


**Splitline Method**

#### **Multi-Member Districts**

A **multi-member district** is an electoral district that has more than one representative. This is not permitted for federal districts, and most states also elect their state legislators from single-member districts. Arizona, New Jersey, South Dakota, and Washington elect all members of their lower state legislative chambers from multi-member districts.


**Bloc**, Bloc with partial abstention, Cumulative, Staggered, Seat/Post

The district lines don't matter when voters have the power.










Ranked Choice Voting (RCV)



H.R.3057 – Fair Representation Act — Rep. Beyer, Donald S., Jr. [D-VA-8] (Introduced 06/26/2017): To establish the use of ranked choice voting in elections for Representatives in Congress, to require each State with more than one Representative to establish multi-member Congressional districts, to require States to conduct Congressional redistricting through independent commissions, and for other purposes.



## Ranked Choice Voting (RCV)

#### For MAYOR

- Rank candidates in order of choice.
- Fill in the 1 next to your 1st choice. Fill in the 2 next to your 2nd choice, and so on.
- Do not fill in more than 1 oval per candidate.
   Do not fill in more than 1 oval per column.
- Ranking a 2nd, 3rd, etc. choice candidate will not hurt your 1st choice candidate.
- To vote for a person who is not listed, write-in their name in the space provided, then fill the oval.

#### **Multi-member Ranked Choice Voting (RCV)**

#### **PROS**

- No more choosing lessor of 2 evils
- Avoiding the "spoiler" impact of 3<sup>rd</sup> party candidates
- Winning candidates have broader support
- More civil elections
- Run-offs become unnecessary
- Ensures every vote counts
- Erodes any benefit of gerrymandering districts

#### **CONS**

- Creates very large districts
   House of Rep Districts already 800K.
- Dilutes Communities of Interest
- Confusing/Complicated
- Lacking systems to count the votes
- Requires voters to heavily research a broad spectrum of candidates.
