Bobcat National Wildlife Refuge System

- Bobcats are fierce hunters that pounce on prey, even much bigger animals like deer.
- Bobcats are good swimmers and climbers, with excellent eyesight and hearing.
- Bobcats tend to be solitary, making dens among rocks or in caves. They live 10-14 years and are the wildcats

most likely to be seen in North America. They live on national wildlife refuges in many parts of the United States and have the greatest range of all native North American cats.

• Bobcats are usually shades of brown with spots, but there is an all-black bobcat in Florida. Bobcats are about twice the size of the average house cat.
