FLUID MILK & CREAM REVIEW - WEST 09/03/09 - July 2009 POOL RECEIPTS of milk in CALIFORNIA total 2.986 billion pounds, 9.0% lower than last year. The July blend price, at a fat test of 3.51%, is \$9.97, 9 cents lower than June and \$7.86 less than July 2008. The percentage of receipts used in Class 1 products 15.89%. The July quota price is \$11.30 and the over quota price is \$9.60. These prices are 2 cents lower than June and \$7.75 less than a year earlier. Cumulative (YTD through July) pool numbers are running 6.6% lower (adjusted) than during the same period in 2008. The August 2009 4a price (butter/powder) in CALIFORNIA is \$10.21, 19 cents higher than July but \$6.03 lower than last year. The August 2009 4b price (cheese) is \$11.29, \$1.90 higher than July but \$4.85 lower than last year. Both the 4a and 4b prices are at the highest level recorded in 2009. CALIFORNIA milk production conditions are following trends of recent weeks. Weather conditions are generally neutral to the milk cows. Total output is lagging year ago levels. Several processors are reporting intakes at 3-5% lower, give or take, depending on multiple factors affecting the dairy industry including: milk prices, feed costs, herd reductions, sell offs, base plans, weather, ration changes, on farm milk utilization, and others. The impact of less milk in the processing stream is being dealt with by processors moving milk to maximize throughput in the most cost effective manner. The holiday weekend is not expected to cause any problems in handling milk supplies. Bottled milk needs are becoming fully established for school programs and retail orders are fair to good. ARIZONA milk output is showing slight recover as conditions moderate somewhat. Fluid milk continues to be moved out of state to help with shortages elsewhere. There will be no issues handling milk over the holiday and no milk is expected to come into the state for balancing. Currently, local bottled milk interest improved after schools restarted, but has leveled off. Retail orders are mostly steady with milk still being featured in ads and in store promotions. CREAM markets were tightest early in the week with offerings increasing later in the week. producers of higher class items were frontloading production schedules ahead of the holiday weekend and they will take down Cream for specific packaging, say rBGH-free or state specific, often remains in the tightest position. At midweek on Wednesday, September 2, the CME Group butter price closed at \$1.1700, up 0.25 cents from a week earlier. Cream multiples are holding mostly steady to lower on the bottom of the 113-127 range FOB. Multiples vary depending on class usage and basing points. Temperatures have moderated in the PACIFIC NORTHWEST. Night time temperatures in the 50's have made for comfortable cattle. Schools have started and are drawing fluid supplies to bottlers. Processors are reducing schedules to adapt to available supplies. Spot loads of milk are hard to come by. Good quality forage is available at prices well below last year. NASS reports baled alfalfa hay prices in Washington for mid-August at \$120.00/ton compared to \$250.00/ton last year. In UTAH AND IDAHO farm milk production is lower. School openings have increased demand for fluid milk and processors are seeing reduced receipts. Milk supplies are adequate to fill processors needs. Feed costs for milk producers are lower than last year. According to NASS, baled alfalfa hay prices in Idaho are at \$106.00/ton for mid-August compared to \$215.00/ton a year ago. http://www.ams.usda.gov/mnreports/md_da240.txt

BUTTER- WEST 09/02/09

Butter prices at the CME remain mostly steady. At midweek the CME price was \$1.17. The market has remained unchanged for the last five trading sessions. Cream offerings are trending lower, but demand remains good for available supplies. Retail sales for private label butter are increasing at the expense of branded product. Food service orders remain slow. Butter stocks in CME approved warehouses totaled 99.2 million pounds last week, compared to 97.1 million pounds for the previous week. This compares to 80.9 million pounds in 2008 and 139.1 million pounds in 2007. The normal pattern at this time of year is for stocks to be lowering. This increase is the second in three weeks to go against

the typical trend. According to ERS, commercial disappearance of butter for the first half of the year totals 746.9 million pounds, down 3.8% from last year on a daily average basis or 33.8 million pounds less than 2008. Prices for bulk butter range from 1 cent to 5 cents under the market, based on the CME with various time frames and averages used.

NONFAT DRY MILK - WEST 09/03/09 - Low/medium heat NDM prices in the West are generally unchanged. The market tone is steady to firm. Increases in index pricing will likely pull up the bottom end of the range over the next few weeks. Buying interest is mixed. Some buyers have coverage and are out of the market. Others are still looking for product; yet don't like the higher prices. Sales under contract are on the light side. Production schedules have been reduced with the declining milk supplies in the region. Producers are moving milk and condensed to keep efficient plants full and do maintenance on other plants. Export interest remains limited outside of DEIP. Export sales of NDM/SMP into the DEIP program have been active during the past week with 2,390 MT (5.3 million pounds) of powder accepted for September-October delivery. Bonuses range from \$130-235 per MT. For the week of August 24-28, the West offered 2.0 million pounds of NDM to the CCC product price support program. No sales have occurred so far this Western high heat market prices are mixed, but generally trending higher. Some adjustments to index pricing are being made on the bottom of the range. Supplies are tight with many end users not finding the volumes they desire for their current and future needs. Uncertainty about availability has many buyers trying to extend coverage with some more concerned about coverage than cost.

According to ERS, Commercial Disappearance of American cheese for the first six months of the year totaled 2,049.6 million pounds, up 85.2 million pounds or 4.9% more than the same period last year on a daily average basis. Disappearance of cheese in the Other category totals 2,997.5 million pounds, up 1.1% from last year or 15.3 million lbs.
