

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
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SAFETY PERFORMANCE

X-700 LOTO VIOLATION

On April 9, when reviewing a troubleshoot and repair work evolution, a DOE Facility Representative identified a potential Lockout/Tagout (LOTO) violation. After investigation of the concern, it was determined that a violation had occurred. An employee had performed work without locking on to the lock box.

A LOTO had been established to protect elevated work in the area of an overhead crane. Prior to the work evolution, a Radiological Control Technician (RCT) was requested to survey the exterior of an elevated electrical box to determine if additional radiological controls were required prior to the beginning of that work evolution. To accomplish this survey, the RCT was elevated in an aerial lift without being required to affix their lock to the established LOTO, thus violating our LOTO program.

No entry was made to the electrical box and no injuries occurred.

ACTIONS TAKEN

- A meeting was held with the affected employee, the employee's Supervisor and Manager, and the ESH&Q Lead for SMIDD in order to discuss the issue.
- The ESH Field Support Manager, SMIDD Director and Deputy Director, SMIDD Maintenance Manager was informed of the potential LOTO violation.
- A Fact Finding meeting was conducted.
- An ORPS Report was initiated.
- A time out for safety (TOFS) was implemented across FBP on April 10 to discuss the incident, what actions should have been taken and lessons learned from an ISMS perspective.

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PRELIMINARY LESSONS LEARNED

- A LOTO protects personnel from hazards. All personnel potentially exposed to a hazard that has been controlled with a LOTO MUST apply their personal LOTO device.
- Do not assume that because a piece of equipment is out of
- commission, a LOTO is not required to be established.

 3. Workers should stay constantly aware of the hazards around them and look out for changing/increasing hazards and conditions outside the planned scope of work.

POSITIVE FEEDBACK

On April 15, a worker was faced with a similar elevated work situation and a LOTO violation was avoided due to demonstrating a "questioning attitude" when they applied the information from the April 9 event TOFS.

In addition, the other involved workers also positively demonstrated ISMS and a "willingness to stop" to address the worker's concerns.

A questioning attitude, always asking "is this right?" and maintaining situational awareness are critical to your own safety and the safety of your co-workers.

- Closing an Average of 850 Work Requests/Month










