Congratulations to the hardest working faculty and staff in higher education as UNT Dallas has its accreditation reaffirmed

The University of North Texas at Dallas earned reaffirmation of its accreditation through the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC). The accrediting organization made the announcement as part of its annual meetings held in mid-December in New Orleans. SACSCOC assures education quality for more than 800 institutions across 11 states. An institution must be reaffirmed five years after it gains Initial accreditation. UNT Dallas first received accreditation in 2013. "This is an important day, and maintaining accreditation comes as a testament to the tireless work and dedication of our faculty, staff and students," said Dr. Betty Stewart, UNT Dallas Provost. "To have our accreditation reaffirmed validates for our students, faculty, staff, administrators, alumni, partners and the communities we serve in the southern sector of Dallas, that UNT Dallas is committed to providing affordable, high-quality academic programs and superior student support services."

Massive achievement as Dr. Syeda Jesmin receives \$303,000 grant from Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration

UNT Dallas Associate Professor of Sociology Dr. Syeda Jesmin was awarded a three-year, \$303,000 grant from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA). The funding will support a comprehensive public health approach to improve mental health at UNT Dallas and surrounding communities. "Our goal is to increase awareness of UNT Dallas students, their families, faculty and staff members about suicide, depression, serious mental illness and/or substance use disorders that can lead to school failure; promote help-seeking behavior and reduce negative public attitudes; and improve the identification and treatment of at-risk students so they can successfully complete their studies," said Dr. Jesmin, the principal investigator of this project.



Another reason why UNT Dallas is a special place: Spanish in the Community course utilizes students to teach aspiring U.S. citizens

Founders Hall Room 101 was packed on Dec. 4 with smiling faces and tears of pride as 30 legal residents, all aspiring United States citizens, received their "Spanish in the Community" course graduation certificates. Taught by UNT Dallas students, the course prepares immigrants to pass the U.S. naturalization test and interview with the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Service. This free, twice-a-week night course is a unique offering in North Texas, and is so important to those who choose to take it that some often forgo overtime opportunities at work to attend each class. Friends and family were invited to attend the ceremony, leading to a happily cheering crowd of some 100. "There was a lot of emotion in that room last night," said Dr. Mara Vaughn, professor of Spanish and Education. "One of the participants told me that he could never imagine that a course like that ever existed. He stated that the enthusiasm of our instructors motivated him to keep on coming after a hard day at work. Another participant shared that at the beginning she could not believe that the whole course and materials were free of charge. I am so proud of being a part of such a wonderful team of students, instructors and supporters. I rested last night full of joy. I believe UNT Dallas programs such as ours are truly making a difference in our community."

Dr. Friesen and co-author Dr. Mike Patterson, a professor at Midwestern State University's Dillard College of Business Administration, are former colleagues at the Wichita Falls institution, and have collaborated on journal articles for a dozen years.
