Multi-platinum recording artists 3 Doors Down will headline the evening's entertainment at 7:30 p.m.


The event finale will consist of a fireworks show which begins at 9 p.m.

Michael Murphy comes back to beat Ronald Reagan CS

Down by five points with less than nine minutes remaining in the game, USS Michael Murphy (DDG 112) scored five straight points and then hung on to defeat USS Ronald Reagan (CVN 76) Combat Systems, 31-27, on June 29 in a 2014 Rim of the Pacific Exercise (RIMPAC) basketball game at Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam Fitness Center.

Α three-pointer Electronics Technician 3rd Class Ryan McConnell put Ronald Reagan ahead, 24-19, but a trey by Yeoman 3rd Class Courtney Sims narrowed the margin before the shooting guard zeroed in on another basket to finally tie the score at 26-26Later a putback by Sims off of a missed shot by Culinary Specialist 3rd Class Terrance Sample put Michael Murphy ahead for good at 29-27 with only 52 seconds in the game. Sims led all scorers with 14 points, nine coming in the second half, while McConnell paced Ronald Reagan with 11. "It's all about motivation," said Sample about the team's come-from-behind victory. "Coach gave us a good talk. It's all about keeping your head in the game, slow it down and take it easy. That's what we did. We got the ball around and made some good shots." In the first half, both squads teetered back and forth with the lead changing three times before taking a 13-13 deadlock into halftime. Sims converted a basketand-one for one tie and Sample knocked down a bomb from beyond the arc to put Michael Murphy ahead for the first time at 11-8 before Ronald Reagan caught them up just prior to intermission. Ronald Reagan scored the first two baskets of the second half to go up by a score of 17-13, but instead of letting the game get away, Michael Murphy, behind the hot hand of Sims, stayed close behind. With the score tied at 19-19, McConnell swished a 15-foot shot and connected





Reagan up by five.

However, Sims accounted for Michael Murphy's next seven points in a row before throwing down a putback to seal the game.

"It's just the killer instinct," Sims said. "My teammates said, 'you got to get them,' so I got them."

Playing on an international scale, said Sims, provided an extra amount of motivation to compete at an even higher level.

"I think I showed the world," he said. "Me, I like to rebound and shoot that thing. I pride myself in crashing boards."

Sample said that things started to take a turn in their favor once the team came out with a more aggressive attitude.

works together."

McConnell, whose longrange shooting helped keep Ronald Reagan stay within reach until the very end, said that although the team came up short, he was quite happy with the way his team performed.

No matter what the score was at the end, McConnell said, just the opportunity to compete against another ship as part of the largest international maritime exercise in the world was a great experience.

"It's been a blast," he said. "Seeing all the other navies come in, play against some.'

Down by five runs, Commander Submarine Force U.S. Pacific Fleet (COM-SUBPAC) needed a big swing to get back into the game and they got one in a thunderous way.

Facing two outs in the top of the fourth, COMSUB-PAC loaded the bases and with one knock, Lt. j.g. Brad Harden drew his team to within a single run by crushing an opposite-field grand slam that hung just inside the foul pole and cleared the right-field fence to make the score 6-5.
