The goals of this course are as follows:

- To develop a fundamental knowledge of website design, construction and publication

- Analyze the effectiveness of simple website creations
- Edit images for effective use on the websites (Photoshop)
- Design simple websites according to current trends
- Construct simple websites using user-friendly software, HTML5, CSS and/or Dreamweaver
- Publish simple websites using online server(s)

Define your characteristics of a good and a bad website. Rate 5 websites based on your definitions and characteristics.
- Usability Analysis: (Total: 25 points)
Assess websites for audience, action, and content.

Final Project (Total: 100 Points)

Using your choice of the software covered in class, set up your own website. Over the course of the class, you will complete different phases of the assignment.

- PHASE ONE: Proposal (Total: 25 points)
The proposal must include the following:
 - Research and information about your client/company
 - Goals for your website and rationale for your design
 - Color Scheme
 - Sitemap: Create a sitemap to give an overview of the navigational structure of your website.
- PHASE TWO (Total: 40 points)
 - Wireframe
 - Website Graphics
- PHASE THREE (Total: 35 points)
 - Peer Review Activity: In class, you will be presenting your proposal from phase 1 to a partner for this project.
 - Webpages: create at least 4 webpages for your site, including text, photos, and any other content you'd like to present. Depending on your client, your rubric and webpage requirements will be different.
 - Presentation: You should start your presentation with your proposal and gradually add on to it. In this presentation, you will need to address your client, the history of the client, their target audience, and why your website design is equipped to
