Welcome to the J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge. The 6,000+ acres of the Refuge contain a variety of subtropical habitats, including the upland ridges and freshwater swales of the island's interior ecosystem as well as the mangrove forest and seagrass beds of its estuarine mangrove fringes. Numerous neotropical migrants and resident birds depend on this variety of habitats for their existence. Refuge managers and biologists are responsible for the management and protection of these valuable habitats. More than half of Sanibel Island is permanently protected, either as part of the National Wildlife Refuge (one of over five hundred in the United States) or by other conservation groups.

How to use your checklist

The bird checklist was designed to be informative and simple to use. The list is arranged in the order established by the American Ornithological Union. Symbols which appear in this checklist represent the following:

Seasonal appearance

- F Fall September November
- W Winter December February
- Sp Spring March May
- S Summer June August

Seasonal abundance

- a abundant (a common species which is very numerous)
- c common (likely to be seen in suitable habitat)
- fc fairly common (present but not always seen)
- u uncommon (present but difficult to find)
- r rare (seen at irregular intervals)

This checklist includes approximately 180 species of birds. A list of approximately 65 accidental sightings (seen a few times during the past several years) has also been included. If you should find an unlisted species, please let us know at Refuge Headquarters. We will appreciate your help in updating our records.

Favorite birdwatching sites are the J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge (the Bailey Tract, Wildlife Drive, Indigo Trail, and the Shell Mound Trail), the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation properties, the causeway islands, gulf beaches, the lighthouse area and Blind Pass.

Over two-thirds of our nation's land is privately owned and contains some of the most important fish and wildlife habitat in the United States. You can help protect this habitat and contribute to the health of the land and the quality of life by supporting your local conservation efforts. Learn what you can do to promote wildlife usage of your backyard by contacting your local representative of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

When visiting our nation's public and private lands, it is very important that each of us practice and promote ethical behavior while viewing and photographing wildlife. Although visitors may not think their individual actions are harmful to wildlife, the

cumulative effect of individual actions can jeopardize an animal's ability to survive. Above All, Do Not Disturb Feeding, Resting or Nesting Birds; and Please Do Not Litter or Feed Wildlife on the Refuge.
