

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LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT





Academic Year (AY) 2016 was another successful year for JSOU and moves us forward to our goal of full operational capability in fiscal year (FY) 2018. This year's highpoints were the initiation of the postgraduate accreditation process

with ACICS,* launching two new postgraduate-level SOF certificates, completing a major overhaul of the entire JSOU Enlisted Academy (JSOU-EA) curriculum, developing academic partnerships with five civilian universities, and meeting all the theater special operations commands (TSOC) and components' education requests. During the year, HQ USSOCOM validated the Future JSOU Concept and its associated manpower, while approving a revised JSOU Charter that made JSOU a direct reporting organization to the Commander. Of particular note was the completion of a modern 21st Century academic facility on MacDill AFB that will bring interactive classrooms, enhanced connectivity to the worldwide SOF Enterprise, and multiple instructional delivery methods to support SOF professional development.

Despite FY16 budget limitations, JSOU faculty delivered 228 courses and mobile education team (MET) events (+18%) while compiling 389 thousand total contact hours (+18%), which is a significant increase from prior years. This accounted for 14,222 students (+16%), a record high for JSOU, and continued the

phenomenal trend started when we relocated to Tampa. ISOU continued to focus on increasing education opportunities for U.S. SOF, the joint force and the interagency by adding 12 new resident courses, supporting over 1500 additional students in resident courses, and adding 70,000 (+58%) contact hours. Although no distance learning courses were added, completions of distance learning courses increased by 750 students (+19%) and all newly added courses included a substantial (minimum of four weeks) online presence.

The ISOU-EA continues to receive high marks from both students and the command's senior enlisted leadership. In conjunction with Headquarters and Component Command Senior Enlisted Leader input, the EA Commandant fully implemented a complete renewal of the academy's four-course Career Education Program (CEP). Its unifying theme aligned joint professional military education objectives across the four career courses (from E6 through nominative E9), and incorporated the Chairman, Joint Chiefs of Staff Desired Learning Attributes. Despite lower than normal student output this year (-99), due primarily to conducting pilot courses, overall student contact hours increased by 22 thousand (+27%). This trend will significantly improve in AY17 where enrollment is already increasing. Most notable is the formal recognition our program received from the U.S. Army, making JSOU's Joint SOF Senior Enlisted Academy course (JSOFSEA) equivalent to the Sergeants Major

In AY16, despite an undermanned situation, the Center for Special Operations Studies and

Research (CSOSR) exceeded all goals by publishing 13 monographs, five occasional papers (a new format for JSOU) and conducting two successful symposiums — one with Canadian Special Operations Forces Command's Professional Development Center. The annual SOF Research Topics Workshop developed a wide range of topics, prioritized by experts from across our SOF community. The Commander-tasked Syrian Train and Equip study is in final review and promises to be a strategic reference document for future operations of this type. ISOU sponsored three successful "Capstone" projects that brought civilian undergraduate and graduate students from Tufts University, Middlebury College, and Auburn University to the command to research key topics. Results were outstanding and provided unique approaches and solutions while building interest in USSOCOM with our civilian academic partners.

In February 2016, the Commander approved an updated Charter that reaffirmed ISOU as a direct reporting educational activity of the Command and designated the President as his senior academic advisor. Included in the Charter is a provision to establish a Board of Regents to provide top-down guidance to the university, to assure it meets the academic needs of the SOF community. JSOU also completed a first look by ACICS, a national agency for postgraduate accreditation. Fundamental to this process, JSOU implemented numerous academic improvements, stressing student learning, program excellence, and institutional effectiveness endorsed by peer academic institutions. Also in AY16, JSOU continued its support to the NATO SOF Headquarters and its affiliated partners by attaining Allied Command Transformation quality assurance certification of JSOU courses. This credential enhances our growing International

Engagement commitment that completed 103 courses and Mobile Education Team (MET) events (+33%) supporting every TSOC and reaching 2537 total international students, a 30% increase over the prior

As we enter AY17, the final steps in the JSOU transformation are underway, led by the hard work, initiative, and vision of a dedicated faculty and staff. To complete this transformation, JSOU will relocate to the new academic facility (Dec 2016 through Feb 2017 timeframe) while maintaining established commitments, courses, and programs. We will rapidly adapt to the capabilities inherent in this facility and take maximum advantage of its high-tech potential for improved student learning while increasing education opportunities throughout the SOF Enterprise, coordinating support, curricula, and interaction through JSOU liaisons, SOF Chairs, and component education representatives. AY17 initiatives also include establishing a Countering Weapons of Mass Destruction curricula and increasing Cyber-related topics in existing courses. I am hopeful that Congress will favorably consider JSOU's legislative proposal for Title 10 Civilian Faculty Hiring Authority in the near future. All considered, these milestones will complete JSOU's transformation and inaugurate a new era in SOF education wherein ISOU fully supports the emerging academic and intellectual needs of our community and partners.




The first choice for special operations education and knowledge throughout the world.

Faculty and Staff

To accomplish its mission, JSOU employs an extremely diverse workforce, all of whom are hired or assigned to a variety of staffing programs. The staff and faculty include active duty, active reserve, temporary duty reserve military personnel, government civilians, civilian contractors, private consultants, guest lecturers, and speakers. Simply put, the university could not perform as well as it does without the diverse efforts of all of these people.

JSOU's active duty military personnel are assigned by USSOCOM or the Service components. Reserve component military personnel serve in whatever way best supports the organizational mission as directed by JSOU leadership. Government civilians are hired through the U.S. Civil Service personnel system, and non-government civilians are hired in accordance with appropriately submitted and funded contracts. Adjunct faculty and guest speakers/lecturers are hired on an as-needed basis to support specific educational requirements. Active duty and reserve military personnel are typically assigned to specific educational support requirements, i.e., to act as course directors or subject matter experts, but some are assigned to support mission and unit administration positions. Government civilians and civilian contractors also fill both educational and support roles. Personnel funding is obtained from standard and nonstandard sources. For example, reserve personnel positions are not funded by JSOU, while some civilian staff positions are paid by limited grants or unfunded requirement requests.

All faculty members attend the Faculty Development Course (FDC) or an approved substitute course. The FDC prepares JSOU faculty members and other selected SOF instructors develop and teach curriculum while creating active learning environments focused on higher levels of learning through

the use of various teaching methodologies. The curriculum is based on the Joint Professional Military Education Instructional Systems Design (ISD) model applied in the joint SOF environment. Instructors are categorized as instructor, senior instructor, and master instructor. Listed below are the requirements for each of the categories:

Instructor – Complete FDC or be granted a waiver by the Dean of Academics. In addition to:

- Certified to teach at least one ISOU lesson
- Complete 12 continuing education units (CEU) each academic year
- Complete the online instruction module of the FDC if teaching online or blended learning courses
- Annual instructor evaluation
- Maintain faculty folder

Senior Instructor – Complete all the requirements of an Instructor in addition to:

- Certified to teach five JSOU lessons
- Record 100 hours of classroom instruction at JSOU
- Instructor evaluation score of 90 on higher on last two evaluations
- Department director recommendations

Master Instructor – Complete all the requirements of an Instructor in addition to:

- Five years of teaching experience (may include experience outside of JSOU)
- Senior instructor for one year
- Record 200 hours of classroom instruction at JSOU
- Obtain a nationally recognized teaching certification

Certified Higher Education Professional

A certified higher education professional (CHEP) certification recognized employees of career education institutions who strive for excellence in their respective positions. Through completion of educational programs, individuals have enhanced their skills necessary to deliver the highest quality education to diverse student populations. The programs are designed to increase strategies for teaching and learning in adult educational environments, techniques for engaging and motivating students of various learning styles, and methods for improving both retention and student learning outcomes.

Academic Guidance for AY17

Strategic Objective

Support the USSOCOM Commander's priorities of:

- 1. Win
- 2. Transform
- 3. People

His overriding direction is that USSOCOM is a command at war and always will be engaged in some phase of the continuum of conflict. Therefore, the command must achieve geographic combatant commander objectives via transregionally synchronized steady state missions that provide a range of options to act and influence with and through our partners. SOF strategic options to national leadership short of major armed conflict. Our principal weapon is our people and their development to be more adaptive, agile, flexible, bold, and innovative must continue in our educational programs.

JSOU will develop supporting programs, SOF-specific curricula, and focused research efforts derived from these priorities and remain engaged with appropriate headquarters' sections and subject matter experts to fully meet the needs of the SOF community. Our end state will be an updated spectrum of relevant activities that foster individual and organizational learning and knowledge applications that make JSOU a unique and valued part of the SOF Enterprise.

General Guidance

AY17 will be the final year of ISOU's transformation which began in AY15. Our goal is to reach full operational capability as early as possible in AY18, consistent with the USSO-COM Commander's vision found in the white paper, The Future Direction of the Joint Special Operations University during the Period 2015-2025. This concept was subsequently SOCREB-validated in the JSOU DOTMLPF-P Change Request (DCR), dated 04 August 2015 and, together with the updated ISOU Charter, is the strategic document guiding us today. To date, this transformation has been ongoing and reflective of the hard work, initiative, and vision of ISOU's dedicated faculty and staff. With numerous milestones successfully accomplished, it is time to complete the transformation, adapt the commander's priorities into our programs, and inaugurate a new era in SOF education wherein JSOU fully supports the emerging academic and intellectual needs of our community and partners.

To complete this transformation, JSOU must accomplish the following:

- 1. Adhere to the tenets and requirements of the revised Charter for the Joint Special Operations University, dated 09 February 2016. This reaffirms JSOU as a direct reporting educational activity and provides authorities that assure our contribution to future SOF capability.
- 2. Develop a wide range of innovative teaching methodol-

- ogies and learning applications that leverage advanced classroom technologies available in the new JSOU academic facility.
- 3. Establish an accreditation portfolio that assures nationally recognized institutional accreditation and provides postgraduate credit recommendations for designated courses. Maintain NATO accreditation using Allied Command Transformation standards while exploring international acceptance for appropriate programs and courses.
- 4. Smoothly relocate to the new academic facility while maintaining established commitments, courses, and programs. Rapidly adapt to the capabilities inherent in the new facility and take maximum advantage of its high-tech potential for improved student learning.
- 5. Establish countering weapons of mass destruction curricula supporting USSOCOM's mission.
- 6. Increase communication throughout JSOU, coordinating support, curricula, and interaction among all departments, including JSOU liaison officers, SOF chairs, and component education representatives. Success here will help establish a viable SOF education network in the future.
- 7. Invest in our people. Like our parent command, JSOU is a people-based organization and relies entirely on their professionalism, knowledge, initiative, and commitment. For JSOU to be successful, we must value their many significant contributions and maintain viable programs to continue their development.

Accreditation

JSOU is an accredited institution. Accreditation is a voluntary method of quality assurance developed by American universities and secondary schools. The accreditation process effectively drives organizational performance by continuously monitoring the improvement of the educational system. Accreditation examines the whole institution, including the programs, the cultural context and the community of stakeholders, to determine how well the parts work together to meet student needs. In 2015, ISOU was granted a five-year reaccreditation with the Accrediting Council for Continuing Education & Training (ACCET). ACCET was founded in 1974 for the purpose of improving continuing education and training and has been officially recognized by the U.S. Department of Education since 1978. In 1998, ACCET became the only recognized accrediting agency to be certified as an ISO 9001-Quality Management System under the international standards established by the International Organization for Standardization and continues to hold that unique status.

AY16 Highlights and Accomplishments

Department of Academic Affairs

USSOCOM's mission has evolved rapidly since September 2001 as has the need for an innovative and educated SOF. For more than 16 years, JSOU has been working to integrate and transition the educational mission and academic processes to accommodate the ever-expanding changes in the world of special operations. During AY16, JSOU successfully met its goals by tailoring and expanding course offerings, aggressively pursuing faculty development, implementing the use of educational technology, and utilizing METs for course delivery to remote locations. JSOU also increased its educational integration with joint and Service PME institutions. As JSOU prepared to move into its new campus, it has transformed its organization and staffing to maximize the positive impact on education that these new state-of-the-art facilities will provide.

JSOU executed a leadership transition and immediately began work on aligning with institutional priorities. A coordinated application of personnel formed an accreditation team to ensure academic standards could meet any accreditation agency standard. The learning management system and instructional design personnel were collocated to establish educational technology support to improve distance learning education and technology while implementing in-classroom educational technology that takes full advantage of the new ISOU campus.

Critical to goals linked to educational and information technology, the divisions of the Department of Academic Affairs each began synchronized tasks. Information Technology created a new student information system that improves student enrollment and institutional research analyses. The revised JSOU SharePoint portal offered a standardized methodology for information retrieval. The JSOU operations schedule included scheduling opportunities based on classroom technology. Faculty Development created an enhanced online presence. Institutional Research selected courses to survey students in an online environment. Finally, in parallel to the enhanced technology capabilities, analysis of assessment of student learning outcomes on the course level added to evaluating the effectiveness and comprehensiveness of the institutional effectiveness processes.

College of Special Operations

In AY16, the College of Special Operations (CSO) continued to improve and expand its course offerings and faculty research to the SOF community.

The Department of Undergraduate Studies' existing portfolio of five courses in subjects critical to special operations –

understanding strategic context, influence operations, cultural analysis, interagency collaboration, and irregular warfare — were delivered multiple times at the Service components and in Tampa. These accredited courses helped prepare students for deployments or staff assignments throughout the SOF Enterprise and, for those individuals seeking collegelevel education, an avenue for JSOU courses to fulfill a transfer-credit opportunity.

The largest growth in new courses in the College of Special Operations consisted of the development of two new SOF-unique graduate-level certificate programs in the Graduate Department. The Advanced Special Operations Intelligence Certificate examines the traditional roles, planning responsibilities, and interagency relationships between the intelligence community and special operations. The graduate-level courses are Covert Actions and SOF Sensitive Activities, The Intelligence Community and SOF, Intelligence Support to Counter-Proliferation Design, and Cyber and Special Operations.

The Advanced Special Operations Chaplain Certificate provides a rigorous academic foundation for chaplains in support of USSOCOM's Preservation of the Force and Family spiritual domain. The curriculum helps SOF chaplains delve deeper into how their faith speaks to others in a pluralistic environment and what their faith brings toward providing a ready and resilient force with a focus on mitigating suicide and other stress-related conditions encountered by SOF Service members and families.

Numerous faculty members from across the teaching departments in the college contributed to the body of knowledge through active research, published works, and presentations both internally and externally to USSOCOM and the DoD. A few examples included research, analysis, and written chapters to command-directed studies (e.g., the Syrian Train and Equip Program); publishing two separate but complementary theories of special operations in support of the Special Operations Theory Symposium; and presentations on Countering Violent Extremist Organizations in Southeast Asia for programs sponsored by Pacific Special Operations Command.

Late in 2016, the College of Special Operations began assessing where content relevant to USSOCOM's new synchronization mission in countering weapons of mass destruction is needed in existing or new courses/certificates.

Enlisted Academy

In AY16, the Joint Special Operations University Enlisted Academy (JSOU-EA) conducted numerous outreach activities, revised and updated all program curricula, and continued to execute SOF-specific joint PME. JSOU-EA recognizes

the importance of creating relationships and partnerships with organizations outside the academy to foster innovation and provide unique opportunities for our enlisted students. From an outreach perspective, JSOU-EA contributed to the annual Service Academy's Commandant's Workshop at the Navy Senior Enlisted Academy in Newport, R.I. and provided SOF-specific joint PME to support the Enlisted Military Review Council (EMERC) and the Joint Enlisted Curriculum Conference (JECC).

To ensure alignment with other educational organizations, JSOU-EA fostered partnerships for international outreach with NATO's special operations school by conducting enlisted PME meetings and briefings. The JSOFSEA completed a curriculum "crosswalk" with United States Army Sergeant Major Academy (USASMA) and is now codified in the new AR 350-1 for equivalency to USASMA and other senior enlisted PME institutions. Also, to enhance interagency participation, JSOFSEA enrolled a Department of Homeland Security (DHS) student.

JSOU-EA strengthened its alignment with degree programs from Norwich University, University of Charleston West Virginia, and Excelsior partner schools and created opportunities for ISOFSEA and Summit students to earn undergraduate and graduate-level credits. To ensure relevance, meet the ever-changing needs of the SOF operator, and align with command guidance, JSOU-EA engages in a regular and thorough curriculum review process. JSOU-EA revised and refined the Joint Fundamentals and Enterprise Management curriculum by updating lessons to reflect current DoD references and command guidance, and the program was extended to eight and a half weeks to account for pre-course tasks. JSOFSEA revised and executed new curriculum that included dividing the program into distinct courses: Profession of Arms, Leadership, Communications, IIIM, Policy to Action, and Magnet Capstone. This revision allowed for greater alignment with current PME requirements. The Summit Course established an alumni bi-annual webinar that discusses SOF topics of importance.

JSOU-EA's CEPs provided joint PME to more than 585 personnel (E6-E9) in FY16. The Joint Fundamentals Course enrolled over 500 students, and the Enterprise Management Course enrolled over 500 students with 95% on a college degree completion track. The JSOFSEA program enrolled 204 students and will increase class size to 60 students in FY17. The Summit Course provided 30 graduates for 16 nominative billets.

Center for Continuing Education

The Center for Continuing Education (CCE) conducts resident and MET courses throughout the enterprise to provide operational-level educational support to USSOCOM Staff, TSOCs, the global network of international partners, and USSOCOM components. CCE is comprised of four institutions that handle the diverse needs of the students.

The Institute for Staff Education's primary focus is to deliver courses that prepare joint special operations headquarters personnel to operate and function effectively as joint staff members. To maximize student accessibility and professional development opportunities, the institute offered a wide range of resident and online instruction as well as off-campus courses conducted by METs. During AY16, the institute continued to support TSOC educational requirements through the TSOC Staff Education Course, the TSOC-Staff Preparation Course, and the Special Operations Forces Security Cooperation Course. The institute conducted courses in support of many of the USSOCOM Headquarters staff sections, such as the surgeons, chaplains, financial managers, and public affairs officers. Additionally, the institute continued to reach more students through its three online courses: Introduction to Special Operations Forces (ISOF), Joint Special Operations Task Force-Level 1 (JSOTF), and the Introduction to Irregular Warfare Course (I2W). Over 4,500 students completed one of these courses in AY16.

The Institute for Planning and Operations increased iterations of the Special Operations Planning Course, the Introduction to Design Thinking Course, and the Design for Practitioners Course to enable design team members and planners to support the SOF Enterprise.

During AY16, the Combined/Joint Force Special Operations Component Commander's Course, the USSOCOM Commander's Joint Special Operations Forces Pre-Command Course, and the forum for retired SOF senior leaders had the largest student population in JSOU history. These courses provided commanders a direct opportunity to educate current and future SOF leadership while informing past leaders of programs that are important to the SOF Enterprise.

In AY16 the Institute for International Education conducted over 80 METs with over 25 global partners using non-Major Force Program 11 funding sources to build special operations partnerships. The institute supports TSOC security cooperation priorities with SOF, interagency partners, and allies worldwide. Also, the institute continued to build its relationship with the Colombian Regional Center for Strategic Security Studies.

Center for Special Operations Studies and Research

During AY16, the CSOSR implemented its strategy to increase professional development events, leverage external research, and diversify published works. Overall, the CSOSR provided the SOF Enterprise with a scholarly forum to shape special operations thinking, policy formulation, and academic debate.

The center's academic partnership with the Canadian Special Operations Forces Command (CANSOFCOM), now in its fifth year of collaboration, continues to be a highlight for professional exchange. More than ten JSOU faculty members delivered a symposium in Ottawa, Canada from 6-7 April 2016. "SOF Leadership in the Contemporary Security Environment," was the year's premier SOF leadership symposium hosted by CANSOFCOM with CSOSR academic support and included participation by Great Britain, Australia, New Zealand, and Canada.

The CSOSR conducted a symposium on "Special Operations Theory," from 30-31 August 2016, featuring keynote presentations by Admiral (ret) Eric T. Olson, Lieutenant General (ret) Charles Cleveland, and Naval Postgraduate School Professor Dr. Hy Rothstein. The Resident Senior Fellows led four panels through an exploration of special operations theory, whether such a theory is necessary, and implications for the enterprise with or without an accepted and distinct theory. Almost 100 participants from US-SOCOM, representatives from each Service component, external researchers, and a cohort from JSOFSEA joined the conversation.

During the year, the CSOSR offered civilian institutions the opportunity to present external research to USSOCOM senior leadership and staff. In December 2015, a student team from the Cyber Research Center at Auburn University examined influence operations to counter cyber adversaries. A team of graduate students from the Middlebury Institute of International Studies at Monterey provided a cultural analysis on predicting, preventing, preempting, and prosecuting hostage events. In early 2016, three graduate students from the Fletcher School of Law and Public Diplomacy at Tufts University presented a study on Russian Hybrid Warfare.

CSOSR Resident Senior Fellows continued to teach, engage in academic events with partners, and participate in thesis reviews for the College of International Security Affairs at the National Defense University. The Resident Senior Fellows also led a command-directed study on the Syria Train and Equip mission and published independent articles in Joint Forces Quarterly and the Special Operations Research Association, Special Operations Journal.

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LIBRARY

The USSOCOM Research Library continued its support to the headquarters and the SOF Enterprise, and served as an academic library to JSOU. The library staff maintained a growing and relevant physical collection of books, audiobooks, videos, and periodicals. The 5-8% annual growth of the library's print collection remained steady, matching new acquisitions against the USSOCOM Commander's recommended reading list, faculty recommendations to support course readings and research, command staff requests in support of analysis for command-directed programs, and general patron interests relevant to special operations.

The library's virtual collection of e-books and online scholarly databases comprised of research materials pertinent to SOF studies and related disciplines also increased in AY16. Two examples of new databases included Taylor and Francis' Social Sciences and Humanities database and ProQuest's Digital National Security Archive and Global Newsstream. Combined with the library's existing 16 databases, patrons now have an increased capability in accessing historical and contemporary global news and products, decreasing reliance on ordering and receiving the products via interlibrary loan.

The library staff completed an extensive library cataloging project in 2016, correcting and aligning all catalog entries for the entire library collection for the first time in many years. This cataloging update, combined with the existing

library proxy and discovery system available to library account holders, allows patrons to accurately browse the print and e-book collection online. This is important because the number of library patrons worldwide has increased by 39%.

Service to ISOU students remained steady in AY16 and is projected to increase once the main

and satellite libraries are combined on the new JSOU campus next year. The library staff is improving its processing and staffing to provide library registration, interlibrary loans, research and database instruction (both in the classroom and one-on-one), and reference services.

With the move to the new ISOU facility, the design plan for the new library will be fully realized with larger collaboration areas, increased shelving, increased number of student accessible computers, and a classified library to give students a place to conduct classified research projects. Next to the classified library will be the USSOCOM History Office with which the library staff will collaborate more frequently in an effort to make their resources more accessible to ISOU's students and faculty.

ACADEMIC COUNSELING CENTER

The JSOU Academic Counseling Center was established to help the SOF community further their civilian education and to enhance their professional knowledge and capabilities. The JSOU academic advisors can assist each SOF member as they navigate their educational journey and help prepare them for academic and professional success. JSOU has articulation agreements with civilian colleges and universities so that our students can maximize their

military training and education by receiving upper-level and graduate-level college credit for JSOU courses. JSOU is partnered with Excelsior College, Saint Leo University, Norwich University, and the University of Charleston. JSOU's partnerships allow the SOF community to be able to complete either a bachelor's or master's degree from a regionally accredited school within two years fully online. The Academic Counseling Center advises over 1.500 students annually

across the SOF Enterprise. This year the Academic Counseling Center is expanding its partnerships and degree program offerings by increasing articulation agreements to an additional three universities. The intent is that through supportive and tailored advising, more SOF enlisted Soldiers will achieve an educational milestone that supports the USSOCOM Commander's commitment to educating special operations forces.

JSOU PRESS



ISOU Press is the publishing JSOU arm of the CSOSR. JSOU Press products include over 130 published monographs,

occasional papers, special reports, case studies, and directed studies in both printed and digital format. Established in April 2005, JSOU Press is largely identified through the line of JSOU Press monographs. During AY16, JSOU Press published 13 monographs and five occasional papers authored by JSOU Senior Fellows, PME students, and other scholars on topics relevant to the joint SOF community.

The Special Operations Research Topics publication is promulgated each academic year to stimulate interest for research projects relevant to the SOF Enterprise. Widely distributed, the topics list is aligned with the USSOCOM Commander's priorities and serves to influence and guide SOF-relevant research throughout academia, think tanks, and PME institutions.



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THE JSOU CAMPUS

In 2017 JSOU will open the doors to its new main campus. Collocated with the USSOCOM Headquarters at MacDill AFB in Tampa, this modern facility is specifically designed with education in mind, serving as the central hub for innovative, joint SOF education while supporting traditional resident courses.

The campus is an instructional system composed of classroom/seminar rooms with adjoining breakout spaces, two auditoriums, faculty and staff office spaces, the USSOCOM Library and the History Office, media development areas, organizational support facilities, and student areas. It will also host an array of integrated modern capabilities to best facilitate traditional, blended, and online learning.

The new campus' capabilities allow an unprecedented

distance learning capability to enable real-time education across multiple locations to include the component headquarters, the National Capital Region, and the TSOCs. This capability will minimize travel while increasing opportunities for peer-to-peer interaction in local SOF communities and expanding the availability of expertise throughout the joint SOF education network.

Within the campus halls will be the College of Special Operations, the JSOU Enlisted Academy, the Center for Continuing Education, the Center for Special Operations Studies and Research, and the Department of Academic Affairs.

This world-class facility represents the significant commitment of USSOCOM to educate its force. The move to this new building ensures the university is well on its way to becoming a preeminent 21st century educational institution recognized as the center for joint special operations learning and research.


COURSE DEMOGRAPHICS AND EVALUATIONS




AY16 Student Contact Hours



PERCENTAGE OF TOTAL STUDENT CONTACT HOURS


AY16 Students By Profession/Specialty




AY16 Student Demographics by Service and Method of Instruction

End-of-Course Evaluations

At the end of each Resident, JSOU-EA, MET, and DL course, students are asked to indicate the extent to which they agree with the following overall course evaluation statements:

- 1. The course was well organized.
- 2. The objectives of the course were successfully achieved.
- 3. The content of the course was what I expected or better.
- 4. The information provided in the course will be useful to me in my job.
- 5. I would recommend this course to others.

Each student response is rated on a five-point scale, ranging from strongly disagree, or 1, to strongly agree, or 5. Lesson-by-lesson and overall course feedback results are collated, analyzed, and reported to the course directors. The overall score reflects the mean of the responses for the five end-of-course evaluation responses. The university average is shown in the last row of the table. This information is also included with each course description on the pages that follow. Evaluations of supported PME, pilot courses, and unique/tailored educational events are not included in the university average.

Target Population



Course capacity is determined by the size of the course's target populations and practical scheduling considerations. Major target populations include: SOF and SOF enablers, interagency partners, and coalition partners. Registering students were asked to select the appropriate SOF category to describe their overall career experience using the definitions provided.

SOF: A person whose skill, function, or specialty is designated to the successful conduct of a special operations core objective.

SOF Enabler: A person whose skill, function, or specialty is essential and designated to support a special operations core objective or a person whose job or duty is not specifically designated as a SOF specialty.

Non-SOF: A person whose skill, function, or specialty is not essential to the successful conduct of a special operations core objective.







Attendance by SOF Category




International Engagement




College of Special Operations CSO

CSO consists of four main departments; Special Operations Undergraduate Studies, Special Operations Graduate Studies, Professional Military Education Support, and the USSOCOM Research Library. The undergraduate and graduate studies departments are responsible for the development and delivery of accredited courses and recognized certificates that support a unifying subject area or discipline beneficial to SOF. PME support includes curricula development and faculty expertise to SOF electives or core curricula to the Service and joint PME community. ISOU has liaisons at most of the components that support both PME and JSOU curricula execution. The USSOCOM Research Library supports the USSOCOM Headquarters and SOF Enterprise staff personnel with research materials as well as performing as an academic research library to ISOU students and faculty.








JSOU-EA designs, develops, and implements joint SOF enlisted PME by incorporating the USSOCOM CEP. Enlisted SOF operators and select enablers are taught how to strategically understand and appreciation the future SOF operating environment. The program educates enlisted leaders from the four SOF Service components into a joint learning environment using a blended learning model that combines instructor-facilitated distance learning with resident classroom instruction. Joint educational areas include strategic thinking, national security policy and strategy, doctrine, defense enterprise, management, business application, theater strategy and campaigning, contemporary operations, and enterprise-specific topics.

JSOU-EA has established articulation agreements providing transferable undergraduate and graduate-level civilian college credit. The CEP consists of four PME progressive education continuums: the Joint Fundamentals Course for E6s, the Enterprise Management Course for E7s, JSOFSEA for E8s, and the Summit Course for nominative command E9s.




Attendance by SOF Category






Center for Continuing Education CCE






Attendance by SOF Category
