- At the July 21 Tribal Council business meeting, the Tribal Council granted a limited opening of enrollment for a specific period of time from July 22 until Dec. 29.
- Applications will be accepted only from persons who were under the age of 18 as of enrollment closure on Feb. 6, 2010 (this means those who were born on or after Feb. 6, 1992).
- Enrollment Applications will be furnished by the Enrollment Office.

ATTENTION HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES

If you have recently graduated from high school or received your General Educational Development (GED) diploma from a certified test site please send a copy of the document to the Enrollment Office. This information is used for per capita distributions.

The following is the Education Requirement from the Nottawaseppi Huron Band of the Potawatomi (NHBP) Revenue Allocation Plan:

In order for an eligible Member between the ages of eighteen (18) and twenty-one (21) years of age to receive a per capita payment directly, such Member must submit to the Enrollment Office or Tribal Council, one of the following:

- 1 a copy of his/her high school diploma,
- 2 a copy of his/her degree or certificate equivalent to a high school diploma,
- 3 documentary proof of satisfactory completion of high school degree-equivalent home schooling requirements for the Member's state of residence, or
- ④ a certification from an accredited school or schools that the Member has learning or other disabilities and has attended a full 12 years of school.

The appropriate diploma, degree or certification must be submitted to the Enrollment Department before any particular eligible Member within this age group may have his/her per capita payment mailed to him/her. If such copy is not timely submitted, the per capita payment for such Members shall be deposited in the Member's minor trust account.

Tribal Member Completes Chicago Marathon


On October 9, Nottawaseppi Huron Band of the Potawatomi (NHBP) Tribal Member Allie Elwell completed all 26.2 miles of the Chicago Marathon. Elwell ran the marathon in 5 hours, 47 minutes and 58 seconds with an average pace of 13 minutes and 3 seconds per mile.

Elwell started running a little less than two years ago when she found herself encountering a lot of stress in college. Soon she wanted to see how far she could push herself and ran her first 5K for breast cancer awareness on behalf of her mother, NHBP Tribal Member Abbe Elwell, who is a breast cancer survivor.

According to Elwell, she never concentrated on her timing but, rather, ran for enjoyment by focusing more on improving her distance. Eventually she decided to test her limits by completing a full marathon, and took it a step further by applying to the Chicago Marathon.

"It's one of the Abbott World Marathon Majors," Elwell said. In other words, it's one of six of the world's most renowned marathons. It's so famous that runners from all around the globe must meet qualifying standards just to get in and, even then, only a select few are chosen. Others get entered in through a lottery system.

On race day, Elwell claimed to be extremely nervous and a little

superstitious, keeping a lucky stone her father gave her in her runner's pouch. She also found motivation and encouragement from the surrounding crowds.

"There were spectators with signs cheering the entire 26.2 miles," Elwell said. "Strangers were giving everyone high-fives and the atmosphere was so happy."

During the race, Elwell insisted on chanting mantras like "keep going" or "your legs aren't giving up, your head is." She claims that they kept her calm and centered, and ultimately helped her to reach the finish line.

"Right after, I went and got a deep dish pizza," laughed Elwell.

According to Elwell, she enjoyed the entire experience and encourages NHBP Tribal Members who are interested in running to pace themselves and figure out what works for them, without comparing themselves to others.

"I'll be running for life," Elwell said.
"I've decided to stick with half-marathons, while I plan to do 5Ks and 10Ks for charity."

Elwell is currently in graduate school at Northwestern University working on a Master of Science degree in Speech Pathology. She is scheduled to run the American Family Fitness Half Marathon in Richmond, Virginia in November.

Other Tribal youth commented that they loved seeing all of the spooky ghosts and goblins, not to mention all of the candy!



ELDERS GIFT CARD PROGRAM

The Elders Gift Card Program was designed to help Tribal Elders by providing a \$25 Wal-Mart gift card to Elders who are hospitalized with an overnight stay to help assist in purchasing needed items.

Eligibility: Any NHBP Member who is 50 years of age or older and is admitted to a hospital facility for medical care requiring at least one overnight stay. Requests for Elder Gift cards need to be submitted no later than 30 days after the date of hospitalization to be eligible per policy. You may use this program two times per year.

In recognition of Domestic Violence Awareness Month, the Nottawaseppi Huron Band of the Potawatomi (NHBP) Tribal Court invited all NHBP Tribal Members, families and additional guests to a Round Dance and feast on October 27. The event took place at the Pine Creek Community Center where the doors opened at 5:30 p.m. and the dinner was set at 6:30 p.m. with over 100 quests in attendance.

The goal of the event was to increase awareness and understanding of domestic violence and its impact on the victim and the victim's family, as well as the nation as a whole. Pokagon Band of the Potawatomi Tribal Member Jason Wesaw acted as Master of Ceremonies and said, "This gathering is an opportunity to learn and to embrace each other for the health of our community."

Wesaw's introduction was followed by a smudging by Grand Traverse Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Indians Tribal Member Donna Chippewa and a Pipe Ceremony by Grand River Bands of Ottawa Indians Tribal Member Bill VandeGriff. Tribal Council Secretary Christine Lanning was eager to welcome all who attended and asked everyone to take advantage of the Round Dance of healing. The NHBP Community needed no further urging as they came together to dance in support of those affected by domestic violence.

According to Tribal Court Chief Judge Melissa Pope, one in three Native women are victims of domestic violence and abuse. "I believe in my heart that they are the answer to changing the problem," Pope said.

"If domestic violence affects one of us, then it affects all of us," McClure said.

Batchewana First Nation of Ojibways Tribal Member Paul Syrette visited the Pine Creek Indian Reservation and gave a teaching on proper lodge construction. The NHBP nenwik (men) completed the task the night before 2016 Fall Ceremonies were slated to start.

which was October 20 to 23. The small group of nenwik worked after hours and on weekends to complete this tireless task for incoming visitors.

Many of the conductors commented on the beauty of the NHBP lodge. In years past there had not been a lot of Community support, but this year showed a shift in Community outlook. A lot of hands helped to complete the ceremonial longhouse and the visitors could feel the love inside of the lodge. Everyone felt

very welcomed and commented daily of the hospitality that was present.

This year the conductors spoke about grief, as both Tribal Members and NHBP employees have experienced a tremendous amount of grief in recent years. The topic of grief was suggested so that Tribal Members and employees

could receive teachings and begin the healing process associated with grief. All of the conductors honored NHBP wishes and began teaching what grief is, the many stages of grief, how to make amends with grief and acquiring the skills to move forward. For many, knowing that grief is a process was comforting.

Although many of the teachings during the Fall Ceremonies dealt with grief, there were many more teachings that did not. Some of the additional teachings focused on lodge protocol, lodge etiquette, different doorway meanings, clan teachings, the naming ceremony and sobriety. The NHBP Community was also blessed to have Fire Keeper teachings taught to the nenwik. Through these teachings, the nenwik were able to learn how to start a traditional fire without matches or lighters.

The entire process from the starting of the fire to the lighting of the fire was a beautiful experience

and worthwhile for the nenwik. The lighting of the fire was the culmination of their own hard work and concentration, and everyone in attendance gave the nenwik a round of applause at the lighting.

Other parts of the event included healing, eating and visiting with other attendees. Each day was started with a sunrise ceremony with a breakfast that followed. Once everyone had the opportunity to refuel, they would return to the lodge for more teachings, followed

by lunch, additional teachings and dinner. During dinner each night, there was much laughter and many more good feelings that danced throughout the Pine Creek Community Center. A good time was had by all.

the time to acknowledge a few Community Members who were asked and graciously accepted to assist with making dinner dishes. Lastly, the nenwik of the NHBP Community juggled with quite a few responsibilities including lodge building and fire keeping.
