<u>COURSE DESCRIPTION:</u> Lean Manufacturing. 3 hours. This course involves the study and application of Lean Principles. Emphasis is placed on material flow analysis, process and continuous improvement techniques, along with employee development and empowerment as integral aspects of Lean Manufacturing. The course addresses not only Lean Manufacturing techniques as applied throughout production processes, but also the application of Lean extending upstream in coordination with suppliers. The associated integrative concepts of Lean provide the framework for the course. Prerequisites(s): MGMT 3830.

#### **COURSE OBJECTIVES:**

- 1.) To introduce the student to Lean Manufacturing; this includes an exposure to the terminology, concepts, techniques, etc. associated with the area.
- 2.) To develop the students understanding of value-added vs. non value-added activities in a production process.
- 3.) To provide the students with Lean tools for analyzing material flow and understanding application of those tools for improving productivity in a production process.
- 4.) To develop the students understanding of continuous improvement and Lean Sustainment.

#### **GRADING:**

Individual Submissions 30%

Participation, Class Preparation, Attendance & Misc. Exercises 10%

#### Exams:

Exams will come from class lectures and discussions, assigned readings, and other materials covered in the course (i.e., overhead slides, class handouts, assigned problems, videos, research topics, etc.).

#### **Individual Submissions:**

Assignments involving an individual's understanding and approach to applying the Lean tools in a production setting. Individual submissions will account for 30% of the individual's overall grade.

### Participation, Class Preparation, Attendance/Tardiness, Quizzes & Misc. Exercises:

Students are expected to <u>read all assigned materials prior to class</u> and raise questions about the material presented in lectures. Volunteering related information (e.g., comments pertaining to experience, recent newspaper articles, etc.) will also add to the quality of the class. Participation points will be awarded for individual contribution (misc. assignments, discussion in class, etc.) and attendance is necessary for that contribution. Participation, attendance, etc. accounts for 10% of the course grade.

## Endangered Languages

LING 2040, Fall 2016

#### About the Course

By some estimates half of the 6,500 languages spoken in the world today could be lost within the present century. In this course we will investigate why languages become endangered and methods used to stabilize and revitalize languages. In addition to learning about linguistic diversity, the course provides students a global survey of cultures, political ecologies, and environmental issues.

#### Required Readings

#### **Prerequisites**

There is no prerequisite for this course

#### Attendance Policy

Three or more absences will result in your grade being lowered by one letter grade.

#### **Grading Policy**

The assignments for this course all require research and writing.

- 1. Survey of endangered languages: You will select an area from the *Atlas of the World's Languages in Danger* (I'll explain how in class). You will prepare a report (to present in class and turn in) on the linguistic situation of the area you've selected. You will provide reasons why languages in that area are endangered. How does the language fit into typologies of endangerment? What are the domains of use? Have there been efforts at revitalization? [20%]
- 2. Website review: You will review the website of an endangered language project, e.g. <a href="http://qenaga.org/">http://qenaga.org/</a>. What is the general design of the website? What multimedia recourses are linked to for revitalization purposes? How does the website deal with orthography? For which audiences is it meant? How is the resource to be used by the community? [30%]
- 3. Revitalization efforts. You will review revitalization efforts of a particular endangered language community. What are the vitality surveys conducted, what immersion teaching and documentary methods are in place, what are the results of language teaching, are there new native speakers? [30%]
- 4. Summary and commentary (2 pages each) on 5 articles of your choice on the topic of endangered languages to be handed in May 12<sup>th</sup>. Three of the articles you read should be from the class readings [20%].

Rationale For and a Description of the Proposed Grad Track Pathway:

The Grad Track option is intended for our high-achieving UNT BME undergraduate students. This Grad Track option will benefit both the students and the department.

- 1. The students will get an early start for their MS program. They will save both time and money with the 9 hours of double counted credits.
- 2. The department will recruit and retain high-achieving UNT undergraduate students to strengthen our graduate program.
- The Grad Track option has been offered in other peer institutes such as Texas Tech University and UT-Dallas. We need a similar program to make both of our BS and MS degree programs competitive for high-quality students.

2. Administration of the Grad Track Pathway (Verify That All Appropriate Undergraduate Learning Outcomes are Met Through the Approved Courses):

- The student's applications to BME Grad Track Program will be reviewed by both BME undergraduate coordinator and BME graduate advisor (admissions criteria is listed in Section 3), and will be admitted only when approved by both BME undergraduate coordinator and BME graduate advisor.
- 2. The student's progress will be advised, monitored and assessed by both BME undergraduate coordinator (before completing BS degree) and BME graduate advisor (after completing BS degree).
- 3. The students will be considered undergraduates until all undergraduate requirements have been met and the Bachelor's degree has been posted to the student's transcript. They will not be eligible for teaching and research assistantships and related health insurance, financial aid, or graduate award programs until the undergraduate degree is completed.
- Undergraduate students who have been accepted to a Grad Track option should complete all of their bachelor's degree requirements and graduate within 12 months of the first day of the semester for which they start taking graduate courses or enrollment in graduate level course work will be suspended. The students must enroll in graduate school in the long semester after finishing his/her BS degree. If the student did not enroll in graduate school in the long semester after finishing his/her BS degree, those graduate course credit hours will not be counted anymore for the MS degree even if the student comes back for graduate school in the future.

Admissions Criteria (Beyond a GPA Assessment):

- 1. Student should be a major in UNT Biomedical Engineering's BS program.
- Student can apply for the Grad Track option form his/her junior year (completed at least 75 credit hours, a benchmark is if the student is ready for BME Senior Design in the following Fall semester).
- Minimum of 3.3 or higher cumulative GPA required at the time of application submission, and with an average

- grade of at least 3.5 for BME core courses BMEN 1300, BMEN 2210, BMEN 2320, BMEN 3310, BMEN 3311, BMEN 3312, and BMEN 3321.
- 4. The students should provide two recommendation letter from BME faculty members with his/her application.
- 5. Application will be reviewed by both BME undergraduate advisor and graduate advisor.
- Once approved by the BME advisors, the student must apply to Toulouse Graduate School within the first semester of the senior year.
- 7. After being admitted in to the Grad Track program and completed at least 90 credit hours, the students can start taking the graduate courses as technical electives or biomedical electives for the BS degree requirement. For the graduate courses to be counted for the MS degree, the student should get a B or above for the courses.
- 8. The students admitted to the Grad Track option will be admitted into the MS program on a conditional basis. Once the student has satisfied all coursework for BS degree and maintained a 3.0 or higher GPA, he/she will be fully admitted to the MS program.

4. Standards and Procedures for Monitoring and Assessing Undergraduate Student Progress to Undergraduate Degree Completion:

- The students in the Grad Track program will be advised and monitored by both BME undergraduate coordinator (before completing BS degree) and BME graduate advisor (after completing BS degree).
- 2. The students should choose a major research advisor in the semester that the students start taking graduate course(s).
- 3. There will be an annual review of each student's academic progress in meeting both Bachelor's and Master's degree requirements. If failed to meet degree requirements, the student will be placed in probation period for one semester. If continuing to fail meeting degree requirements in the probation period, the student will be expelled from the Grad Track program (he/she will still be in the general BME BS degree program if meet all general BME BS degree requirements).
- 4. Undergraduate students who have been accepted to a Grad Track option should complete all of their bachelor's degree requirements and graduate within 12 months of the first day of the semester for which they start taking graduate course or enrollment in graduate level course work will be suspended.
- 5. The students must enroll in graduate school in the long semester after finishing his/her BS degree and should take the remaining graduate course in the following year(s) to complete his/her BMEN -MS degree. If the student did not enroll in graduate school in the long semester after finishing his/her BS degree, those graduate course credit hours will not be counted anymore for the MS degree even if the student comes back for graduate school in the future.
- 6. When a thesis is required for the Master's degree, the undergraduate honors thesis may not be substituted for the master's thesis.

1. Rationale For and a Description of the Proposed Grad Track Pathways:

Rehabilitation Studies undergraduate students accepted into our proposed Grad Track Pathway program will first earn their Bachelor's of Science in Rehabilitation Studies and, following successful completion of our graduate program, a Master's of Science in Rehabilitation Counseling.

Developing a Grad Track Pathway for undergraduate students to enroll in, and receive transfer credit for graduate level courses will achieve several positive outcomes:

- Increase the number of quality applicants to our graduate program in Rehabilitation Counseling since
  undergraduate students who successfully complete the Grad Track Pathway program will be able to
  transfer 12 credit hours (4 courses) toward their Master's degree. This will provide an important incentive
  for our undergraduate Rehabilitation Studies students to apply to our graduate program since this reduces
  the number of semesters required to complete our 48-credit hour graduate program from 6 semesters to 5.
- 2. The Department was awarded a grant from the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board Minority Health Research and Education Grant Program to develop an academic pathway for minority students at community colleges (Dallas and Collin County Community College systems) interested in an allied health career to efficiently transfer into our undergraduate program in Rehabilitation Studies. This Grad Pathway would offer these students an opportunity to efficiently transfer into our graduate program. There is a local and national need for qualified personnel from minority populations to serve in federal and state agencies to provide services to underrepresented individuals with disabilities.
- 3. Many of our graduate students go on to obtain their License as a Professional Counselor from the State of Texas, which currently requires applicants to have completed a 48-credit hour (minimum) counseling-related graduate program. Beginning in August 2017, the State of Texas will require applicants to have completed a 60-credit hour program. Our program will need to add an additional 12 credit hours to be compliant with State licensure requirements as well as our program's accreditation standards which requires we provide a pathway to licensure for our graduate students. Allowing students to complete 12 credit hours during their undergraduate program will allow students to complete a 60-credit hour master's degree in 6 semesters, rather than 7 or 8.

Currently, undergraduate students in our Rehabilitation Studies program are required to complete RHAB 4100 (Rehabilitation Service Delivery Systems), RHAB 4200 (Physical and Psychosocial Aspects of Disability), RHAB 4300 (Psychiatric Rehabilitation), and RHAB 4275 (Alcohol, Drugs, and Disability). Students accepted into the Grad Track Pathways program will be able to obtain credit for the above listed courses (all courses are 3 credit hours) by enrolling in the following graduate level courses:

RHAB 5700 (Introduction to Rehabilitation Counseling) ) = RHAB 4100 (Rehabilitation Service Delivery Systems)
RHAB 5730 (Medical and Psychosocial Aspects of Disability) = RHAB 4200 (Aspects of Disability)
RHAB 5732 (Principles of Psychiatric Rehabilitation) = RHAB 4300 (Introduction to Psychiatric Rehabilitation)
RHAB 5125 (Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse Counseling Models) = RHAB 4275 (Alcohol, Drugs, and Disability)

All of the graduate sections of these courses meet all of the learning objectives of the undergraduate course equivalent.

Undergraduate students will only be allowed to enroll in these courses once they have submitted an application to the Grad Pathway program. They must meet the requirements of the graduate program before they begin their graduate courses while completing their undergraduate degree and also upon graduation of their undergraduate degree. Once their degree is complete and meet all application requirements, they will be fully accepted into the graduate program.

We believe implementing a Grad Track Pathway program will benefit not only the undergrad rehab majors, but also increase graduate student enrollment, as well as increase the quality and diversity of new professionals who receive their education at UNT and are entering allied health fields in our communities.

Administration of the Grad Track (verify that all appropriate undergraduate learning outcomes are met through the approved courses);

The Council on Rehabilitation Education (CORE), the national accreditation body for rehabilitation counseling programs, accredits both our undergraduate Rehabilitation Studies and graduate Rehabilitation Counseling program. Accreditation is granted only after an extensive external review of the program, which includes ensuring that each of the student learning outcomes required by CORE are included in the courses throughout the program. Learning outcomes are identified and revised regularly based on the results of empirical research conducted every five years examining the roles and functions of rehabilitation professionals, and the knowledge required for effective and efficient practice in our field. The specific courses identified in this Pathways proposal, at both the undergraduate and graduate level, have been selected because of having similar learning outcomes, with the graduate level outcomes involving students demonstration of a more critical and deeper level of understanding of the topics and concepts covered in the course and the ability to demonstrate proficiency in applying those concepts in actual practice. Therefore students who successfully complete the graduate level courses included in this proposal will have achieved the learning outcomes in the related undergraduate courses.

Both the Undergraduate Coordinator and Graduate Coordinator will work together to monitor the administration of the proposed Pathway Program, including the recruitment of applicants, application process, and monitoring the academic progress of all students accepted into the Pathways program. Two faculty meetings are routinely conducted each month that specifically focus on issues relevant to the undergraduate and graduate program, respectively, and all faculty members attend each meeting (NOTE: all faculty in our department are required each semester to teach undergraduate and graduate courses). A list of students who have expressed interest, applied, and been accepted to the Pathways program will be maintained and faculty will be asked to evaluate student applications, as well as their progress throughout the semester and at the end of the semester. A formal evaluation process already takes place at the end of each semester for each graduate student—faculty members complete a survey regarding students' academic, clinical, and professional development as demonstrated in their classes. We will extend this formative and summative evaluation process to Pathways program students.

Recruitment materials will be developed and initially distributed to students in the Rehabilitation Studies program in a variety of ways, which include (a) our department's website, (b) announcements on student Blackboard courses, (c) our department's Facebook site, flyers located in, and near, the Department of Disability and Addiction Rehabilitation main office in Chilton Hall and UNT's Collegiate Recovery Program offices (located first floor Chilton Hall), (d) announcements and flyers sent to the PACS academic advisors, (e) through individual contact with students by instructors, and (f) at recruitment events at community colleges. Part of our overall recruitment plan for our graduate program is for faculty to visit other program's undergraduate classes (e.g., Psychology, Kinesiology) to introduce students to our program, which will include information about our Grad Track Pathways program. As a result of these various mechanisms through which information will be shared with current and potential students, we fully expect to generate increasing interest among undergraduate students who are seeking a more efficient and economical way in which to obtain a master's degree.

3. Admissions Criteria (beyond a GPA assessment):

Our admissions criteria for students applying to the Grad Track Pathways program will be consistent with the admissions processes and procedures for all applicants to our graduate program as well as require applicants to have completed at least 75 credit hours of their bachelor's degree.

Specifically, applicants to the Grad Track Pathways program will submit:

- (a) an application designed for Grad Track Pathways program applicants,
- (b) a signed copy of the "Conditional Admission and Advisor Course Approval Form (available from the Toulouse Graduate School),
- (c) a current copy of their unofficial transcript,
- (d) a self-statement of purpose as to why they are interested in the Pathways program as well as a description of their own career goals and how the graduate program will facilitate their achievement of that goal,
- (e) a resume of their work experience,
- (f) two letters of recommendation (one academic-related and one employment-related), and
- (g) completion of an interview with two faculty members from our department.

Successful applicants will meet the definition of "Exceptional Undergraduate Student". They will be those students who:

- 1. In their junior year of the Rehabilitation Studies program and have completed 90 credit hours,
- 2. have a cumulative GPA of 3.2 or higher at the time of their application, replace 3.2 with 3.5
- 3. whose resume, self-statement, letters of recommendation, and demonstration of interpersonal and professional skills during the interview are considered of high quality by the faculty in our department.

As is the process for graduate program applicants, our faculty will conduct a holistic review of each applicant to the Pathways program. Our holistic review is guided by a rubric created for graduate program applicants that provides an assessment of each applicants':

- Academic/Intellectual Merit (e.g., assessment of GPA, quality of letters of recommendation, quality of written selfstatement);
- Employment Experience (e.g., employment-related letters of recommendation, work experience in field), interview (demonstration of communication skills, professionalism, appropriate self-awareness, interpersonal skills, and appropriate self-disclosure), and
- 3. Broader Impact (e.g., potential to contribute to profession, discipline, and/or society, and potential to advance diversity by broadening global understanding and/or diverse points of view).

Faculty who conduct the interview, review and rank the applicant's application as being in the top 5% (Excellent), 10% (Very Good), 25% (Good), 50% (Average), or less than 50% (Below Average) and then present the application to a meeting attended by all faculty members in our department. Only applicants to the Pathways program who rank in the top 5-10% and have the approval of the Undergraduate and Graduate Coordinators, as well as the student's academic advisor and the majority of faculty present at the meeting in which applications are reviewed, will be accepted into the Pathways program. Applications will be accepted until July 15% for the Fall semester Pathway program classes, and November 30% for the Spring semester courses.

Successful applicants are conditionally admitted to the Grad Track Pathway program after completing 90 credit hours in their undergraduate degree program. Acceptance to the Pathways program does not imply the student has been fully admitted into the Graduate School, however, and the student must first complete his or her baccalaureate degree before acceptance into the graduate program. Applicants will be provided with a document that explains the application process and will state that, if accepted to the Pathways program, the student understands he or she is only conditionally accepted into the graduate program and must maintain a 3.2 GPA and be in good standing in the program before being accepted into the graduate program. Students whose GPA falls to between a 3.2 and 2.8 will be required to submit a new application to the graduate program (including a new statement of purpose, letters of recommendation, resume, and interview) as well as submit current GRE scores in order to be reconsidered for the graduate program.

4. Standards and Procedures for Monitoring Undergraduate Student Progress to Undergraduate Degree Completion:

Both the Undergraduate and Graduate Program Coordinators will monitor the academic progress of accepted students to the Pathways program. The Undergraduate Coordinator serves as an advisor (in addition to the PACS academic advisor who works with Rehabilitation Studies students) to students in the undergraduate Rehabilitation Studies program. Faculty will be asked midway through each semester, and at the end of the semester, to complete an evaluation form for each Pathways student that asks for information regarding the student's academic progress, clinical skills (e.g., communication skills, participation in discussion, etc.), and level of professionalism as demonstrated in the instructor's class. Faculty who indicate any concerns about the student's progress will discuss their concerns in a meeting with the Undergraduate and Graduate Program Coordinators so that appropriate action can be taken. Appropriate action will involve developing a remediation plan with the student, which will be monitored by the instructor and Undergraduate Program Coordinator. Upon successful completion of the remediation plan by the end of the semester, students will be approved for enrollment in the Pathway program courses in their 2<sup>nd</sup> semester. If the student does not successfully achieve the criterion outlined in the remediation plan, the student will be informed he or she will not be able to proceed in the Pathways program during their final semester and will enroll in the appropriate undergraduate course to complete his or her degree plan. Each Pathways student must achieve at least a B in all of their Graduate Pathways courses.
