Overview of 2009

The New Farm Bill provided a wide range of programs and services to enable Oklahoma landowners to implement various conservation practices and management activities in 2009. 2008 Farm Bill



NRCS's natural resources conservation programs helped people reduce soil erosion, enhance water supplies, improve water quality, increase wildlife habitat, and reduce damages caused by floods and other natural disasters. Public benefits included enhanced natural resources that helped sustain agricultural productivity and environmental quality while supporting continued economic development, recreation, and scenic beauty.

The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act was signed into law by President Obama on February * * RECOVERY.GOV 17th, 2009. It is an unprecedented effort to jumpstart the economy, create or save jobs, and

put a down payment on addressing long-neglected challenges. Funding was provided to restore frequently flooded land to its natural state, rehabilitate aging watershed structures and establish floodplain easements. Oklahoma received \$13.45 million for the rehabilitation of 7 dams, \$1.45 million for 2 new watershed construction projects, and \$1.3 million for 17 remedial watershed repair projects. The ARRA has proven to be a prime example of what federal, state, and local agencies can accomplish when working in a solid partnership.
