the greatest
- 7 extent possible. For example, only "dead and down" wood should be utilized for camp/cooking fires and placed in designated, approved fire containment systems. Otherwise, "everything" contributing to or from the experience, including garbage, human waste, etc., must be "completely" hauled in or out as noted above or below, Leaving No Trace of the experience to the maximum extent possible. All water traffic hauling supplies (food, etc.) in or out must be limited to a vessel and raft or barge of an approximate the supplier of the experience of
- acceptable length and horsepower outboard rating, and no inboard engines permitted. All other water activity must be by kayak, canoe, or other human powered small craft in designated areas suggested to be immediately adjoining the land of the "Wilderness Site."
- 9 The preferred area recommended would be located somewhere along the South or West side of the lake that would accommodate the greatest or closest to a Wilderness experience where there would be the least interaction with other recreational users. And, the Southern Ute Tribe should be encouraged to develop the Tepee Camp if the best Wilderness experience would be on their land or adjoining public land to demonstrate the significance, importance and protection of their cultural artifacts, cultural uses, and dependence on the land and its resources for hunting, fishing, and gathering related to their sovereign rights and powers or provided under Federal Law.

For the same reason the Bay Area is attractive to young, athletic, energetic, ambitious, and/or career oriented individuals, the 4-Corners with our pristine mountains, rivers, landscape, history, culture, rural selling and other amenities can be as well to entice design engineers and specialty manufacturing that to some extent already exists, and attractive to major companies or start-ups. According to

research cited in the Jan 2016 National Geographic, living close to Nature reduces stress substantially! Therefore, "Nature Nurtures Us" is a strong 4-Corners incentive or theme to encourage/stimulate Economic Growth.

A "Leave No Trace" Wilderness camp at Lake Nighthorse for children developed and leased, preferably with oversight of the Southern Ute and/or Ute Mountain Ute Tribes, to icons like Disney or NBC Universal Studios⁵ would attract the parents as well to Durango, increasing airport traffic, local tourism — compounded by parents visiting, and significantly adding to the Durango and surrounding area's tax base. The Southern Ute or Ute Mountain Ute Tribes, Purgatory Ski Resort and/or the other collective ski area ownership partners, or Durango Mountain Resort (or the separate entity that remains) may have interest as an investor or sponsor. No question this concept would help the passage of the new Durango Airport terminal expansion or relocation.



Please see the recommendation in the Addendum attached.

Fresh Water Aquaculture

Consideration should be given to allowing the development of a significant employment and revenue producing industry through the rearing and/or holding of trout, steelhead, Arctic char, salmon, and/or other acceptable species for sport and commercial purposes in a "self-contained" environment in the lake or on land." Children from the Wilderness Site could be excited catching fish while learning about a thriving, significantly profitable aquaculture industry with close proximity to major markets.

Sport and Commercial Aquaculture. An aquaculture venture that enhances the children and family experience with fishing adventures *limited to children* and offering local trout or other enhancement to the Lake and local food source availability provides increased economy through employment and commerce – successful ventures have been developed in private and public waters by the Coleville tribe in the Grand Coulee reservoir in Washington and other compatible aquaculture uses exist downstream on the Columbia River.

Examples are noted below of commercial systems employed in British Columbia, China and elsewhere, which should also be applicable for a children's fishing experience.

The infrastructure must be "low impact" to be defined by appropriate regulations or other governing requirements. Amendments are requested in Sec. 2.2, p.12 by adding another paragraph after the word "Reclamation" at the end of the last paragraph to read:

Additional low-impact commercial activities shall include the rearing and/or holding of trout, salmon, steelhead, Arctic char and/or other acceptable species for sport and commercial purposes in a self-contained environment in the lake or on land (no possibility of any pollution or escapes of any species raised or unnatural components or ingredients used in the rearing process or system), and limited to a well-defined area with sufficient biological and ecological water column to maintain a proper growth environment for the specie/s, maintaining an enriched, non polluting environment, further expanding revenue from sustainable sport, environmentally sensitive commercial and recreational activities.

2 Goal: Provide the cultural history of the area through current educational communication and surface experiences through historical messages visible on land all other means with minimum environmental impact to enhance future experiences for domestic and international visitors.

One of the most important considerations is generating revenue sources to permit sufficient education of the inherent cultural history inherent in the Lake Nighthorse Ridges Basin Area, also know as Saga Gewitches or Green Basin. As a consequence we propose private sector and non-profit investment incentives be developed.

We encourage utilization of buses to transfer the majority of the visitors, which would be provided by the visitor promoters relying upon their marketing and investments to underwrite visitor awareness, historical signage and other soft structure to enhance cultural and other acceptable discoveries, adventures and experiences.

The idea would be to add a third day to a visitor's experience to the typical train and Mesa Verde experience by concentrating the majority of visitors in Durango with transportation groups to Lake Nighthorse.

Some examples might be:

- allow consideration for a destination adventure Indian village such as what might be envisioned by Disney or Universal Studios which would include Tepees, discoveries, general life as it once was and now through nature discoveries. All would be soft structures completely removed after seasonal usage with visitors and support transferred in by horses;

The points in favor of this are several ... 1) it's pretty cut and dried and easy to remember, for both sets of participants and for staff enforcing it, 2) it gives the non-motorized set (and others, I might add) a quiet day, both in terms of noise and in terms of wakes, 3) in the long run the motorized folks end up with more user days ... not many ... but no one could ever claim they'd been short-changed. As another point ... the other residents of the lake, i.e. geese, ducks, coots, plus others get a respite from noise (at least) every other day.

I say nothing about the motorized set as to power, speeds, etc.; I'm sure that the size of the lake will be considered by those who know more about it than I do and inappropriate craft won't be allowed.

2 One last comment, not related to boating: the lake offers numerous opportunities for educating folks about the local geology, archaeology, biology, water issues, and so on. These are seldom part of the conversation, and they should be. Keep bringing that up.

1 The Old Spanish Trail Association (OSTA) would like to provide the following comments on the draft environmental assessment for the Lake Nighthorse Recreation Plan.

After initial review we noticed the lack of acknowledgement that the Old Spanish National Historic Trail traverses Lake Nighthorse. Nowhere in Recreation Plan do you mention that the trail exists nor the historic importance of this trail corridor. For countless generations, this was a major travel route used by pleistocene hunters, Ancestral Puebloan farmers, Spanish explorers (Juan Rivera, Dominquez and Escalante), as well as trappers, traders, and military expeditions on the Old Spanish Trail from 1829-1848 (Robidioux, Workman, Slover, McComb, Carson, Fremont, Roland, Wolfskill etc.) The Old Spanish National Historic Trail was recognized for its historic values by Congress and signed into law in 2002.

As we reviewed the Recreation Plan, we also noticed the lack of any mitigation measures taken by the Bureau of Reclamation for the damage to the historic trail by the dam construction and the filling of Lake Nighthorse. Nowhere in the document do you acknowledge the responsibility of the Bureau to mitigate for these losses and provide opportunities for the public to learn about this historic trade route on public lands. During numerous discussions with the Bureau of Reclamation, it was understood that the mitigation for the losses would occur in future study sessions

The OSTA would like to emphasize the importance of protection of historic trail segments as well as the historic trail corridor, historic trail landscape, and associated trail resources under §106 of the National

Historic Preservation Act. National historic trail corridor values and purposes include scenic values, opportunities to vicariously share the experience of original users of the historic route, historic trail landscapes, historic trail view sheds, opportunities for open-air outdoor recreation, and interpretation of the historic route - described in the National Trails System Act (NTSA) and subject to National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) consideration.

We look forward to your revised Recreation Plan for Lake Nighthorse that includes consideration of the Old Spanish National Historic Trail and its associated values.

Thank you very much for taking the time yesterday to provide me additional background on the Draft Environmental Assessment for Lake Nighthorse,

As you know, in 2012 the City of Durango Parks and Recreation Department received the National Gold Medal Award for Excellence in the field of Parks & Recreation Management. This award provides ample evidence of the town's ability to effectively manage and develop recreation at Lake Nighthorse.

Please know that I was recently selected to Durango's, Parks & Recreation Advisory Board and have closely followed this recreational initiative for the town for well over a decade. I offer my personal recommendations below to amend the Proposed Action, in order to make it more attractive to the residents of Durango.

One pillar supporting the town's success in this arena is the broad city management / community partnership guiding the City of Durango recreation program. Our Master Plan for the City of Durango Parks, Open Space, Trails and Recreation (hereinafter "POST Plan") was finalized in April 2010. Development of the POST Plan involved 17 key leader meetings, 5 focus groups, 2 public meetings at the start and end of the process, and countless conversations among resident. The POST Plan is a statistically robust compilation of the area's position on POST issues for the Durango community.

For your convenience, I've attached POST Plan Chapter 9 - Priorities Needs Assessment, which shows that the highest outdoor priorities for recreation are human powered activities involving (1) Natural & Hard Surface Trails; (2) Neighborhood Parks (e.g. places where individuals can spend quality recreational time outdoors); and (3) Water Recreation (swimming beach, non-motorized water sports, etc.).

Based on my understanding of the towns priorities, I recommend the following changes to the Proposed Action:

- 1. Extend the Recreational Footprint to be 1 mile around the full pool elevation of the lake specifically for creation of a natural surface trail surrounding the entire lake to include a trail below the dam connecting the Parking Lot area to the southern border of the lake.
- Incorporate a hard-surface trail connecting Animas River Trail (which follows the Animas River through
 Durango) to the Lake Nighthorse Proposed Recreation Footprint. This trail connection would establish an avenue
 for safe non-motorized travel from the town to the lake.

If these above recreational elements can't be "approved" by all the parties and implemented as part of the Proposed Plan in the currently planned comment/modification period, consider instead including these Action Alternative 1 elements as "future recreational improvements approved in concept to be developed further & implemented in phases" rather than presented as "possible future recreation development" as future improvements ae currently conveyed in the Proposed Action.
 - c. Durango residents appear prepared for the time needed to plan and develop recreational facilities, but are likely be upset by the Proposed Action unchanged, since it forfeits many of the recreational elements established by the community in its 2011 Recreation Plan.
 - d. I believe that adopting the Proposed Action without alteration could deliver a severe blow to the residents expectations and negatively impact the Gold Medal performance of Durango's Parks & Recreation Department.

Tigase know that in my discussions on this issue, many residents seem comfortable reducing the environmental cooperint of motorized boating in favor of other outdoor recreational priorities (trails, swimming, etc.). Many residents appear to favor no-wake boating limits (e.g. reduced ambient noise, minimized wave action, facilitating swimming, supporting fishing) throughout the entire lake.

The recommendations in this email do not reflect the deliberations of the Parks & Recreation Advisory Board. has board is presently evaluating the Proposed Action and deliberating whether to provide formal comment to www.senarately.

CHAPTER NINE - PRIORITY NEEDS ASSESSMENT

The purpose of the Facility and Program Needs Assessment is to provide a prioritized list of facility/amenity needs and recreation program needs for the residents of the City of Durango. The Needs Assessment evaluates both quantitative and qualitative data. Quantitative data includes the statistically valid Community Survey, which asked 568 City of Durango residents to list unmet needs and rank their importance. Qualitative data includes resident feedback obtained in Focus Group meetings, Key Leader Interviews, and Public Forums.

The information in the Facility and Program Needs Assessment is supplemented with the recommended Level of Service Standards and Equity Mapping to develop the strategic recommendations to identify the facilities/amenities and programs of highest priority for the community. These priorities will play a vital role in dictating the sequence and extent of implementation of the projects identified in the Master Plan.

A weighted scoring system was used to determine the priorities for parks and recreation facilities/amenities and recreation programs. For instance, as noted below, a weighted value of 2 for the unmet desires means that out of a total of 100%, a value of 20% would be attributed to unmet desires or support identified in the survey.

This scoring system considers the following:

- Community Survey
- Unmet desires for facilities and recreation programs This is used as a factor from
 the total number of households mentioning whether they have a need for a
 facility/program and the extent to which their desires for facilities and recreation
 programs have been met. Survey participants were asked to identify their desire for
 or support of 28 different facilities and 26 recreation programs. Weighted value of
 2.
- Importance ranking for facilities This is used as a factor of the importance allocated to a facility or program by the community. Each respondent was asked to identify the top four most important facilities and recreation programs. Weighted value of 4.
- Consultant and Steering Committee Evaluation
- Factor derived from the consultant and steering committee's evaluation of program and facility priority based on survey results, demographics, trends and overall community input. Weighted value of 4.

These weighted scores were then summed to provide an overall score and priority ranking for the system as a whole. The results of the priority ranking were tabulated into three categories: High Priority (1), Medium Priority (2), and Low Priority (3).

The combined total of the weighted scores for Community Unmet Needs, Community Importance and Consultant Evaluation is the total score based on which the Facility/Amenity and Program Priority is determined. **Figure 59** and **Figure 60** below depict the Facility/Amenity and Recreation Program Priority Rankings for the City of Durango.

Since this is a community-wide survey, it is obvious that amenities that benefit the widest demographic cross-sections of the community would tend to be ranked higher than those that serve a niche market. It is, therefore, typical in such assessments nationwide that broad categories, such as trails or neighborhood parks, tend to rank higher than individual facilities or programs.

9.1 FACILITY/AMENITY PRIORITY RANKINGS

Figure 60 shows that natural surface trails for hiking and biking, hard surface trails for bike and pedestrian and neighborhood parks were the top three facilities/amenities. These were followed by indoor fitness and exercise facilities, river recreation and ski and snowboarding areas.

Gentlemen:

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the Draft Environmental Assessment, Lake Nighthorse Recreation Plan. ("Draft EA"). Although the analysis of the proposed action is reasonably thorough, as more fully detailed below, the Draft EA fails to properly characterize the "no action" alternative as more fully detailed below.

As the Bureau correctly identifies,

NEPA requires evaluation of a No Action Alternative (40 CFR 1502.14). "No action" is generally interpreted as the resulting outcome if the proposed federal action, or its action alternatives, are not implemented. The No Action Alternative provides a baseline for comparison of the environmental effects associated with the action alternatives.

Draft EA at 15.

1

In characterizing the required "no action" alternative the Draft EA posits that, "Under the No Action Alternative, the reservoir area and area below the dam would remain closed to the public." *Id.* This does not accurately describe the "no action" outcome.

The current Lake Nighthorse Closure order was entered in 2003. As noted by Reclamation at the time,

Reclamation will be prohibiting all public access on Reclamation lands in and around Ridges Basin during construction of the Animas-La Plata Project. This is being done to protect the public

from construction activities and to protect the construction workforce from public activities such as discharging weapons.

68 Fed. Reg. 39970 (July 3, 2003) (Emphasis added). As the Bureau is aware it simply does not enjoy blanket authority to close federal lands to the public. The cited authority for the current closure order, 43 C.F.R. §423.3(b), only reserves to Reclamation the limited right to "close and restrict public access to Reclamation lands and Reclamation projects subject to this part for security or public safety reasons." With the conclusion of construction of Ridges Basin Dam and Lake Nighthorse Reservoir, the basis for the closure order no longer exists and it is unclear that Reclamation's purported current closure has any legal basis whatsoever.

Accordingly, properly construed, the "no action" alternative isn't that the reservoir area would be <u>closed</u> to the public, but rather that the reservoir area would be <u>open</u> to the public (and no recreation facilities would be constructed).

This failure to accurately characterize the "no action" alternative has meaningful public consequences and environmental impacts that should be disclosed in the final EA.

Importantly, the public interest in outdoor wildlife related recreation and hunting would be immediately expanded under the no action alternative. As the Bureau is aware, the Fish and Wildlife Coordination Act and its implementing regulations favor public access to public land for wildlife related activities including fishing and hunting.

In particular, 24 C.F.R. §24.4(i) provides:

- (i) Federal agencies of the Department of the Interior shall:
- (3) Provide for public use of Federal lands in accordance with State and Federal laws, and permit public hunting, fishing and trapping within statutory and budgetary limitations and in a manner compatible with the primary objectives for which the lands are administered.

(Emphasis added).

Because, with the conclusion of construction, the Bureau's current closure of ALP property has no legal basis, in order for it to prohibit hunting as identified

in the proposed action it must first comply with subsection (4) of 24 C.F.R. §24.4 which provides:

(4) For those Federal lands that are already open for hunting, fishing, or trapping, closure authority shall not be exercised without prior consultation with the affected States, except in emergency situations.

For the above stated reasons, the final EA should properly characterize the "no action" alternative as opening the reservoir for all uses not otherwise inconsistent with federal law. Moreover, because the proposed action does not purport to close Lake Nighthorse to lawful hunting activities, proper construction of the "no action" alternative leads to the conclusion that deferring a decision about future hunting at the Reservoir results in its being open until such time as the Bureau, consistent with 24 C.F.R. §24.4(i)(4) following proper consultation with the appropriate State and Tribal officials.

Please count me as one of those Durango area residents who is opposed to power boats on Lake Nighthorse. This is a relatively small lake that will be popular for hikers, those wanting to fish, simply paddle/row around the lake, or take in the scenery some other way.

Vallecito and Navajo Lakes are close by and appropriate for the large motor boats given the acreage of water. By contrast, Lake Nighthorse is not appropriate for such boats. I worry about noise, water, and general environmental pollution from the larger craft, any one of which can ruin the tranquility of being on the lake by its size and speed. Electric trolling motors and small hp gas engines (e.g., under 10hp) are appropriate.

Larger boats require marinas and other support which is not in the draft environmental assessment plan. If there is the demand in the future to revise water craft useage, it can be changed to reflect the public's will. I appreciate the desire of owners of motor boats to use state, tribal and federal funded 1 reservoirs, however, I am concerned that the actions taken to limit impact of motorized activity on air and water quality and noise levels in the study area will be difficult to enforce and will not be sufficient.

It is unfortunate that the Boat Ramp Grant and its requirements were accepted and implemented prior to the completion of the EA. It appears motorized boat use is a foregone conclusion. Given the small size of the reservoir I do not see how any agency could enforce the "no-wake" zone contemplated by the plan given 40 mph speed limits.

I would urge the Bureau to limit impact within the three alternatives listed as follows: 1.Limit motor size, noise level and speed as much as possible, 2. Expand the no-wake zone, and 3.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the Ridges Basin Reservoir Draft Assessment Plan. My wife (Marilyn S. Leftwich) and I live in close proximity to the reservoir in the Rafter J subdivision. In fact, we can view the reservoir from our home.

As an avid birder and member of the Durango Bird Club (DBC) I am eagerly awaiting access to this unique body of water that supports a home for many species of waterfowl and shore birds. In addition, the reservoir provides an important stop-over for many migrating species of birds.

In late December of 2015 I had the privilege, along with other select members of the DBC and under the supervision of a gentleman from the Bureau of Reclamation, to walk the road along the east side and record bird species for the Christmas Bird Count. This is an annual census of birds that takes place throughout the Western Hemisphere and is performed annually in the early Northern-hemisphere winter. The purpose is to provide population data for use in science, especially conservation biology.

Once access is available to the reservoir, it is my intention to regularly paddle the shoreline in a canoe and leisurely view and record the birds that I see. I am deeply concerned about the use of high-speed motorized power boats on this relatively small body of water. These boats will undoubtedly upset the waterfowl and shorebirds and disturb their mating, nesting and feeding behavioir. In addition, I will feel very vulnerable in a tipsy open canoe by the wakes that these high-speed boats will create. Furthermore, the noise of these high-speed boats will certainly disrupt the peace and quiet and mute the songs of birds that I will be venturing out to experience.

I just submitted a letter to the editor today before finding this public comments e-mail site. I copied it below. I hope an equitable solution can be found that will preserve this smaller lake for quiet, non-polluting activities. Thank you for your support.

I attended the first public meetings to discuss the recreational role Lake Nighthorse would serve in the La Plata County region. But the presenters made it clear that discussion of power boat exclusion was off the table. They received money from private concerns reportedly to build a dock. Acceptance of the money was contingent on a promise that powerboats would be allowed on the lake. I don't recall any public hearings prior to that decision. Some participants suggested limiting engine size to eliminate wakes and noise. I believe powerboat enthusiasts pointed out that modern engines could cruise at 10 mph without leaving wakes. The presenters justified their decision with a statement that public facilities should serve all of the public, and that was the end of the discussion.

Let's be clear. That statement distorted the debate. "Serving all of the public" means that all of the public are welcome to use the lake for its intended purpose. It does not mean that the public can do whatever they wish. You cannot, for example, take snowmobiles in certain areas. You cannot camp anywhere you wish in La Plata Canyon; you must do it in designated areas.

Judging from recent letters, not all of the public agrees with having powered boats on the lake and many people at those first meetings didn't either. Our area lacks a smaller, quiet lake for swimming and

fishing, kayaking, rowing, or day sailing in a small boat. Lake Highthorse fits the bill perfectly. Moreover, chances of infesting the lake with destructive mollusks from larger boats diminish. I appreciate the view of large boat users, but they already have two beautiful lakes available in the area, whereas others with different betests do not.

Public input should have been sought before accepting funding for the dock. A second poor judgement will not correct the first one. I believe BLM should return the money to the private interests so we can start again to discuss Lake Nighthorse usage. Use the concrete dock for some other purpose.

Prior to moving full time to Durango, I lived at Lake Arrowhead Ca for 25 years. Lake Arrowhead is a private lake owned by the property owners and managed by a lake association. The cost of the lake is managed by boat registration fees, private dock registration fees, etc., and I suggest you go on line to the Arrowhead Lake Association (ala-ca.org) and you can see everything used to manage this beautiful lake. It is successfully monitored and managed by required lake registration, passing a written test of the rules of the lake, and adherence to these rules. This is a smaller lake than Nighthorse (2.2 miles long, 14 miles of shoreline, 47,418 ac ft, 782 acres when full at 5160 elev.) but if offers features that pleases most. This lake is also the only water source for the homes in Lake Arrowhead. Other nearby homes/cabins have their own small wells/water districts.

The speed limit on the lake is 35 mph from 8am until dusk when it is no wake until morning (5mph). There is a no wake zone all around the lake marked by buoys so that swimmers, kayaks, and the like can enjoy quieter waters all day. Power boats are allowed up to I believe 26 ft in length. Jet skis are NOT allowed due to safety issues, water skis are. The reason it is a safe lake is due to the rules and that there is a lake patrol on duty all season long to keep not only rules followed but to help those in distress. There is also a fire boat that is accessed by the fire dept, when needed. Boat rentals are strictly not allowed - they tried it and there were too many people renting boats who didn't know what they were doing...."where are the brakes?".... One must keep in mind that people living near the lake chose to live there and expect a certain amount of engine noise from power boats, however, those who live in close proximity to Nighthorse may or may not be expecting the noise pollution that results and understandably may object to power boats. Water contamination can also be an issue.

IF properly managed and monitored all users of the lake can get along but with a much larger lake and possibly many more users it could quickly become chaotic and out of control. Another issue I see here is that anyone can put their boat on this lake (at least that is what I foresee) and there is no guarantee any type of order would be maintained unless some strict rules are mandated ahead of time and strictly enforced. I personally would like to see power boats continue to use Vallecito and Navajo and let Lake Nighthorse be the quiet and peaceful place it was before it became a lake. Another option that works at Lake Gregory in Crestline, Ca., a state owned man made lake, is they provide small rental boats with battery powered motors for cruising/fishing at low speeds and no noise, providing a quiet and peaceful atmosphere among the pines. No other boats are allowed but canoes, kayaks, swimmers, fishing, etc. is a great experience without the noise of power boats.

As a resident looking to use Lake Nighthorse as a future source of drinking water, I would ask planning bodies to consider the following:

Body-contact recreation (e.g., swimming, bathing, water skiing, wind surfing, and use of personal watercraft) should not be allowed on water bodies used as sources of public water supply. Where it is allowed to occur, it should be separated from the water intake by the greatest distance possible, usually at least a mile. This would be hard to do on a reservoir as small as Lake Nighthorse.

Non-body-contact water-based recreation, particularly the use of two-stroke carbureted gasoline engines that discharge exhaust into the water and the use of petroleum-powered vehicles and tools on the ice, should be discouraged.

1 These guidelines were developed to prevent contamination of public drinking water with coliform bacteria, gasoline, fuel additives, and oil.

The proponents of recreational use near or on Lake Nighthorse must be required to provide technical evidence supporting the claim that such activity will not adversely affect the water quality, or the public health of the water consumer served by this water supply. If their proposals for recreational use are inconsistent with this policy they should be rejected.

Where recreational uses of a drinking water source are being considered, the public health risks of this practice should be communicated to drinking water consumers by the decision makers, including plans for protection and enforcement designed to minimize the risk of contamination and degradation of water quality.

This letter is in response to your correspondence dated April 22, 2016, with an enclosed draft environmental assessment for the Lake Nighthorse Recreation Plan of the Animas La Plata Project.

The Hopi Tribe claims cultural affiliation to Ancestral Pueblo prehistoric cultural groups in this project area. The Hopi Cultural Preservation Office supports the identification and avoidance of prehistoric archaeological sites, and we consider the prehistoric archaeological sites of our ancestors to be "footprints" and Traditional Cultural Properties. Therefore, we appreciate the Bureau of Reclamation (BOR)'s continuing solicitation of our input and your efforts to address our concerns.

The Hopi Cultural Preservation Office has reviewed the enclosed draft environmental assessment and we note the Proposed Action would result in no direct effects to cultural resources from initial development, while alternative 1 would result in adverse effects to 12 sites and alternative 2 may effect up to 170 cultural resource sites remaining in the project area.

We note and support the comments and concerns of the Ute Mountain Ute and Southern Ute Tribes in Appendix A Comment Resolution Table for the Animas-La Plata Stakeholder Group Review of the Preliminary Draft Environmental Assessment including:

there should never be any recreation on Lake Nighthorse and the area should be protected and valued as an important part of these lands and the people that have occupied these lands since human occupation first began.

We appreciate that the BOR agrees that the "cultural resources present are significant and need protection" and implementation of a cultural resources management plan yet to be developed in consultation with the Tribes "will address cultural resource protection through

preconstruction surveys, avoidance, mitigation and long term monitoring." However, we do not consider mitigation to be protection and we are aware of mitigation already conducted for the Animas La Plata Protect, including the disturbance of numerous human remains.

In our enclosed letter on the Animas La Plata Project dated April 22, 2013, regarding three sites in the Ridges Basin that were being adversely effected by Lake Nighthorse, we stated we understood 109 prehistoric sites have been identified within one mile of these sites and asked if these sites will also be adversely effected by the development of recreational facilities. In our enclosed letter dated October 20, 2014 we reviewed the draft Ridges Basin Cultural resources Management Plan and requested continuing consultation on the plan and its implementation. Our enclosed letters dated September 17 and December 2, 2015 cite sites that were destroyed by previous projects.

We have been under the belief that the primary purpose of the Animas La Plata Project is to fulfill historical promises made by the United States government to the Ute Tribes. The United States government has made and continues to make the ruins and graves of our ancestors its Monuments and Recreation Areas.

Therefore, we have supported the Ute Tribes throughout the Animas La Plata Project. And therefore we support the No Action Alternative in this environmental assessment and recommend the BOR fully address their comments and concerns and accept their recommendations.

In a letter dated April 22, 2013, the Hopi Cultural Preservation Office reviewed the Testing Plan for three sites in the Ridges Basin, described as Basketmaker III/Pueblo I seasonal habitations that are being adversely affected by the Animas La Plata Project's Lake Nighthorse. We stated we understood Site 5PL172 has been previously adversely affected by a gas pipeline and previous surface and recent test excavations, for which a report has not yet been completed. We also stated we understood Site 5LP173 has also been subjected to surface collections. We further stated we understood Site 5LP238 has been subjected to previous excavations in 1967 by the Fort Lewis College Archaeological Field School for which a report was never completed, and 2004 by SWCA, and repeatedly surface collected. Fragments of human remains of 23 individuals were recovered from 5PL238 in 1967 and have been claimed for repatriation by the Hopi Tribe for reburial. An additional individual was disturbed by the 2004 excavations and has been reburied by the Pueblo of Acoma.

We understand that Reclamation permitted Fort Lewis College Archaeological Field School to implement the Testing Plan at these three sites in highly accessible and vulnerable areas to identify the nature and extent of subsurface deposits, mitigate adverse effects of erosion and visitation, and evaluate future effects from the development of recreational facilities.

There are 109 prehistoric sites, including these three, that have been identified within one mile of the project area, and we asked if these three sites are in highly accessible and vulnerable areas and have been impacted by visitation, won't the other sites within a mile of the project area also be adversely affected by the development of recreational facilities?

In a letter dated June 24, 2013, we stated we appreciated Dr. Jelinek's May 31st e-mail correspondence in response to our letter and understood that these three sites are of immediate concern due to their proximity to the main access road and shoreline, and that the shoreline will be monitored. We also stated we appreciated the Amendment adding stipulations for the monitoring and completion of archaeological testing.

We have now reviewed the enclosed End-of-Fieldwork Report of Archaeological Testing and understand that no subsurface features were encountered at sites 5LP172 and 5LP173, described as limited activity areas, that are now considered National Register ineligible. We note that the report recommends archaeological monitoring if these sites are to be impacted by construction.

Site 5LP238 is described as a habitation site with features including four pit structures, a series of jacal rooms and a midden, at which over 4,500 surface artifacts were collected, and that is a Traditional Cultural Property considered National Register eligible. The report states that it is likely that artifacts and possibly additional burials will continue to be uncovered through erosion because of the steep slope and reservoir, and recommends that the site be avoided and the open pithouse be backfilled.

Therefore, we request continuing consultation on this project. Please provide us with a copy of the environmental assessment for the recreation plan in which we understand all action plans will potentially affect cultural resources for review and comment. Please also provide us with a copy of the monitoring report if sites 5LP172 and or 5LP173 are impacted by construction and a copy of any further actions proposed at site 5LP238.

Thank you for your letter to Chairman Taylor and the Hopf Cultural Preservation Office dated April 28, 2003, regarding tribal participation in cultural resources management for the Animas-La Plata project, and the Bureau of Reclamation (Reclamation)'s May 1, 2003, Memorandum regarding discovery of Native American Graves Protection Act (NAGPRA) items.

The Hopi Cultural Preservation Office understands that the Ute Mountain Ute Tribe has contracted with Reclamation, under an agreement with the Southern Dte Indian Tribe, to manage the cultural resources investigations of the Autmas-La Plata project. We also understand that SWCA, Inc. began excavations in the summer of 2002 under a contract to the Ute Mountain Ute Tribe, and that cultural resources in the project area include 52 ancient Pueblom archaeological sites, 34 of which will be directly impacted.

We appreciate that previous consultations and other resembly Reclamation have indicated that ancient Paebloan habitation sites scheduled for data recovery may also be identified as Hopi Traditional Cultural Properties, and that Reclamation and the Ute Mountain Ute Tribe would like our input as to the treatment of Traditional Cultural Properties found within the project area. Therefore, we look forward to being contacted by SWCA. Ethnographer Ms. Maxine Selections to confirm the Hopi Tribe's involvement in the Animas-La Plata Project, and make arrangements for further consultation regarding the treatment of Traditional Cultural Properties.

As you indicate, the Hopi Cultural Preservation Office's primarily concerns regarding the Animas-La Plata Project are with NAGPRA issues and procedures. To date, we have been notified pursuant to the Plan of Action of four human remains discoveries in the Eastern Site Cluster, described as a community of Pueblo I habitations, and that it is apparent that additional NAGPRA items will be encountered during the course of excavations in the Eastern Site Cluster. We have reviewed Programmatic Agreement and Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act Plan of Action, and wish to assist you in fulfilling the Bureau of Reclamation's responsibility to identify cultural resources, in addition to identifying potential impacts to them, so this project adequately addresses adverse impacts to cultural resources.

Hopi clans migrated to and settled in areas throughout southwestern Colorado before migrating to and settling on the Hopi Mesas. The Hopi Tribe considers our ancestral villages, referred to as archaeological sites, to be Hopi Traditional Cultural Places. Other Hopi Traditional Cultural Places associated with our ancestral and modern Villages include shrines, trails, rock markings, and traditional gathering places. Hopi people consider prehistoric archaeological sites and isolated occurrences to be the "footprints" of our ancestors, and we do not consider our ancestral sites to be "abandoned,"

Intensive Hopi Traditional Cultural Properties studies and ethno-history research funded by the Bureau of Reclamation is needed to fully identify Hopi interests and needs in the Animas-La Plata Project. Site visits to area of effect will be requested by the Hopi Cultural Preservation Patrick J. Schumacher April 11, 2002 Page 2

Office to fully identify Hopi interests. This is necessary because a Hopi clan member from a clan that migrated through the project area may be able to identify Traditional Cultural Properties, including clan shrines, at prehistoric sites in this project area.

To discuss the Programmatic Agreement and Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act Plan of Action, and reburial of human remains culturally affiliated with the Hopi Tribe as close as possible to the places from which they will be excavated, the Hopi Cultural Preservation Office invites Warren Hurley to an administrative meeting.

I would like to submit a comment on the Lake Nighthorse management plan.

I understand that the Wallop-Breaux funding requires gas powered motors be allowed on the lake. I think that the size of the motors and the speed allowed should be consistent with a quieter, no wake lake.

I would like consideration given to the following:

1 1) The small size of the lake. If an area of approximately 1,000 acres is used for motorized recreation, many conflicts will occur due to fast speed users in close proximity to quiet, slow users. I sailed for several years at Boyd Lake State Park in Loveland, Colorado. That lake had a 1,700 acre surface. My small (14 foot) sailboat was difficult to sail on the lake because the motorized boats did not slow down around non-motorized users.

2) The residential areas surrounding the lake will be affected by noise.

3) Other local lakes are available for those who wish to use faster speeds for recreation. Navajo Reservoir, Vallecito Reservoir, and McPhee Reservoir are all large enough to be used for high speed recreation.

2 4) The Bodo family intended for the area to be in a conservation trust, to protect the values for wildlife in perpetuity. Respect for their wishes will best be served by a guieter, no wake lake.

I hope that Lake Nighthorse will be managed in a way to preserve the lake as the clean and quiet beauty that it is now.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment.

Five years ago, I sat through exhaustive hearings on the issue of appropriate usage for Lake Nighthorse. More than 2/3 of the people present were in favor of a non motorized lake, citing the following reasons:

- Uniqueness. We have Vallecito and Navajo and McPhee all in easy, motorized reach. We have no other lakes easily accessible to the public that offer a nature-based, non motorized opportunity.
 - It would also potentially take some of the pressure off of the North-of-Durango Animas River stretch from Oxbow to 33rd, where countless tubers go to just cool off. LNH is an artificial reservoir, not a much used wildlife corridor unnecessarily impacted by recreational tubers.
- Size. The surface area of LNH, approx 1000 acres, is such that any motorized vehicle, at any other than <5 mph "no wake" speed, will directly impact all surface areas of the lake. A boat going 40 mph - the average for waterskiers - would significantly disrupt all other users, including fishermen, SUPers, kayakers, tubers, and swimmers.
- Potential profitability. Bruce D'Andrea and others involved with competitive rowing made an excellent
 case that LNH could offer Durango/La Plata the same panache / training reputation that the much vaunted
 and very controversial and expensive "repairs" to the Animas River have offered. This could be a world
 class training facility.
- Bio-contamination. Motorized vessels, dipping first into one zebra-filled and quagga-filled mussel lake
 after another, introduce real risk to this important water supply. Why would we risk that? Instead of paying
 for an inspection station, staffed FT, for motor boats who want to be on Lake Powell one weekend and
 LNH the next, why not limit the number and availability of craft? It would save money, and it might well
 save an important water supply.
- 1 understand that Jim Isgar committed boat ramp funding and thus, motorized crafts through Wallop Breaux funding. Fine. Make these motorized crafts electric motors, as small as possible, preferably owned by or confined only to LNH, not trailered from lake to lake.

I'm from Maine. I grew up on the second largest lake in the state, Sebago. Approximately 200 square MILES, approximately 350 feet deep. In the '60s it was glorious. Today, without regulation but with a whole lot of users, it is algae filled and pretty nasty.

Why can't we keep a few places less developed? You know, for our grandchildren?

To whom it may concern,

Durango has proven very effective at managing recreation for its residents & visitors and in 2012, the City of Durango Parks and Recreation Department received the National Gold Medal Award for Excellence in the Field of Park and Recreation Management. Durango's success in managing recreation for the community has built strong trust & support from its residents.

The Durango Parks and Recreation Department has the expertise to manage recreation at Lake Nighthorse, but it needs community support in order to be effective in this effort. Accordingly, the Parks and Recreation Advisory (PARA) Board provides these comments on the Draft Environmental Assessment (Draft EA) dated March 2016.

The PARA Board consists of residents empowered by the City to review improvements and provide recommendations for any new areas developed for recreation to enhance the natural beauty of the City and provide for the enjoyment, health, and general welfare of its residents. This Board finds that there is strong community backing to open Lake Nighthorse to the public for recreation in a manner consistent with the features outlined in Action Alternative 1-2011 Recreation Plan and the Proposed Action – 2014 Recreation Plan.

In April 2011 the community developed a comprehensive plan of recreational features at Lake Nighthorse that are outlined in the Draft EA as Action Alternative 1 – 2011 Recreation Plan. The recreational features outlined in this alternative are consistent with the themes in the City of Durango Parks, Open Space, Trails and

Recreation Master Plan (POST Plan) which was completed in April 2010. The POST Plan established these recreational/organizational themes for the community:

- · Trails Connecting People to Places
- Open Space Preserve & Care for Special Places
- · Parks: Provide Quality Areas for Community Gatherings and Activities
- · Recreation: Provide Quality and Diverse Recreation Programs
- · Facilities: Provide Quality Facilities for Recreation Activities
- · Organizational: Strategic Use of Resources

Furthermore, the Action Alternative I Recreation Plan, the Proposed Action – 2014 Recreation Plan and the City of Durango POST Plan themes correlate well with the Department of Interior mission areas below:

Mission Area 1: Celebrating and Enhancing America's Great Outdoors

- · Goal 1: Protect America's Landscapes
- · Goal 2: Protect America's Cultural and Heritage Resources
- · Goal 3: Enhance Recreation and Visitor Experience
 - Enhance the enjoyment and appreciation of our natural and cultural heritage

- · Goal 1: Meet Our Trust, Treaty, and Other Responsibilities to American Indians

- Durango is prepared to manage recreation in a manner that achieves the guiding principles of the Draft EA. The PARA Board therefore requests that the features in Action Alternative I 2011 Recreation Plan be included in the Record of Decision. Below are a number of reasons supporting our recommendations:
 - Durango wants to 'connect people to places' by creating a welcoming environment for the community at Lake Nighthorse.
 - 2. Americans' interest in nature and nature-based recreation is growing. Of the top outdoor recreational activities, nearly 75% involve viewing, photographing, identifying, visiting, or otherwise observing elements of nature—flowers, trees, water areas & shorelines, natural scenery, birds, other wildlife, nature exhibits, and wilderness (wildlands generally). In recent years, the growth in viewing and photographing plants and natural

- scenery has been most rapid closely followed by viewing, photographing, and identifying wildlife and birds. The increase in the observation and study of nature is a very healthy trend that reflects rising and widespread interest in the future of natural resources, conservation, and public lands.
- 3. Cultural resources, including historic buildings, sites and museums, can contribute to the overall functioning of society by helping individual ethnic groups embrace their cultural identities, and by helping residents understand and appreciate our states' diversity. These historic sites help visitors immerse themselves in other cultures and create places for sharing ethnic food, events, languages and traditions.
- 4. Outdoor recreation plays a significant role in American lives. It provides physical challenges and well-being, helps develop lifelong skills, provokes interest and inquiry, inspires wonder and awe of the natural world, and often provides an alternative to daily routines. Recreation contributes greatly to the physical, mental, and spiritual health of individuals, bonds family and triends, and instills pride in natural and cultural heritage.
- 5. Studies document the overall health benefits, both physical and mental and demonstrate how physical activity helps to control obesity, boost the immune system, diminish the risk of disease and increase life expectancy. Like improvements to our physical well-being, many studies show that participation in recreational activities is an important contributor to mental health and quality of life. Parks, trails and historical sites provide excellent inducements to physical activity and our scenic views and waterways encourage active visitation. Parks and recreation can also aid in reducing depression, relieving stress, improving self-esteem and personal growth.
- Studies also outline the social benefits of recreation, such as strengthening communities, promoting social bonds and supporting youth. Participating in recreation activities helps develop our youth, improve their education and deters them from negative behaviors.
- 7. Recreation opportunities and parks are essential for strengthening and maintaining a healthy community. Proximity to parks and recreation facilities leads to safer, cleaner neighborhoods, volunteerism, stewardship and creates a livelier community atmosphere. Social bonds are improved when families recreate together and when seniors and individuals with disabilities are actively engaged in recreation activities. Recreation and park facilities help promote social bonds by uniting families, encouraging cultural sensitivity, and developing social consciousness among our youth.
- 8. Landscapes in the West are often associated with the sense of place of people who live there, people who wish they lived there, and people who go there for outdoor recreation. Part of sense of place and place meaning is wrapped into the symbolism of these landscapes, especially the symbolism of parks, monuments, forests, lakes and wildlife areas. In this increasingly

fast-paced world, park and recreation lands, facilities and programs provide the opportunity for something we desire most - the chance to take a breath and to relax - to refresh our mind, body and spirit. The aggregate impact of these health and social benefits makes parks and recreation one of the most cost-effective public services available to decision makers.

- Public policy implications with this growing interest in nature-based recreation include:
 - a) Communities can convert public interest in nature into active support of and engagement in conservation of natural landscapes and water resources.
 - b) Outdoor activities can contribute to better physical conditioning, as well as better emotional health. There is an opportunity to use interest in nature as a means of stimulating greater physical activity. Trails and wildlife observation sites can be designed to require some physical effort while still accommodating participants with disabilities.
- More than half of recreational visits to Lake Nighthorse are expected from people who live within 50 miles of the recreation site. Accordingly the primary population served by Lake Nighthorse will be La Plata County residents. Some relevant population numbers for La Plata County and Lake Nighthorse:
 - a) La Plata County has population of 53,284 with Durango population of 17,557 (2013); Native Americans making up ~1000 Native Americans at FLC each semester & ~5% of City residents
 - b) Southern Ute Tribe has La Plata County population of 695 and overall population of 9,592 (2000 census)
 - Ute Mountain Ute tribe has overall 2,060 enrolled members across Montezuma County, La Plata County, and San Juan County (2000 census)

Durango is supremely qualified to manage a broad recreational venue at Lake Nighthorse. Our community has a high level of cultural awareness and well-established sense of stewardship. In order to be successful managing recreation at Lake Nighthorse, Durango requires a recreational plan that inspires community support. Action Alternative 1 and the Proposed Action most closely aligns with the communities stated interest and the PARA Board would like to ensure the specific recommendations below are permitted within the Record of Decision:

- Ensure the Action Alternative I recreational features are included in the decision in order to make Lake Nighthorse an attractive site for healthy community & family connections.
- 2. Commit to the planned implementation, depending on the availability of funds, of the following key elements in the final decision:

- a) Swim Beach
- b) Day Use & Picnic Area
- c) Natural & Hard Surface Trail(s)
- d) Trailhead(s)
- e) Informational Displays
- f) Campground(s)
- g) Non-motorized Boat Launch
- h) Breakwater(s) (as required)
- Develop interpretive displays that recognize and appreciate the place value that American Indians associate with the Lake Nighthorse region
- Reevaluate motorized use, especially related to noise, wakes and speed limits to encourage and inspire appreciation of nature based activity at Lake Nighthorse.
 - Explore winter season human powered recreation (hiking, cross country skiing, etc.) in order to support year round health and fitness
 - Establish Multi-Modal hard-surface trail access between the Animas River
 Trail to the Lake Nighthorse Recreational Footprint to encourage community
 health and fitness in travelling to and from Lake Nighthorse.

Regarding the proposed action alternatives for the recreational use of Lake Nighthorse. Personal comments from Priscilla Sherman, 560 West Fork Rd. Durango, CO 81303 (Located 3 miles from the lake).

Water Quality for municipal use:

It is my understanding that the **original intent for this reservoir was for municipal and irrigation**. With that in mind, I am not sure how it made sense to commit to the funding for a boat ramp, thus committing the use of motorized crafts, through the Wallop Breaux funding, which also would require more funds to be acquired to treat the water for municipal use.

In October of 2015 I purchased a home in the Rafter J development in a close proximity of LNH. At the time I leaned that we would eventually be getting our water supply from LNH, later I learned about the allowance of motorized crafts allowed on the lake. The idea of drinking water that had to be treated for bio contaminants greatly concerns me. Can the city guarantee the municipal water will be free from contaminates, and hazardous spills? Do they have an emergency management plans in place? I understand that we are already committed to motorized crafts, but the size and type of engines is still negotiable. I would like to request that only electric motors be allowed an no wake speeds.

Size of LNH

Given the size of the LNH and the close proximity of other larger areas, Vallecito and Navajo and McPhee, that offer opportunities for boaters. I believe LNH should be a "NO Wake" lake. The proposed 40mph speed limit is much to fast for SUPers, canoes and kayakers to be safe in this size of a lake. It would also cause more erosion along the shoreline. Alternatives: LNH offers an excellent opportunity for local businesses to provide water sports training in kayaking, rowing and non motorized boating. What a great idea for our local youth. What a great way to reduce the carbon footprint and reduce the use of fossil fuels. I believe that local non motorized boating community and businesses in Durango would greatly profit from unique opportunities that LNH has to offer without high speed motorized crafts being allowed. I am sure that it would be less for our law enforcement agencies to watch over. Please consider "No Wake" for LNH.

Law enforcement, Rescue and Environmental Protection

It concerns me greatly that the City of Durango will have a difficult time sustaining the funds it would require to police, and maintain the facilities proposed. Included in this concern is the distance fire, and rescue crews would have to come to attend to injured boaters, and attend potential wildfires. 1 The final plan for Lake Nighthorse should fall somewhere between the Proposed Action – 2014 Recreation Plan and the Action Alternative 1 – 2011 Recreation Plan.

MOTORIZED BOATS, OR NOT

2 Lake Nighthorse is small as compared to more massive lakes in the Four Corners region such as nearby Navajo and Vallecito lakes, as well as Lake Powell—and these three lakes are open to motorized boat recreation. I do not quarrel with the various estimates of visitor days exceeding 100,000 per year. But given the attractions of these other lakes, Lake Nighthorse will not have a significant amount of non-local area visitors, excepting visitors coming to the Durango area for already existing attractions. Since most Lake Nighthorse visitors will be locals or would have planned a local visit without the attraction of Lake Nighthorse, there will be no significant positive impact to the local economy from development of the lake for recreation.

In the tradition of outdoors enjoyment by those that live locally, the majority of visitors want non-motorized water recreational opportunities including swimming, kayaking, use of other floatation devices such as inflatable tubes, fishing, etc. in a scenic, quiet lake not polluted with gasoline. And in particular, a quality public swimming beach is sorely lacking in the immediate Durango area.

1 There is little local economic benefit from allowing gasoline powered motor boats or other motorized recreation floating machines. Non-local visitors are much more likely to haul their boats and other floating machines to Navajo or Vallecito Lakes or other larger lakes such as Lake Powell.

I find it unfortunate to learn that a boat ramp is already built and funded with state motor boat tax revenues, supposedly requiring that gasoline motor boats would be granted use of the lake. Alternatives should be explored to make an exception by prohibiting gasoline powered boats. But if that is not feasible, then: (1) a much lower maximum speed limit than the proposed 40 mph speed limit should be imposed, such as 10 mph and/or (2) a very low limit of daily gasoline powered boats on the lake should be required, e.g. no more than 10 boats.

In general, I agree with the comments submitted by Bruce Rodman, with possible modification. I should note that I am the owner of a 14 ft fishing boat with a 40 horsepower 4-cycle motor. I sue that boat on various lakes including Navajo, McPhee and Powell. However, I do not believe that motors of that size should be allowed on Lake Nighthorse. Given the relatively small size of Nighthorse, the speed, noise and wake of my boat would be disturbing to kayakers, boarders, swimmers, and fishermen. In my humble opinion, if fishermen need motorized boats to make use of Lake Nighthorse, those boats should be limited to smaller motors, probably no greater than 5 or 10 horsepower, and preferably 4-cycle only, as they produce less pollution than the 2-cycle motors. Understanding that the primary purpose of Lake Nighthorse is to provide various entities with water, I, like most Durangoans, are anxious to see the secondary purpose of providing recreational opportunities come to fruition after lengthy delays.

My preference is for a compromise between the Proposed Action – 2014 Recreation Plan and the Action Alternative 1 – 2011 Recreation Plan for Lake Nighthorse; it is the most beneficial for the most users.

MOTORIZED BOATS

My personal opinion was against the use of gasoline-powered motorized boats on the scenic and pristine Lake Nighthorse. It is unlikely that Lake Nighthorse will be a target destination for motorboat tourism in light of the other larger lakes in the area such as Navajo and Vallecito, and even Lake Powell, all of which offer motorized boat recreation. Because of the attractions of these other lakes, Lake Nighthorse likely will have little non-local area visitors. Lake Nighthorse visitors will primarily be locals and "incidental tourists" who visit while already here for other reasons. Thus, any fiscal impact to the local economy from development of the lake for motor boats will be minimal. That being said, I understand the prevailing desire from the 2010 meetings was that all recreational uses be permitted at Lake Nighthorse.

To honor that desire for the outdoors enjoyment by those who live in the area, most users also want non-motorized water recreational opportunities including swimming, kayaking, other floatation devices such as inflatable boats, fishing, etc. at this scenic, quiet lake with as little gasoline pollution as possible. A quality public swimming beach is lacking in the immediate Durango area. Pollution by gasoline powered motorized boats should be mitigated by lowering the maximum speed limit below the proposed 40 mph to 20 mph, and/or a limit of daily motorized boats to e.g. no more than 20 boats.

HIKING TRAILS

Public comments from 2010 indicated a strong desire for hiking trails at Lake Nighthorse. Residents of La Plata and surrounding counties (including in New Mexico) and visitors to this area love to hike. Providing the hiking trails as proposed in the Alternative 1 2011 plan, including the loop around the entire lake and the ADA trail, should absolutely be included in

the final plan, not just as a "possibility" but as a <u>plan</u>. Expanding trails available at the lower elevations near Durango would be a significant addition to local hiking opportunities with very low environmental impact. This would also provide more hiking opportunities in the immediate Durango vicinity to visitors.

CAMPING, PICNIC DAY USE AND OTHER RECREATION

ONE campground (rather than 3 campgrounds proposed in Alternative 1-2011 Plan), the swimming beach, picnic areas and other recreational uses as otherwise proposed in the 2011 Plan should all be included in the final plan to offer multiple recreational uses beyond motorized boating; not merely as a "possibility" but a plan.



Dear Mr. Liff,

Thank you for extending the comment period for the Lake Nighthorse Draft Recreation Master Plan. I am writing to express my interest in keeping Lake Nighthorse a quiet, no-wake lake.

When the original plan for recreation on Lake Nighthorse was released in 2011, it included infrastructure and guidelines for motorized use of the lake. At the time, I thought the lake would be managed by the State of Colorado and they had guidelines that drove recreational use of the reservoirs they managed, such as the state park near Crawford.

When the state of Colorado and the BLM declined management of Lake Nighthorse recreation, I thought the Southern Ute Tribe might step forward and manage recreation. It has not. Now, it seems, the responsibility for a recreation plan has fallen on the city of Durango with its limited resources.

With that in mind, I believe a quiet lake is the proper solution. It would minimize the expense of initial infrastructure to accommodate motorized craft, including a gas station and a more sophisticated boat ramp. In addition, a quiet lake would require fewer ongoing expenses for maintenance and staffing the facilities.

Non-motorized and low-impact boating would allow more basic launch facilities, such as a modest boat ramp. It would provide for popular local activities such as kayaking, stand-up paddle boarding, swimming and canoeing. It would more closely reflect the interests of the local boating community in Durango. Ongoing maintenance and staffing costs for such simple facilities would be less of a burden on the Durango tax-base, also.

For boaters interested in water skiing and speed boating, it is only a short drive to Lake Vallecito or Navajo Lake where there are ample opportunities for such activities. The size of Lake Nighthorse does not really warrant the use of motorized craft with, perhaps, the exception of quiet electric motors.

Please don't burden the city of Durango with the long-term expense of maintaining the more expensive infrastructure required to support motorized boating recreation. Make the recreation plan for Lake Nighthorse reflect the needs and interests of the local Durango community who are now assuming the responsibility and expense of providing recreation at this lake.

- 3. If gasoline engines are allowed, their power rating should NOT EXCEED 6 horse power and be 4 cycle only.
- 4. The entire lake should be managed as a NO WAKE lake.
- 5. There should be a maximum number of gasoline powered boats allowed on the lake at a time.
- Finally, in order to enhance the experience of most users, Overnight camping SHOULD NOT BE ALLOWED.

1 After reading through the guiding principles under the Recreation and Management section of the Lake Nighthorse conceptual plan, I feel motorized activity is in direct contradiction to many of these:

2 Guiding Principles

- Protection of cultural resources.
- Ensure compliance with all applicable local, state, and federal development standards and environmental regulations and requirements.
- · Monitor and protect water quality.
- Honor Brunot Agreement/Treaty rights.
- Promote ecological sustainability and preserve wildlife habitat.
- Provide ongoing care, stewardship, law enforcement, and patrol the property consistent with City parks and open space areas.
- · Provide improvements within the development area to enable public access to recreational amenities.
- Ensure that recreation management and development does not adversely impact the primary purpose of the ALP Project for municipal and industrial water supply.

I grew up on lakes and rivers in the Midwest. I understand the appeal of motorized use and the tax dollars it could generate. I do however, find it odd that spewing gasoline, oil, and its byproducts into municipal/industrial water supply is promoting water quality, ecological sustainability or helping to preserve wildlife habitat. With its close proximity to Durango, I fear it could turn into a congested reservoir much like some I have experienced near Grand Junction and Summit County.

This reservoir has the potential to be a peaceful place, where people could kayak, swim, canoe, and experience nature without the noise and congestion of motorized boats. I do not see a designated long-distance swimming path in any of the current proposals.

1 If a designated long-distance swimming path is not explicitly included in the planning process, then (as at Vallecito and Navajo)

it won't be safe to do a distance swim in the reservoir.

While a creation of engineering, Lake Nighthorse is a scenic gem of a modesty sized and quiet lake nestled in forested hills just south of Durango, Colorado. While its primary purpose is to provide various entities with water, I concur that a secondary purpose should be fulfilled to provide recreational opportunities sooner rather than later.

The final plan for Lake Nighthorse should fall somewhere between the Proposed Action -2014 Recreation Plan and the Action Alternative 1-2011 Recreation Plan.

MOTORIZED BOATS, OR NOT

Lake Nighthorse is small as compared to more massive lakes in the Four Corners region such as nearby Navajo and Vallecito lakes, as well as Lake Powell—and these three lakes are open to motorized boat recreation. I do not quarrel with the various estimates of visitor days exceeding 100,000 per year. But given the attractions of these other lakes, Lake Nighthorse will not have a significant amount of non-local area visitors, excepting visitors coming to the Durango area for already existing attractions. Since most Lake Nighthorse visitors will be locals or would have planned a local visit without the attraction of Lake Nighthorse, there will be no significant positive impact to the local economy from development of the lake for recreation.

In the tradition of outdoors enjoyment by those that live locally, the majority of visitors want non-motorized water recreational opportunities including swimming, kayaking, use of other floatation devices such as inflatable tubes, fishing, etc. in a scenic, quiet lake not polluted with gasoline. And in particular, a quality public swimming beach is sorely lacking in the immediate Durango area.

There is little local economic benefit from allowing gasoline powered motor boats or other motorized recreation floating machines. Non-local visitors are much more likely to haul their boats and other floating machines to Navajo or Vallecito Lakes or other larger lakes such as Lake Powell.

I find it unfortunate to learn that a boat ramp is already built and funded with state motor boat tax revenues, supposedly requiring that gasoline motor boats would be granted use of the lake. Alternatives should be explored to make an exception by prohibiting gasoline powered boats. But if that is not feasible, then: (1) a much lower maximum speed limit than the proposed 40 mph speed limit should be imposed, such as 10 mph and/or (2) a very low limit of daily gasoline powered boats on the lake should be required, e.g. no more than 10 boats.

HIKING TRAILS

Residents of La Plata and surrounding counties (including in New Mexico) love to hike. Providing additional hiking trails such as proposed in the 2011 plan absolutely should be included in the final plan either at the start or if not, for future construction by organizations such as Trails 2000. Expanding trails available at the lower elevations near Durango would be a significant addition to local hiking opportunities that have very low environmental impact. This would also provide more hiking opportunities in the immediate Durango vicinity to visitors.

CAMPGROUNDS

Since the State of Colorado declined to manage the Lake Nighthorse recreational area and given that there are plenty of other government and commercial campgrounds nearby to Durango, there is little need to add campgrounds to the Lake Nighthorse grounds as was proposed in the 2011 plan.

We will second the comments of our neighbors, Marcey Olojas, John Wolgamott and Bob Rosenberg who voiced our common desires for a guiet lake which would environmentally friendly to the nearby residential areas and the wildlife populations that have a sanctuary in the "Bodo Wildlife Area."

The purpose for the original acquisition of the land and creation of the lake was understood to be to create a reservoir for collection of clean water for human consumption. Heavy unrestricted use of the lake by motorized watercraft will inevitably produce high levels of noise, air and water pollution and create the potential for introduction of destructive Zebra Mussels. This seems inconsistent with both the best interests of the environment and the original purposes for creation of the lake. If gasoline powered watercraft were not permitted, our small lake could become a unique community prize, a "natural jewel" of peace and tranquility for family picnicking, fishing, canoeing, sailing and other low impact watersports as opposed to becoming "just another lake" like every other lake in the area.

For your additional information, my wife and I attended the planning meetings in 2010 and early 2011 that were supposedly to seek "community input" regarding plans for the lake's development and future use. These "planning meetings" proved to be pretty much a farce. The conduct of the meetings by the consultant group could probably best be described as a process designed for "guided discovery" whereby those of us who were attending could be led to the result the consultant group wanted to reach. Near the end it became clear the consultant group's concept was to open the lake up to the widest range of possible uses, or to use the

consultants' term, transform this small lake into a "destination" which would attract tourists from outside of our area. The practicality and economics of the consultants' grandiose development scheme never seemed to have been adequately considered – which is probably part of the reason this project has been stalemated for the past five years.

I found that there were several different schools of thought represented among the attendees at these early "planning meetings." The power boating enthusiasts seemed to advocate that there be no limits on boat size, horse power, or the use of jet skis. Another group wanted more restricted uses with limitations on types of watercraft (e.g. no jet skis) and limitations on the size and horsepower of any motorized watercraft permitted on the lake. Another group wanted to preserve the natural beauty and tranquility of the lake's setting as much as possible by excluding gasoline powered watercraft entirely. Groups representing these different viewpoints regarding the use of the lake were told to meet and come up with their alternate plans for development.

As those attending the meetings had already been told that we were stuck with the fact that motorized watercraft could not be prohibited because some pre-development commitments had been made to third parties in exchange for the financing of the construction of a boat ramp, I opted to meet with the group that would try to work out a plan for moderate motorized watercraft usage. Our group met and drafted a proposed set of "Rules and Regulations" to govern the lake. Much to my surprise when we returned for the next meeting, I found the consultants totally unwilling to even permit any discussion of the proposals we had drafted. I realized at that point that the consultant group had its own agenda and that further participation in the meetings was going to be wasted effort.

Several months later, I was contacted by Ken Wright of the Durango Herald who was conducting a survey of public opinion regarding the progress of Lake Knighthorse planning. A copy of my 6/29/11 email response to Ken appears below. The attachment to the email is a copy of the draft of our study group's "Proposed Rules for Lake Knighthorse Use." These rules which were designed to permit moderate and safe use of the lake by motorized watercraft. Should you have any questions regarding the thinking behind any of the suggested rules, please let me know.

Ken,

We appreciated your recent article concerning the Lake Nighthorse development plan. By coincidence, I had just drafted an email to you on the subject when I received your latest email with information concerning the poll, also coincidentally an idea I was suggesting to get a true assessment of community opinion.

I have been seething about the way the thing was handled ever since the last meeting I attended. This was not the meeting where the "final plan" was revealed, but what was supposed to been a working meeting. I was part of a group that was supposed to be charged with developing proposals relating to a more natural, lower impact, plan for the lake. We met over the Christmas holiday period and outlined a proposal that was pretty much responsive to all of the issues that had been raised in the previous several meetings. (A copy of our outline, "Proposed Rules for Lake Nighthorse Use," is attached.)

In essence, our proposal was for a "quieter lake," one that permitted family picnicking along the shores, swimming, sailing, kayaking, canoeing, scuba diving and fishing, but one where boats would be limited to 15 m.p.h. with no wakes near docks and swimming areas. When I arrived at the January meeting, I discovered that the die was already cast. Much to my astonishment, the "kid" who was the consulting organization's so-called "moderator" for the group would not even permit discussion of our outline of alternatives. I was immediately intercepted by a female member of the consulting group and asked "who" authorized our group to meet, then only grudgingly allowed me to distribute copies to the attendees at the table. Later, one of the attendees pointed out that all of the issues being posed by the moderator were already addressed in our outline and asked if the outline could not be discussed. His request was denied. I was then forced to a full realization of what I had sensed from the first meeting I attended; from the beginning the deck was stacked to lead all of us to a foregone destination devised by the consulting organization. "Community input" was simply a pro forma exercise. The whole thing was a charade to guide participants to discovery of what the consulting organization believed the outcome should be.

As I am sure you realize, there was never a "vote" in the meetings on anything. Whenever someone said something along the lines of: "Well, how many of us here feel that motorized watercraft should be limited to 15 h.p.?" The proponent would be told, "We aren't taking any votes. This is not a representative group." So, any conclusions or findings derived from the meetings that went into the final plan were not the product of any decisions or recommendations agreed on by the community participants. The so-called "plan" represented only decisions of the members of the consulting organization.

2 So, where are we now? We have a grandiose development plan, for an overblown, overly complex, over-administered, recreational project for which no financing exists. Why in God's name do we need hiking trails designed and maintained by some administrative agency? Our home is probably the private residence that is closest to the lake. We have lived next to the Bodo Wildlife Area for over eight years which bounds our property on two sides. The demarcation line between our property and the so-called "public land" is now marked with a new fence and "No Trespassing" signs every few hundred yards.

During the years we have lived here, we have shared the Bodo Wildlife Area (while it was under the benign administration of the BLM) with the hikers, bikers, dog walkers and horse riders during the summer months and cross country skiers, tubers and sledders during the winter months. All of these folks have been good neighbors and have treated the environment with respect. We have been continuously impressed by the cleanliness of the well-established trails they have used. There were never any cans, bottles or trash left behind, nor any signs of campfires or unauthorized camping. When local residents are as responsible as these folks have been, do we really need signs all over the place designating trails and warning people to "keep off the grass?" Do we really need forest rangers patrolling our woods?

My hope is that the community will finally wake up to the understanding that the project as dreamed up by the consulting organization is unwieldy, economically unfeasible and environmentally detrimental. It will involve unjustifiably large capital expenditures to develop and entail excessive year-around administrative costs with little commensurate community benefit. In short, the whole overblown project is likely to be a costly boondoggle whose expenses will land in the laps of taxpayers. Whether the inevitable cost overruns will ultimately fall on local taxpayers or be absorbed by some state or federal giveaway program is anyone's guess, but it will be an unnecessary waste of resources for a bloated recreational project dreamed up by an outside consulting group whose focus was targeted on maximum commercial exploitation rather than a determination as what the majority of the community wanted and needed. I would love to see a real referendum of public opinion in our community: "Which would you prefer (a) a highly developed lake and with recreational areas allowing ovemight camping and all forms of boating activity without any limits on the size and speed of watercraft, or (b) a more natural lake with modest user amenities such as Port-a-johns allowing with family picnicking areas along the shores, swimming, sailing, kayaking, canoeing, scuba diving and fishing, but one where motorized craft would be limited to 15 m.p.h. with no wakes near docks and swimming areas?"

While I cannot speak for any of the others in the planning group I attended, I personally feel a better and more practical development plan would be (a) for the lake and its immediate environs to be developed with only modest and essential amenities (e.g. some toilet facilities and a boat inspection station) and that it be managed by a lake recreational organization which would be supported by user fees and (b) for the remainder of the land turned back over to DOW as a "wildlife area"open to the same public uses that have worked O.K. in the past, i.e. no manicured trail development: no fancy "Keep on Designated Trails" and "Don't Feed the Bears" signage; minimum maintenance costs; and very limited bureaucratic overhead expenses. There would always be an opportunity to expand the scope of recreational development and administrative control later if demand and usage justified.

I believe there has been a lot of money wasted on this project already. It would be a shame to have a lot more go down the drain on a recreational development plan that is very unlikely to be self-supporting on the scale envisioned and very likely to become a burden on local taxpayers if it does not. In this regard, there is some cost data that I would like to confirm which you may know from your study of the history of the project. My understanding is that the cost the boat ramp project involved an astonishing \$2,200,000 in public money derived from a federally funded grant and that the "study" performed by the consulting group cost another \$200,000 which came from a source not known to me. Also, my recollection is that the cost of re-fencing the Bodo Wildlife area was \$600,000 which was paid for by the Bureau of Reclamation from the so-called "Stimulous" funds. (I do not know if this included all of the "No Trespassing" signs that greet us every hundred yards or so.) Do you know if my understanding is correct on the cost of these items and where I could find data to verify this cost information?

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on this subject.

Anyone who attended the public hearings, workshops and open houses five years ago, knows that the high speed power boat issue remained very unsettled and debated. The Durango community appears to organizing once again, this time for a no-wake, safer lake with less noise pollution and less lakeshore erosion. The Bodo family's original intention that this revered basin be a welcoming home to wildlife in perpetuity haunts this lake.

Questions have arisen from the water based recreation design workshop process and at least one participant has shared how the group was "constantly reminded" by the Park Service facilitator that gas powered boats were required to be on the lake because of the Wallop-Breaux funding source. Of six people consistently at the water based recreation table, only two were in favor of high speed power boats. I have often wished transcripts were available from those break out groups. The open house I attended following the design workshops, ended with a power boat enthusiast, interrupting a soft spoken, respectful woman who was making well stated comments about a quieter, lower powered lake; the motorist was "tired after meeting for two days and he wanted to go home" and then he instructed the woman to make her comments in writing to the Bureau of Reclamation. That is how the meeting ended! Wow. I had never witnessed such disrespectful, unchallenged comments at a public meeting.

This lake and emerging wetland could be a mecca for quiet boaters, nature enthusiasts and eventually hikers/picnickers/tent campers. Is another water skiing/power boat lake truly needed in this region? As a Coloradan for over forty years I have shared lakes all over the state with power boats and have just stopped going to those areas. I would love to see a lake full of rowers, canoeists, trolling and lakeshore anglers, sailboats, etc., etc. I recently went to two reservoirs in Boulder County. One was a power boat reservoir that was known for being over run by motorists and exhaust on the weekends, and one reservoir was a pristine mountain lake that only allowed car- top water craft. The difference was startling. Why couldn't Lake Nighthorse be a gem of a different stroke and land somewhere in between these two examples?? Why not give it a try?? Too many people have observed that once a lake is handed over to the power boat culture, it could never go back to anything else.

While a creation of engineering, Lake Nighthorse is a scenic gem of a modesty sized and quiet lake nestled in forested hills just south of Durango, Colorado. While its primary purpose is to provide various entities with water, I concur that a secondary purpose should be fulfilled to provide recreational opportunities sooner rather than

later.

The final plan for Lake Nighthorse should fall somewhere between the Proposed Action -2014 Recreation Plan and the Action Alternative 1-2011 Recreation Plan.

MOTORIZED BOATS, OR NOT

Lake Nighthorse is small as compared to more massive lakes in the Four Corners region such as nearby Navajo and Vallecito lakes, as well as Lake Powell—and these three lakes are open to motorized boat recreation. I do not quarrel with the various estimates of visitor days exceeding 100,000 per year. But given the attractions of these other lakes, Lake Nighthorse will not have a significant amount of non-local area visitors, excepting visitors coming to the Durango area for already existing attractions. Since most Lake Nighthorse visitors will be locals or would have planned a local visit without the attraction of Lake Nighthorse, there will be no significant positive impact to the local economy from development of the lake for recreation.

In the tradition of outdoors enjoyment by those that live locally, the majority of visitors want non-motorized water recreational opportunities including swimming, kayaking, use of other floatation devices such as inflatable tubes, fishing, etc. in a scenic, quiet lake not polluted with gasoline. And in particular, a quality public swimming beach is sorely lacking in the immediate Durango area.

There is little local economic benefit from allowing gasoline powered motor boats or other motorized recreation floating machines. Non-local visitors are much more likely to haul their boats and other floating machines to Navajo or Vallecito Lakes or other larger lakes such as Lake Powell.

I find it unfortunate to learn that a boat ramp is already built and funded with state motor boat tax revenues, supposedly requiring that gasoline motor boats would be granted use of the lake. Alternatives should be explored to make an exception by prohibiting gasoline powered boats. But if that is not feasible, then: (1) a much lower maximum speed limit than the proposed 40 mph speed limit should be imposed, such as 10 mph and/or (2) a very low limit of daily gasoline powered boats on the lake should be required, e.g. no more than 10 boats.

HIKING TRAILS

Residents of La Plata and surrounding counties (including in New Mexico) love to hike. Providing additional hiking trails such as proposed in the 2011 plan absolutely should be included in the final plan either at the start or if not, for future construction by organizations such as Trails 2000. Expanding trails available at the lower elevations near Durango would be a significant addition to local hiking opportunities that have very low environmental impact. This would also provide more hiking opportunities in the immediate Durango vicinity to visitors.

CAMPGROUNDS

Since the State of Colorado declined to manage the Lake Nighthorse recreational area and given that there are plenty of other government and commercial campgrounds nearby to Durango, there is little need to add campgrounds to the Lake Nighthorse grounds as was proposed in the 2011 plan.



Lake Nighthorse Comments

As former National Park Service Ranger, I lived in National Parks for 40 yrs. During the 2011 public meetings, on the lake, I was a member of the Park and Recreation Board. The discussions could be heated on the subject of boating. The majority of the attendees felt that boats should be limited to sails, muscle power and electric motors. On a later field trip to the lake, I was surprised to see a large parking lot and boat ramp. I was told that Wallop-Breaux funding meant motorboats had to be allowed. Why this was never discussed at length with the Board is a question that I have. By the recent flurry of letter to the Editor of the Durango Herald, there were many citizen attendees at the meetings, who still question the decision by the Staff and City.

At the time there were many questions about the management of the lake and where the funding and staff would come from. I'm sure the City wanted to be a part of it, but there was no money. There were consultations with the National Park Service, Bureau of Reclamation and Southern Ute Tribe about operations, but the discussion always came back to finances and it seemed there was no extra money to run the park.

- 2 Lake Nighthorse is a small lake>1,000 acres. Regulations say that, "all boats would be required to operate at safe speeds, not exceeding 40 mph in open use zones and not exceeding 5 mph in no wake zones". The plan says that, "potential pollutants from combustible engines (benzene, toluene, ethyl benzene, and xylenes) would be monitored on a regular basis". No information about who will enforce or monitor is made of who will enforce or monitor the recreational rules on the lake. From my experience, you need trained staff to run a recreational area. It won't run itself. Life/safety issues are foremost, but personnel should be educated about the cultural and natural resources and be ready to respond to all types visitor needs. Who will handle law enforcement
- 2 issues and medical response? If fees and permits are required, who will manage that program?
- There is to be an expensive inspection station to deal with boat inspections.
 These stations are not a cure-all to maintain a healthy lake. Zebra and quagga mussels have found their way into many of our recreational lakes and ruined corresponding water systems. Lake Mead and Lake Powell have inspection stations and both are infested. Motorboats traveling from these lakes could bring the pests to Lake Nighthorse. Often motored boats owners bring their way to life to the lakes. On board picnics bring much waste, which often ends

up in the water. Sometimes, this is by carelessness, but also by gusting winds or choppy water.

I've seen the degradation of many lakes throughout the U.S., we need to take another look at our lake. Do we need styrofoam cups, paper plates, cigarette butts and that fine iridescent sheen of petroleum on our lake? Some boats may anchor and fish for the day, but many race up and down the water endlessly. I am a camper and looked forward to meeting friends for an overnight at the lake. Bird watching is also a pastime enjoyed by many locals. What a shame, if these users will have no peace during their time at the lake. We don't need the noise. There are other larger lakes in SW Colorado for the motorized craft.

1 If and when Lake Nighthorse is opened to the public, staffing must be considered, unless it is deemed a primitive experience. In this day of multiple lawsuits, that probably won't be the case. We will need a Recreation Ranger on hand for information, education and safety. We will need maintenance personnel to keep things clean and in working order. It will take money and a management team to assure success. Perhaps the money for the inspection station could be put to better use. We need a discussion. A Friends of Lake Nighthorse group could help determine how next to proceed.



Trails 2000 is a 501c3 non profit in Durango, CO with a mission to plan, build and maintain trails; educate trail users; and encourage connectivity on road, path, and trail. As a partner with local land agencies, Trails 2000 provides over 4000 volunteer hours of trailwork on City, County, Forest Service and BLM lands to provide our community with world-class trails. Recognized by the Forest Service as the "Recreation Partner of the Year", Trails 2000 serves as a model of private public partnership.

The Department of Interior's strategic plan encourages "Enhanced Recreation and Visitor Experience" to enhance the enjoyment and appreciate of our natural and cultural heritage. We feel by including the trails plan developed by the City through a thorough pubic process, the Bureau of Reclamation actively assists in achieving these goals.

Expanding trails for our community celebrates the great outdoors and maximizes community appreciation for the area. Trails engage the next generation to maintain a healthy level of fitness and support outdoor play. Establishing a robust trail system serves to maintain Durango's effective government/community partnership & a helps reinforce a partner attitude that encourage Durango citizens to attentively support rules that protect the environment.

- Approval of the trails studied and developed through a robust public process is an effective management approach to plan, develop and build a sustainable trail network. We respectfully request specific inclusions of trail related amenities to Alternative 1.
- Inclusion of multi use trail on the north side of CR 210 (and therefore, studied under NEPA)
- Allow Trails 2000 to plan, build and maintain an initial phase of trails (10 miles) north of CR 210 in the same year the EA is approved
 - ¥ Trails 2000 to provide trail planning, development and maintenance

Trails 2000 participated in the Lake Nighthorse public process in 2011, helping develop the proposed trails slated for the area and listed in the 2011 plan as outlined here:

"...interested persons to express concerns, share ideas, and identify issues related to the project. Workshops were held an December 7 and 8, 2010, to identify specific issues and develop shared solutions to water and shareline recreation and land-based recreation, respectively. A two-day design workshop was held on January 11 and 12, 2011, to further develop recommendations for recreation at Lake Nighthorse. This workshop specifically addressed water-based recreation, trails, camping, shoreline recreation, education and interpretation, and financing and management of recreation. A public open house was held on April 11, 2011, to review the Draft Recreation Master Plan, answer questions..."

The current 2014 draft Recreation Master Plan is scaled down substantially from the 2011 plan requested from the public. Page 14 of the plan currently states:

Natural Surface Trail

A natural surface trail may be constructed to connect Lake Nighthorse to the Animas River Trail, and a looped natural surface trail system would be constructed on the east side of the Lake linking recreational amenities and enhancing the user experience. Opportunities for linkage with other trail systems outside the project area would be considered."

The public comments and support for trails were very positive. The survey on page 91 includes a chart where the public stated the top three activities they'd like to see at Lake Nighthorse: the top choice (by 70% of the respondents) was trails. Trails are a cost effective and managed way for the public to begin enjoying the area. Since the beginning of the lake plan, Trails 2000 has offered to plan, build and maintain the trail system at virtually no cost to the project as noted on page 46 of the 2011 plan (6.1 #19).

Planning for trail use is a more positive approach for the land manager and the public. Planned trails are more navigable and easier to maintain, help avoid protected areas and preclude user-created trails, connect the public to key areas and allow more individuals to experience the landscape. La Plata County is an outdoor recreation community, highly interested in hiking, trail running, equestrian use, and mountain biking, all of which are closely tied to the trails.

Page 17 of the 2014 Environmental Analysis states:

Possible future recreation development under this alternative may include interpretive displays and education, a natural surface trail connecting Lake Nighthorse to the Animas River Trail, a looped natural surface trail system on the east side of the reservoir, potential linkages with other trails outside the project area, a public swim beach and picnic area, a trail connecting the swim beach to the overflow parking area, breakwater structures at the boat ramp and swim beach, a public campground with access near the entrance station, a permanent entrance building, and day use picnic and/or parking areas along the east lakeshore.

Page 20 of the Recreation Plan Draft EA states, Active Alternative I-2011 Recreation Plan: This alternative would implement the Draft Recreation Master Plan developed for Lake Nighthorse in 2011 (DHM Design 2011). This draft plan was initiated by ALPWCD and developed though a collaborative public involvement process that took place from March 2009 through April 2011 and included open houses, a public forum, issues and design workshops, which identified a public desire for a variety of recreational apportunities, including boating, swimming, multi-use trails, fishing, hunting, camping, picnicking, other activities, and special events. Under this alternative, implementation of the improvements would occur in phases, as available funding allowed. For the initial phase, specific locations are identified for a 2.4-mile ADA-accessible trail and trailhead; a non-motorized boat launch area; a swim beach; a parking area to service the proposed swim beach, trail, and non-motorized boat launch area; a vehicle turnaround and limited ADA parking at the end of the swim beach area access road; and a courtesy dock and breakwater at the existing boat ramp. For subsequent phases, proposed facilities include a boat ramp overflow parking area; a proposed fishing and picnic area with

access road, parking area, and trail; multi-use trails; a trailhead on the north side of CR 210; a trailhead at the west end of the lake off CR 211; three campgrounds;

The Summary of Alternatives also states Alternative 1 would include: 4 miles of ADA accessible trail in initial phase. Additional multiuse trails in possible future phases, resulting in a total of 28.6 miles of trail, forming complete loops around the lake.

1 We support the full inclusion of trails as listed in Alternative 1 and would like to see an initial phase of 10 miles approved for phase 1 and all 26.8 miles studied in NEPA. Outdoor Recreation is a major economic driver in the region. We believe the recreation aspects deserve higher priority and more importance in the final decision of the Lake Nighthorse Plan. The EA has identified the value of economic benefits associated with enhanced recreation at Lake Nighthorse. The community and public desire access to the Lake Nighthorse area. Recreation is a major, natural economic driver for this project. It presents a welcome opportunity to increase visitors to the area, given the natural and beautiful surroundings.

Page 51, Section 3.3.2 clearly states the benefits of enhanced recreation:

The Proposed Action would support continued growth of the tourism sector and would provide additional opportunities for water based recreation for visitors and local residents, resulting in direct, indirect, and induced economic benefits.

We kindly request the word "trails" be included after water-based recreation in the above paragraph to identify the tourism driver the trails provide.

The missing trail opportunities not included in this plan will clearly decrease the tourism opportunities and sales tax dollars generated to La Plata County; we highly agree with this statement notated below: Increased economic output under the Proposed Action would stem primarily from increased tourist spending in the warm season, and the majority of additional spending would be for retail goods. Increased tourism spending would also result from recreation sales occurring on-site at Lake Nighthorse, and sales at local restaurants and lodging establishments. Due to fewer campsites, trail miles, and day-use areas overall, the Proposed Action would result less direct spending and smaller total economic output compared with the 2011 Recreation Master Plan (Action Alternative 1).

The following paragraphs on page 52 spells out the loss of tourism due to the lessened recreation plan currently listed. We highly recommend the final EA address the economic benefits to enhanced recreation and include an initial phase of 10 miles of trail on the north side of CR 210 to kick the project off, increase tourism and provide a planned, non-motorized multi use trail system for the community.

Page 52, adds:

Action Alternative 1-2011 Recreation Plan

Economic Setting

Action Alternative 1 would enhance tourism, one of the main economic drivers in La Plata County, by providing additional recreational opportunities for visitors and local residents. As discussed under Section 3.2—Recreation, this alternative would generate an estimated 163,197 average annual user days at Lake Nighthorse, representing about 14 percent of the regional market share (RPI Consulting 2010a). User days would be expected to increase at an average annual rate of 1.3 percent to nearly 200,000 estimated annual user days by 2025 (RPI Consulting 2010a). This alternative would support continued growth of the tourism sector and would provide additional opportunities for water-based recreation for visitors and local residents, resulting in direct, indirect, and induced economic benefits.

Retail Sales and Economic Output

Action Alternative 1 would result in direct, indirect, and induced economic benefits to La Plata County from visitation to Lake Nighthorse by recreationalists, primarily through an increase in retail sales. An economic impact study (RPI Consulting 2010b) estimated that implementation of the 2011 recreation plan would result in an additional \$7,798,000 (in 2010 dollars) in average annual expenditures in the county based on direct impacts (jobs and earnings for lodges, restaurants, and businesses where visitors spend their money) and a total annual economic output of \$12,718,000 when a multiplier is applied for indirect and induced effects (jobs and earnings for linen services, food distributors, maintenance contractors, and other businesses that support primary tourism industries).

Page 91, Trails 2000 agrees to partner on the project as listed here:
Table 12. Mitigation measures and commitments common to all action alternatives.
Mitigation Measures and Commitments
Issues/Resources Targeted

Trail development in the project area shall be coordinated with the Southern Ute Indian Tribe, Ute Mountain Ute Tribe, Trails 2000, the City of Durango, La Plata County, ALPOMRA, and the CPW, and opportunities for linkage with other trail systems outside the project area may also be considered.

In conclusion, Trails 2000 supports Alternative 1 2.2 ACTION ALTERNATIVE 1-2011 RECREATION PLAN:

This alternative would implement the Draft Recreation Master Plan developed for Lake Nighthorse in 2011 (DHM Design 2011). This draft plan was initiated by ALPWCDwhich identified a public desire for a variety of recreational opportunities, including boating, swimming, multi-use trails, fishing, hunting, camping, picnicking, other activities, and special events. Under this alternative, implementation of the improvements would occur in phases, as available funding allowed. For the initial phase, specific locations are identified for a 2.4-mile ADA-accessible trail and trailhead; a non-motorized boat launch area; a swim beach; a parking area to service the proposed swim beach, trail, and non-motorized boat launch area; a vehicle turnaround and limited ADA parking at the end of the swim beach area access road; and a courtesy dock and breakwater at the existing boat ramp. For subsequent phases, proposed facilities include a boat ramp overflow parking area; a proposed fishing and picnic area with access road, parking area, and trail; multi-use trails; a trailhead on the north side of CR 210; a trailhead at the west end of the lake off CR 211; three campgrounds; 40 boat slips for campers at the existing boat ramp; and a day-use area south of the existing boat ramp. Figure 5 depicts the general location of the facilities proposed under all phases. Figure 6 shows the location and configuration of the swim beach, the ADA-accessible trailhead, the non-motorized boat launch, and associated parking areas under this alternative.

As under the Proposed Action, development and operation of recreational facilities under Action Alternative 1 would occur through the establishment of a management authority under contract with Reclamation. Funding for development, maintenance, and management of the recreational facilities would come from user fees, grants, and subsidies. Low-impact commercial activities such as boat rentals, scuba lessons, rescue classes, and children's day camps would be allowed under this alternative and would add revenue and expand the spectrum of recreational opportunities.

- 4 We request a few inclusions into Alternative 1:
 - 1) Include multi use trail on the north side of CR 210 in the EA (and therefore, studied under NEPA) to be approved for an initial phase of construction, rather than at a later date
 - Allow Trails 2000 to plan, build and maintain an initial phase of trails (10 miles) north of CR 210 in the same year the EA is approved
 - 3) Add the word 'trails' to the recreation amenities
 - 4) Allow Trails 2000 to provide trail planning, development and maintenance

I would be most in favor of the Proposed Action 2014 Recreation Plan. But whichever plan is utilized, unregulated powerboat usage will make the reservoir unusable for SUP's, canoes, kayaks, sculls, Kiteboarding etc.

This small reservoir would be crowded with only 20 powerboats pulling wakeboarders, yet the plan's estimate of an average of 50 powerboats per day would be utter mayhem. This would effectively eliminate the non-power users from the lake. Even a 50 ft no wake zone next to shore would have little effect since a powerboat going 40 mph 50 ft from shore would still flip SUPS and swamp canoes etc. and it would keep non power users from venturing across the lake if on the lake at all.

We were assured after the scoping meetings that the power boaters would be using only the southeast comer of the lake, this appears to not be the case, with little to no regulation in ANY of the plans.

I think that the majority of the lake should be no wake. Perhaps the southeast comer could be an area that would allow powerboats to create a wake but protect other users in the rest of the lake from the incompatibility/dangers of high speed craft. Another high option, which has been used on other reservoirs in the state, would be to have 3-4 days a week devoted to no wake use only. Power boats could still use the lake on these days but no wake allowed.

The bottom line is that there is no acceptable way of including unregulated powerboats in a multiuse universe that includes SUP's, canoes, kayaks, kiteboards, fishing etc. at the same time in the same place. It would be a lake for powerboat use only, by default. That would cut down on user days much more dramatically than regulating the estimated 50 powerboats per day on the reservoir.

50 powerboats a day would create a large impact on this small body of water, however you could have 2000 non power users on the lake and not even realize it. But if you allow unregulated powerboats on the lake, that would eliminate most of the non power users who would have a much smaller impact AND generate more revenue.

The Animas River trail does not allow motorized use because of the inherent conflict between user groups...but Lake Nighthorse can allow virtually unregulated motorized use?

Much noise about prioritizing the main purpose of the reservoir as a municipal water source, which I will count on for my own water source in Rafter J, but the one single use that puts that in jeopardy from the pollution of oil and gas spills not to mention the inevitable introduction of the Quagga mussel is Powerboat usage...really? This does not constitute a good management plan and can only reflect a vested interest.

I appreciate the opportunity for public comment on the Draft EA for the Lake Nighthorse Recreation Plan.

My main concern in the management of recreation at Lake Nighthorse is that motorboats will be allowed at the lake. I understand that with the funding of the boat ramp the option of no motors is not on the table - a very unfortunate circumstance. I believe that a great deal of public input was disregarded in allowing motors on the lake. The management plan puts limits on speed and noise; these regulations are going to be VERY hard, and in my opinion nearly impossible, to enforce. Who/how will enforce them? Specifically, how will noise be measured.

1 This lake is small and better suited to non-motorized uses. We have three lakes - Vallecito, McPhee, Navajo - that are available and suited to speed boats. If we have to have motors on Lake Nighthorse I strongly urge that the entire lake be kept to a no-wake zone, allowing non-motorized users to recreate in waters that are not choppy, noisy and dangerous.

Speed boats and the waves that they create also cause increased erosion at the shoreline, contributing to sediment in the water and deterioration of the shoreline.

Motorized boats will very likely bring invasive species into the lake, and necessitate inspection stations, a costly addition to management of the area.

2 Finally, it appears that the Proposed Alternative is mainly for the benefit of those who have the financial means to purchase a motorized boat, a trailer and vehicle to pull that boat. There are no picnic facilities, no swim beach, no non-motorized boat launch, so the family that wants to go up and enjoy a QUIET day at the lake has very limited options.

Please consider these thoughts/suggestions regarding recreation and capital improvements at Lake Nighthorse:

- Management needs to be reactive to what is working and what is not after the lake opens. Seek public
 input after use begins. Volunteers having discussions with users and suggestion boxes should be
 available.
- 1 2. Can you return the money for the boat ramp and regain independence for policy making and operation of the lake?
 - 3. It will be much easier to add days of motorized boat use than to try and reduce those days of use.
 - 4. In my 50 plus years of boating, I have never seen the speed of a boat measured. In my experience, a speed limit is only a request. Compliance is up to the individual.
 - 25. Who is liable if mussels are introduced?
 - 6. In my personal experience, ramp checks are inconsistent and do not insure that boats are dry upon arrival or completely drained upon exit. The rule sounds good but the reality is that there are too many variables in boat construction, cooling systems and inspection personnel to make inspections as accurate as they need to be.
 - 7. Water skiing has dwindled in popularity and activities that require a large wake have gained in popularity. These large wakes erode the shoreline, require a powerful boat and create unwelcome choppy waters for other lake users. Boaters often add weight (in the form of water ballast) to the rear of the boat to enhance the size of the wake.
 - These ballast bags should not be allowed on the lake. These add another layer of possibility for mussel



- 1 9. Consider maintaining a fleet of rental boats instead of allowing the public to bring their own. Electric "Duffy's" and gas powered fishing boats (limited horsepower). This would keep the lake quiet and clean. This would allow the public to reserve a boat, show up and be on the water in a very short amount of time, perfect for after work fishing or entertaining.
- 10. A rental fleet gives boating access to those that do not own a boat.
- 11. If rentals only were the policy, no mussel inspection team required.
- 12. If rentals only were the policy, no chance for mussel introduction.
- If rentals only were the policy, there would be a reduction in the parking area required for boat trailers.
- 14. Buildings should be constructed with natural materials. Adobe would be a great choice blending with the
- anvironment and being respectful of the area where the lake was created. A beautiful example of this architecture is the Amerind Museum in Dragoon, AZ. http://www.amerind.org/index.html
- 5 15. Interpretive areas are desirable for both school field trips and the general public. Provides a natural

interaction between lake management and visitors. This also introduces young family members to various activities available at the lake thus introducing the rest of the family to these activities.

- 16. Consider marketing opportunities derived from convention attendees. Folks attending events at local hotels have large budgets for activities. This could contribute considerable income for the lake and result in new users returning. This would also support the rental fleet.
- 17. Make it easy (affordable) for locals to show off their new lake. Taking a visiting guest up to the lake just to walk around and see what there is to do would payoff in additional use.
- 718. Ease into capital expenditures. Wait for the users to show where the demand is for additional facilities.
- 8 19. Rowing club? Would this develop into a new sport for local schools? Low impact, reasonable cost for equipment. A healthy activity that encourages adult/adolescent interaction.
 - 20. Much easier to add uses and activities than to take them away. This is especially true considering the expense some folks go to to own and maintain boats and sporting equipment.



The Board of County Commissioners of La Plata County has reviewed the proposed draft Environmental Assessment (EA) for Lake Nighthorse Recreation Plan, Animas-La Plata project. We have the following comments regarding the draft proposal.

Policy Comments

- The Commissioners would like the EA to consider mitigating impacts (including noise and trespass issues) to property owners on the west side of the management area in the Trappers Crossing Subdivision. For example, there is a trail that crosses into the Trappers Crossing Subdivision and back onto Bureau of Reclamation (BOR) lands. That segment proposes crossing private property and any use of such a trail would need to have legal access issues addressed appropriately.
 - The County requests that the recreational facilities and regulations accommodate multiple types
 - of water crafts ensuring non-motorized uses have the opportunity to enjoy the lake as well as motorized boats. Adequate no-wake areas and horsepower limitations could protect non-
 - motorized uses and help prevent erosion.
 - . As a community that has experienced devastating wildfires in the past, La Plata County is acutely
 - aware of the risks posed by unsafe fire conditions. Whatever uses are ultimately approved, the Commissioners strongly urge the BOR and recreation operator to mitigate and manage wildfire risks, particularly in any day use and camping areas.
 - . The BOR needs to contact the La Plata County Planning Department regarding the possible need
 - 5 to conduct a Location and Extent review under La Plata County Land Use Code Sec. 82-9.

Technical Comments

At the request of the Board, County staff reviewed the proposed draft EA for the Lake Nighthorse Recreation Plan, Animas-La Plata project, and would like the BOR to address the following technical comments.

The additional traffic from vehicles initially towing boats and ultimately also towing campers
will have significant impacts to the U.S. 550-160/Frontage Road intersection and the anticipated
substandard level of service (LOS) by the year 2020..

The EA summarizes this by stating:

"A traffic monitoring plan <u>may</u> be implemented to verify the assumptions of the completed traffic study, update the study as necessary, and identify when corrective actions are required. Design and implementation of the traffic monitoring plan and development of corrective actions would be coordinated with Reclamation, ALPOMRA, the City of Durango, La Plata County, and CDOT." (emphasis added)

This solution is open ended with no formal commitment to participate, while the EA acknowledges this intersection will be a problem.

"Implementation of a recreation plan under the action alternatives would contribute to a substandard LOS in 2020 of the U.S.550-160/Frontage Road intersection. The contribution of the action alternatives to Friday evening peak hour traffic at this intersection would be up to approximately 9 percent, and this intersection is expected to reach a substandard LOS in 2020 even if no recreation plan is implemented (Russell Planning and Engineering 2011)". (bottom of PDF page 88, top of 89)

The County would like to see a more concrete commitment to address this issue.

- Added traffic to County Road 210 and the associated impacts to the chip seal surface is a concern. This road was chip sealed upon completion of construction in 2010, in anticipation the road would require asphalt paving at some time in the near future. The chip seal surface has started to fail and consideration should be given to the need for a long term durable asphalt pavement capable of handling the anticipated increased traffic associated with the development of recreational uses at Lake Nighthorse.
- 8 There is insufficient information to determine the level of impacts to County Road 211, if any, from the proposed west end trail head and fishing access.
 - The consideration of no motorized boats was eliminated from the alternatives based on the receipt of a \$3 million Motorboat Access grant from the state for construction of a boat ramp, parking area, a vault restroom, and an access road. Construction of the boat ramp project was

completed in 2012. The purpose of the alternatives under the National Environmental Policy
Act is to minimize impacts to human health and the environment. Since the boat ramp was
already constructed under grant money, non-motorized boats were placed under alternatives
considered, but eliminated, based on the grant funding and a potential reduction in visitor
spending during summer months. Non-motorized boats should be explored as an alternative as
a way to minimize impacts or cause the least amount of damage to the biological and physical
environment.

La Plata County appreciates the opportunity to review and comment on the draft Environmental Assessment for Lake Nighthorse Recreation Plan, Animas-La Plata project.

Thank you for providing the Southern Ute Indian Tribe ("Tribe") with the opportunity to comment on the *Draft Environmental Assessment Lake Nighthorse Recreation Plan* (March, 2016) ("DEA"). As you know, the Animas-La Plata Project ("ALP" or "Project") is a key component of the settlement of the Tribe's and the Ute Mountain Ute Tribe's water rights. As part of the settlement, the Project provides the two Tribes with a reliable and firm supply of water to meet their present and future needs. ALP also provides important drinking water supplies to the Navajo Nation and local non-Indian communities in New Mexico and Colorado.

While Lake Nighthorse and adjacent Project lands have the ability to provide additional recreation opportunities to the surrounding area, recreation has always been at most a secondary purpose that cannot interfere with the Project's primary water supply purpose. Over the past few years, the Tribe has worked with the Bureau of Reclamation ("Reclamation") and other interested parties to try to develop a recreation plan that does not interfere with Project's primary purpose to provide a municipal and industrial water supply to the Tribe and others.

- 1 The Tribe has four principal concerns related to recreation development at Lake Nighthorse.
- 2 First, such development must not interfere with the Project's primary water supply purpose.
- Second, the significant cultural resources in the area must be protected and respected. Third,
 Tribal lands adjacent to the Project lands must be protected from trespass. Fourth, issues
- 4 regarding the Tribe's Brunot rights must be resolved with appropriate deference given to those rights.

The proposed action, the 2014 Recreation Plan ("2014 Plan"), reduces the chances of Lake Nighthorse recreation interfering with the Project's primary water supply purpose. It is critical,

5 however, that all of the commitments and mitigation measures described in the DEA be fully implemented and enforced to ensure the compatibility of the proposed limited recreation development with ALP's primary purpose as a municipal and industrial water supply project. In particular, the provisions to monitor water quality and to address any adverse effects of recreation on the Project's water supply are critical to ensure that recreation development is carried out in a way that is consistent with ALP's water supply purposes. In addition, the City of Durango ("City") as recreation manager must be prepared to respond immediately to spills and other emergency situations as described in the DEA.

The issues surrounding protection and respect for the cultural resources on the ALP lands are more difficult. It will be important for the Cultural Resources Management Plan for the area be fully developed and implemented to protect those sensitive resources in the event recreation development occurs as contemplated. Despite the protection that should be afforded by such a plan, many members of the Ute Tribes believe that recreation should not occur on the ALP lands in light of the cultural resources on site. Those concerns are partially addressed by the 2014 Plan's reduced footprint which avoids certain of the more sensitive areas. The proposed effort to

6 inform the public of the need to respect these resources is also helpful. However, the 2014 Plan fails to adequately address the issue of law enforcement on the ALP lands which are not part of the area proposed for recreation development and annexed by the City. Additional security must be provided for that area. The Tribe proposes that Reclamation contract with the Tribe and the Ute Mountain Ute Tribe to allow tribal rangers to patrol the area and provide an added presence to ensure that the cultural resources are protected and respected.

The lack of adequate enforcement on the non-annexed land may also contribute to problems with trespass on adjacent tribal lands. Again, a tribal presence on the non-annexed lands may help in ensuring that recreation participants remain in the annexed area and do not wander on to the closed portions of the Project lands or adjacent tribal lands.

Finally, the Tribe contends that the 2014 Plan must recognize that the Tribe's right to exercise its Brunot Treaty rights in an appropriate manner on the ALP lands. Section 6 of the "final draft" lease agreement between Reclamation and the City, dated November 18, 2015, provides that prior to opening the recreation area, Reclamation, the City and the two Ute Tribes will agree on the terms for the exercise of Brunot Treaty rights within the area as well as address the question of the payment of fees by tribal members. The language in the DEA deferring consideration of the issues associated with tribal exercise of Brunot Treaty rights is inconsistent with that

commitment. The final EA should recognize that such rights will be exercised on the ALP lands. and Reclamation should act promptly to resolve the issues related to such activities. As a practical matter, it would be helpful if at the same time, Reclamation would commit to working with Colorado Department of Parks and Wildlife ("DPW") to address the question of public hunting on the ALP lands.

As you know, the issue of recreation development at ALP has been highly contentious over the past few years. Working together, the affected parties have addressed many of the controversial issues and a plan for moving forward with limited recreation has been developed. It is critically important, however, that all of the mitigation measures and other commitments be fully implemented if the 2014 Plan is to avoid the problems that plagued more ambitious development plans. Moreover, additional work is needed before the opening of the Project lands to address the issues surrounding the Tribes' exercise of their Brunot rights on those lands. The Tribe is ready to work with the City and Reclamation to address those issues.

4 Official campgrounds would provide an additional benefit to the area and would reduce any renegade camping and impact that will occur. Even though I live in Durango I would use a campground during the summer and would be happy to pay a reasonable fee.

Concessions

I would like to see a marina with boat slips, dry storage and buoys. Boats stored within the marina would lessen the load on the boat inspection and provide a service and economic benefit.

General Comment

Lake Nighthorse is an incredible resource to have within minutes of Durango. I think it should be developed to provide the most benefit to the community and area. Colorado Parks and Wildlife (CPW) has reviewed the Lake Nighthorse Recreation Plan Draft Environmental Assessment (EA) dated March 2016. CPW made comments on the Preliminary Draft EA in January 2016 (Attachment 1). In addition, CPW commented on the Lake Nighthorse Recreation Plan in December 2011 (Attachment 2), November 2012 (via notes in the PDF provided for internal stake holder review (Attachment 3), and in November 2014 (Attachment 4). We have reviewed the proposed recreation alternatives outlined in the Environmental Assessment. Portions of Action Alternative 1 (2011 Recreation Plan) do not conform to the FEIS, the effects from this action would significantly impact the human environment, and these effects have not been fully analyzed in the EIS. Thus, portions of this alternative cannot be tiered to the EIS under 43 CFR 46.140. Please refer to previous comments for more discussion regarding Action Alternative 1 (Attachment 1 and 2). Our comments below focus on the lack of analysis and failure to include hunting recreation at Lake Nighthorse in the EA.

CPW is disappointed that BOR did not include hunting (Tribal Brunot Treaty Hunting Rights and public hunting) in the Recreation Plan for Lake Nighthorse (LNH). The Tribes and CPW have repeatedly requested that hunting be a key component of the Recreation Plan at LNH. Hunting provides important recreation opportunity for the public, restores a historical use of the property, and fulfills cultural and legal obligations to the Tribes and to the public. Hunting is a low impact activity that does not require additional facilities, construction, or vegetation/habitat impacts to accommodate this recreational and cultural use at LNH. In addition, hunting is compatible with project purpose and can be conducted in a manner that protects the health and safety of the public, infrastructure, and personnel. Consequently Tribal and public hunting conforms to the Proposed Action (2014 Recreation Plan), Alternative 1, and Alternative 2 in the EA.

Non-conformance with Reclamation Policy

There has been no consideration or discussion of hunting in the Recreation Plan EA despite repeated requests to analyze and include hunting in the recreation plan. As a result, the draft EA seems to be in conflict with Reclamation Policy, Reclamation Directives and Standards, and Presidential Executive Order 13433. The relevant sections of the referenced documents are detailed in the attached appendix. CPW feels that the information provided demonstrates that hunting should be a part of this analysis and we ask that you include it as you move forward.



Suggestions for modifying the EA

The 2014 Recreation Plan (Proposed Action) specifically mentions the fact that the Brunot Treaty preserved the right of the Ute Tribes to hunt within the Brunot Area. Honoring the Brunot Agreement/Treaty Rights is listed as a "Guiding Principal" in the October 2014 Recreation Plan, yet hunting or any discussion of hunting is absent in the EA.

CPW requests that hunting be identified as an integral component of the Proposed Action described in the EA for the LNH Recreation Plan before the Final EA and the ROD are completed and signed. Although this planning effort is chiefly designed to allow limited recreation by the public within a smaller footprint of the total project area, CPW feels that addressing hunting within the EA is necessary. We understand that the specific regulations of hunting at LNH require additional discussions between the stakeholders; however, it is a disservice to the Tribes and the public to forgo inclusion of hunting in the Recreation Plan EA at this point in the process. Therefore, at a minimum, we recommend modifying Table 1. Commitments common to the action alternatives and Section 3.7.1, 3.7.2 to include the following language regarding hunting at LNH:

Public hunting and the exercise of Brunot Treaty Hunting Rights by the Tribes will be allowed at Lake Nighthorse. Property specific regulations of hunting on any or all parts of Project Lands will be developed in coordination with the Tribes, CPW, the recreation manager, Reclamation and other stakeholders.

3 Seasonal Closures

CPW is supportive of seasonal closures to protect terrestrial wildlife species during critical times per the FEIS. The west side and south side upland closures will ensure that these areas continue to function as big game winter habitat and as a migration corridor. We are also supportive of the proposed golden eagle nest closures.

We do not think it is necessary to close the lake itself to recreationists November 16-May 15. While this period is not the peak season for flat water based recreation there are still opportunities for hunters, anglers, wildlife watchers, non-motorized boaters and others to enjoy the reservoir during this time while having minimal impacts to other resources. The closures along the south and western portions of the property would still provide habitat and a corridor for wildlife movement to the Bodo SWA. We encourage the BOR to modify the EA to allow lake use during this time.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment. We look forward to working with you on appropriately managing recreational hunting at LNH.

Colorado Parks and Wildlife (CPW) has reviewed the Lake Nighthorse Recreation Plan Preliminary Draft Environmental Assessment (PDEA). The CPW has made previous comments on the Lake Nighthorse recreation plan in December 2011 (Attachment 1), November 2012 (via sticky notes in the PDF provide for internal stake holder review, Attachment 2), and November 2014 (Attachment 3). We have reviewed the proposed recreation alternatives outlined in the Environmental Assessment. Portions of Action Alternative 1 (2011 Recreation Plan) do not conform to the FEIS; and thus, the anticipated recreational and facility development impacts cannot be tiered to that NEPA document. Please refer to previous comments for more discussion regarding Action Alternative 1 (Attachment 1).

4 Unmitigated loss of public land hunting opportunity

The reservoir and surrounding area were formerly managed by the CPW as Bodo State Wildlife Area (SWA) for wildlife habitat and low-intensity, wildlife-related recreation, namely hunting. This area was critically important to CPW's wildlife management efforts in Game Management Unit (GMU) 741 and provided the only public hunting opportunity in that GMU. The Animas La Plata Project (ALP) has resulted in the loss of a unique public hunting area in this GMU. BOR acquired a "Mitigation Area" (MA) to offset the loss of habitat from the ALP project, but the MA has never been opened for public hunting.

Over 15 years has passed since portions of Bodo SWA were condemned and closed to the public and sportsmen for the ALP Project. CPW has repeatedly and publically expressed our desire to open public hunting of the Reservoir and the MA to help offset impacts to wildlife resources and wildlife-related recreation opportunities from the ALP project. If the MA cannot be opened for public hunting, BOR should seek other opportunities to restore to sportsmen this unique public land hunting opportunity in GMU 741. The Recreation Plan for Lake Nighthorse needs to include recreational hunting opportunities. Depending on the alternative selected, Lake Nighthorse could support waterfowl hunting and the surrounding BOR lands could support small game and some limited big game opportunity. Hunting can occur at LNH and the surrounding BOR lands in a manner that is safe, benefits the community, helps achieve the Project's Propose, and is compatible with other recreational opportunities at LNH.



Waterfowl Hunting

In La Plata County there is very limited public land waterfowl hunting opportunity. Currently the only public land waterfowl hunting at lower elevations is Pastorius SWA, located on the Florida Mesa. In most years this SWA is iced up by mid-late December and no longer provides essential habitat or hunting opportunity for waterfowl until ice melts. However, Lake Nighthorse could provide extended season waterfowl hunting opportunity due it is size and lack of ice cover in most years.

Waterfowl seasons run from October-January which generally is a low use period for other water based recreational activities. There are numerous examples of other reservoirs that allow waterfowl hunting in addition to traditional boating recreation and fishing (Navajo State Park, Vallecito Reservoir, Lemon Reservoir). Management of these reservoirs include some restrictions on where you can hunt in proximity to other recreational facilities (e.g. boat ramp, camp grounds, etc.), but for the most part these areas are open and conflicts with other users are rare.

- Hunting not only adds additional recreational opportunity but it brings income to the area by creating this opportunity. During the fall season, La Plata County has a influx of sportsmen and women visiting the area for hunting season and fishing opportunities. These sportsmen and women bring in approximately \$43 million in direct and secondary expenditures in La Plata County in 2008 (BBC Research and Consulting 2008).
- In addition, some stakeholders have raised the concern of waterfowl contributing to degradation of water quality at LNH, and have expressed their desire to allow hunting at LNH as water quality control measure. Geese can pose a human health problem and will contribute nutrients to the body of water if they are allowed to concentrate for extended periods of time. Goose feces on the shore and in the water can cause e-coli outbreaks which can be contracted by humans. Fecal e-coli is also an serious regulatory issue for water treatment plants. CPW recognizes that it would be difficult to predict the impact of geese and other waterfowl on water quality at LNH. However, hunting provides a management tool to control the waterfowl populations, it functions as a hazing mechanism keep waterfowl from concentrating and becoming residents, and it is a relatively low cost/no cost solution to a problem that could cost millions to remedy after-the-fact.

CPW would like to see, at a minimum, waterfowl hunting added into all of the action alternatives prior to the EA going out for public review and comment. CPW, USFWS, Southern Ute Tribe, Ute Mountain Ute Tribe, and the public have made repeated requests to the BOR to allow hunting at Lake Nighthorse. The BOR recognized and advocated for hunting in its response (1997) to the USFWS recommendations under the Fish and Wildlife Coordination Act. The public has a desire to hunt in this area; it was committed to in the FEIS and should be a central focus of any recreation plan for Lake Nighthorse.

Brunot Treaty Hunting Rights

CPW recognizes that the Southern Ute and Ute Mountain Ute Tribes wish to exercise their hunting and fishing rights under Brunot at LNH and on the surrounding BOR lands. We support hunting and fishing activities in these areas. We feel that it is BOR's responsibility to ensure that these activities continue, and are promoted for the benefit of Tribal Members and the public.

Section 2.5 Commitments Common to all Action Alternatives

3 Seasonal Closures

CPW is supportive of seasonal closures to protect terrestrial wildlife species during critical times. The west side and south side closures will ensure that these areas continue to function as big game winter habitat and as a migration corridor. We are also supportive of the proposed golden eagle nest closures.

However, we do not understand the rationale for closing the lake to recreationist beginning November 16-May 15. While this period is not the peak season for flat water based recreation there are still opportunities for hunters, fisherman, wildlife watchers, and others to enjoy the reservoir during this time while having minimal impacts to other resources. We encourage the BOR to modify the EA to allow lake use during this time.

9 Trails

As previously noted some trail development in the Action Alternatives exceeds the impacts disclosed in the FEIS. Should trails be developed north of CR 210, we request that the BOR fence its boundary with Bodo SWA. Protecting deer and elk should be the primary driver for SWA lands and Bureau lands north of CR 210. These lands should be restricted or at a minimum have extended seasonal closures to protect wintering animals. If trails are constructed and open seasonally, we recommend mitigation measures e.g., setbacks, use of natural barriers such as vegetation and/or topography, wildlife friendly fencing, etc., to assure that social trails and additional trail development do not degrade the habitat values on Bodo SWA (Attachment 1).

CPW is pleased to see a plan that considers the needs of facility development and recreational activities on the property while protecting the cultural sites in the Animas-La Plata Project Area. CPW offers the following comments on the Draft Plan: The Draft Plan states:

"Recreation activities may include boating, fishing, swimming, and camping. In addition, hiking, mountain biking, and/or horseback riding may be approved on existing roads and trails."

The Ridges Basin area was formerly managed by the CPW for wildlife habitat and wildlife-related recreation. The FSEIS commits that "Wildlife-related activities will be encouraged." In addition to fishing, wildlife related activities include hunting and wildlife viewing activities. We suggest modifying the language in the Draft Plan to include hunting and wildlife viewing under the Recreation and Development Section.

Before the dam was built Ridges Basin was a wonderful quiet area.

There were herds of elk and flocks of turkeys. I believe that the Bodo

family, when it signed the land over the Nature Conservancy, wanted to area to stay wild.

In fact, I found an article that says:

The Bodo family, whose homes and ranch buildings still stood in the basin before A-LP's flooding, worked this land since 1914. The family gave up ranching in the 1970s but not their love of the land. In 1974, they sold their ranch to The Nature Conservancy with a clause in the deed: that Ridges Basin stay wild for wildlife forever. When The Nature Conservancy turned over the basin to the Colorado Division of Wildlife, creating the Bodo State Wildlife Area - read: public property owned by all Coloradans - that clause remained intact: Forever.

Please accept these comments regarding the Lake Nighthorse EA and proposed action.

I have followed this process, attended meetings and provided input and comment and for the most part support the concept of the proposed action. This relatively simple plan fits with most Durangoans desires for a more natural, simple water experience.

I am pleased that jet skis, houseboats, open air exhaust boats are not to be allowed BUT feel that the proposed action misses the stated community desires by authorizing motorized boats (gasoline) and the speeds that are authorized. Lake Nighthorse is a relatively small body of water and is positioned to provide a unique recreational niche close to Durango...that of a "NO WAKE LAKE". Small electric trolling motors could be allowed but speeds would be slow and not impact other users such as the stand up paddleboarders, canoers, sailboats, crew, etc.

The idea of potentially large numbers of motorboats at speeds of up to 40 mph towing water skiers on this small body of water is truly frightening and it will simply be a matter of time before accidents and injuries to other motorized users and non-motorized users occur.

- 2 Additionally, there are concerns about toxic spills from motorized boats...gas, oil, etc. As a municipal water supply for the tribes water quality maintenance should be a high priority. There is no mention of this risk, or the risk of using the lake for swimming on water quality. Air quality impacts from gas engines are mentioned but minimized as are noise impacts. Our public lands should provide experiences that cannot be found elsewhere, not just another motorized, noisy, degraded natural place.
- The EA touches on economic benefits to the local community of allowing motorized use BUT does not even mention the potential economic benefits of potentially making Lake Nighthorse a unique non-motorized recreational mecca. There are already several large reservoirs in proximity to Durango where motorized boaters can recreate...Vallecito, Ridgeway, Lemon, Electra, McPhee and Navajo all provide extensive opportunities for motorized recreation. McPhee is extremely under-utilized in spite of extensive recreation developments, boat launch, etc. It is not the economic driver that was envisioned and touted and simply finding someone to operate the marina has been a challenge. Similar challenges have happened at Vallecito Lake.

There is no economic information on the non-motorized boating community as relates to potential user days and visitor spending. Why? I would imagine non-motorized boating would greatly exceed that of motors and would represent an even larger percentage of visitor spending. The use of funding provided by the state (illegally as no NEPA was conducted regarding construction of the boat ramp) to construct the boat ramp should not preclude making this a non-motorized lake. Funds could be raised to repay the state and relieve the "obligation" for motorized use. If motors must be allowed then small electric trolling motors or small horsepower skiffs could meet that requirement with the least disruption to other lake users.

The motorized boating community has plenty of opportunity but what opportunities exist for the quiet/non-motorized non-river boater? A handful of small, small lakes such as Haviland, Mancos State Park or Pastorius. There are some private lakes such as Turtle Lake...no public access. There is great demand and hope for a decent size body of water for sailing, canoeing, paddling boarding, kayaking, etc. To be able to experience a beautiful lake that is not dangerously large, that would have no dangerous wake from motorized users or water-skiers to be watching for....that would truly be a dream come true for many of us.

At a time when America is fighting obesity and climate change from increasing CO2 emissions, we should be prioritizing non-motorized recreation activities and reduction of gratuitous fossil fuel burning for recreation purposes. Also, given that Durango is an expensive place to live with low income levels and higher than average poverty levels, providing lower cost recreation (no fuel purchase, lower maintenance, etc. of non-motorized watercraft) is desirable for the local population.

There is no mention in the EA of Climate Change and how increasing motorized recreation, increasing tourism, etc. will add to the overall impacts of climate change. Federal projects should be leading minimization of activities that would contribute to climate change. This discussion and analysis must be included.

One additional omission in the EA is any mention of the Old Spanish National Historic Trail designated by Congress in 2002. This nationally significant route passes from east to west through Lake Nighthorse and the dam. There should be consultation with the National Park Service and Bureau of Land Management regarding management and mitigation for this trail. This is a serious oversight that must be remedied.

I wrote this earlier this week and thought I sent it, but then discovered it in my "draft" box just now. I know that yesterday was the cut off date, but if you can accept my comments, please do.

Thanks.

- Please count my voice as one of the many in La Plata County who feels very strongly that Lk Nighthorse would be better off - on all levels - without motorized craft of any kind. Motorized water recreational opportunities abound (McPhee, Vallecito, Navajo, Lemon, Havilland...) and there is no significant, comparable lake where people can recreate without the noisy, odorous presence of motorized boats and jet skis.
- 2 Besides, it seems obvious that the contamination of motor fuel shouldn't be allowed in a drinking water reservoir.

The area is currently not noisy, and that has a very high value. Truly quiet places removed from the sound created by the "engines of our ingenuity" are rare and restorative - we all benefit from spending time in such environments.

- 3 I'd like to see development funds directed to:
 - A couple of swimming beaches. Perhaps one designed to be especially kid and family friendly, and another offered for adults 18 and older looking for a more restive atmosphere.
 - 2) Hiking trails of different difficulties.
 - 3) Mountain biking Varied difficulty singletrack ranging from easy to moderate and intermediate trail loops. Not many trails in the immediate Durango area offer moderate single track think of all the fit, over 50 riders who aren't willing to risk breaking their leg or whatever, but still like to ride (Phil's World and Boggy Draw are examples of what I'm suggesting).
 - 4) Picnicking spots (with nearby restrooms), grouped fairly closely together to keep the impacts from adversely affecting a large area.
 - 5) Limit car access to the Picnicking and boat ramp areas, with very limited public access roads elsewhere.
 - 6) Non motorized boat access would not need to be designed for large craft; the use would be by kayaks, canoes, SUPs, fishing cataracts or row boats. All small, mostly and maneuverable. I didn't list tubes, because they're not navigable...and suggest making a special portion of the swimming beach areas for tubers.
