- Park your car in your garage to increase the initial temperature of your engine and cabin.
- Combine trips when possible so that you drive less often with a cold engine.
- · Minimize idling to warm your car up. Most manufacturers recommend driving off gently after about 30 seconds.
- Check your tire pressure regularly. Tire pressure changes with temperature.

- Remove accessories that increase wind resistance, like roof racks, when not in use.
- Don't use seat warmers or defrosters more than necessary.
