WILL CAMPBELL

One of the North Texas jazz program's most brilliant graduates, Will Campbell achieved international notice as an alto saxophonist when Harry Connick invited him to tour for what would become a three-year engagement while the master's candidate was enrolled at UNT on the Graham Scholarship.

In addition to Connick, Campbell has performed with a roster of platinum artists, including Randy Brecker, Pete Christlieb, Frank Sinatra, Jr., Doc Severinsen, Louie Bellson and Bernadette Peters. His discography boasts ten recordings, including three CDs and one DVD with Connick, and three UNT Jazz recordings, including *One O'Clock Standard Time*: Remembering Gene Hall.

Today, Campbell is director of jazz studies and instructor of saxophone at the University of North Carolina-Charlotte and has served since 1999 on the UNT Summer Jazz Workshop faculty. Campbell has performed at conferences of North American Saxophone Alliance, World Saxophone See Campbell, page 2

STEFAN KARLSSON

Pianist, composer and educator Stefan Karlsson is oft referred to as a legend in process, and with good reason. From his early years as an undergraduate at UNT in the mid-1980s to his first recording contract, signed in 1991 while pursuing his master of music degree on the Floyd Graham Memorial Scholarship, Karlsson has steadily expanded his professional credits.

In 1993, Equity Music Corporation of Hollywood, CA, signed the young

musician to an exclusive publishing agreement; his music has been featured in films, including *Sugar Hill* with Wesley Snipes and *Twenty Bucks* with Christopher Lloyd, and may be heard on *Melrose Place*, *Party of Five*, *Wings* and *Homicide*.

JUNIOR SAXOPHONIST RETURNS AS GRAHAM SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENT

We are pleased to welcome back Sam Reid as Floyd Graham Memorial Scholarship recipient for 2007-8. The junior alto saxophonist is pursuing a bachelor of music degree with a dual major in jazz studies and music education. He plays in the Three O'Clock Lab Band, under Jay Saunders.

As testament to his leadership skills, Reid was appointed a resident assistant (RA) at Bruce Hall. As RA, he recently organized his first field

trip, an excursion for dorm residents on his wing to hear jazz saxophonist Joshua Redman perform in Fort Worth. Reid's summer was devoted to intensive study, as he completed 20 hrs. of core classes. Reid has been transcribing jazz recordings since he was a sophomore in high school and now has formed a quintet to play this library.

STUDENTS CHOOSE COUNSELING, DEVELOPMENT PROFESSOR FOR 2007 'FESSOR GRAHAM AWARD

Dee C. Ray, associate professor of counseling, development, and higher education, has been named recipient of the 2007 'Fessor Graham Award by UNT students. A faculty member since 2001, Ray has focused her interests on elementary school counseling, play therapy and counselor supervision.

The Georgia native is author or co-author of 24 published articles, two books, and six book chapters, and has presented nearly 90 presentations to



international, national and state audiences on subjects as diverse as Child Protective Services, puppetry as play therapy, and aggression in the playroom. In addition, she is author or co-author of funded grants totaling nearly \$100,000. She has received numerous awards from national and state counseling and play therapy organizations.

Ray received a Ph.D in counselor education from UNT and master of education and bachelor of science degrees from Vanderbilt University. Outside interests include scrapbooking, and she recently began taking piano lessons.

UNT, MAYNARD ALUMNUS NAMED TO JAZZ FACULTY

In January 2007, the UNT Division of Jazz Studies welcomed back one of its own, Steve Wiest, to fill the newly created faculty position in jazz trombone. In addition to teaching jazz composition and jazz arranging, he has founded The U-Tubes, a student performing ensemble with full rhythm section.

Prior to attending UNT, Wiest was featured trombonist from 1981 to 1986 with Maynard Ferguson's big band and also served as one of the group's two arrangers. Wiest's work as performer and arranger may be heard on three Ferguson recordings, including that made in July 2006 following the trumpeter's final performance at the Blue Note in New York.

In 1986, Wiest began pursuit of a master's degree in music at UNT, where he filled the lead trombone chair in the One O'Clock Lab Band. His discography as a trombonist, composer and arranger at UNT may be heard on eight UNT Jazz recordings, including *Fifty Years of Jazz at North Texas*.

Following completion of his master's degree at UNT, Wiest served as assistant director of jazz studies at the University of Texas-Arlington, followed by appointment as director of jazz studies and trombone at University of Wisconsin-Whitewater. During his tenure at UW-Whitewater, Wiest performed as a member of the Doc

Severinsen Big Band. Wiest is a recording artist for Arabesque, which recently released *Excalibur: The Steve Wiest Big Band*. His texts and music are published by Kendor, Doug Beach, Hal Leonard, Really Good Music and The University of Northern Colorado Jazz Press. From 1994 to 2002, Karlsson served as coordinator of jazz studies at the University of Nevada-Las Vegas. In 2002, he accepted appointment as a member of the UNT jazz faculty, where, today he teaches jazz piano and improvisation, and supervises the Zebras. In addition, the multi-talented musician continues his 15-year association as clinician and performer with the Stanford Jazz Workshop.

A native of Vastervik, Sweden, Karlsson maintains a heavy touring schedule performing and presenting at conferences and universities around the world, including events in Japan, Scotland, Italy, Spain, France, Sweden, Germany, Korea and Australia.
