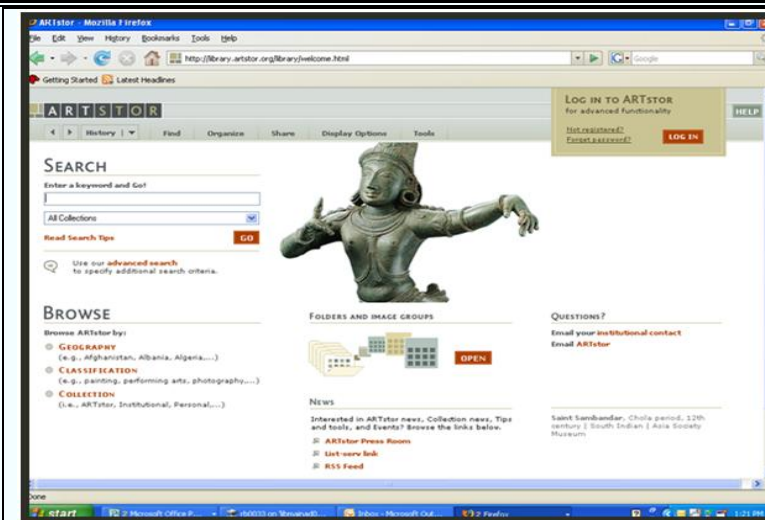

ARTSTOR, a digital image database of over 700,000 images is now available for use in your classes!

ARTstor Coverage

ARTstor images span the history of art and architecture from Neolithic to Postmodern times. Special collections include: European paintings, sculpture and decorative arts, prints, graphic design, photography, drawings, archaeology, Asian art, illuminated manuscripts, cave temple works, Egyptian art, Cuban art, antiquities, Korean and Buddhist monastery art and architecture, Islamic art and architecture, Medieval and Renaissance art, and prints from the Illustrated Bartsch.

1. Go to the UNT Libraries homepage: <http://www.library.unt.edu>.
2. Choose "**Electronic Resources**".
3. Click on the letter "A" from the A-Z listing of databases.
4. Scroll down and click on "**ARTstor**".

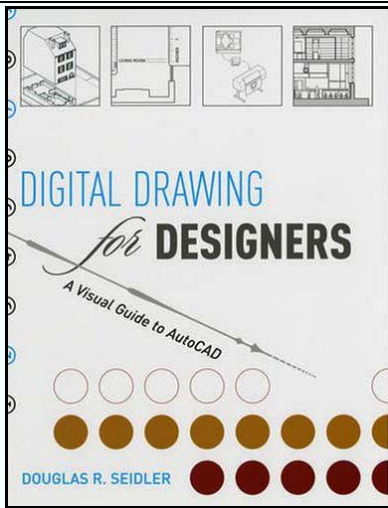

ARTstor Accounts

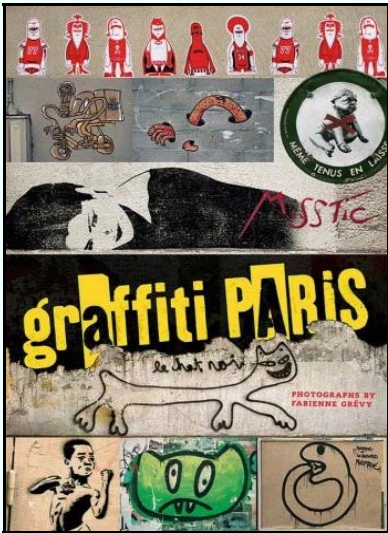
There are instructor and student accounts. An Instructor account has 2 benefits over a student account. The first is the ability to create file folders of images. The second benefit allows you to upload images from your personal collections. File folders of images can be shared with your class, faculty, TA's, and TF's. 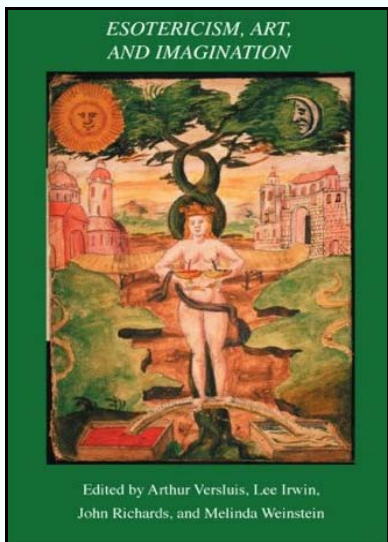

Art Databases for Journal Articles

The art databases listed below can be accessed from your office or home. Click on the name of the database. If accessing off-campus, you will be asked for a username ([EUID](#)) and password ([Eagle Mail](#) password). Enter your search terms in the search box.

***Keyword search examples:** *Goldsworthy, Andy, Goldsworthy, Andy AND Exhibit*. If you do not find the electronic full-text of the article, click the links: [Check the Univ of North Texas library catalog](#) or Find Full-Text. This will automatically search the UNT Libraries holdings for more electronic full-text or paper journals that have the desired journal article. If the journal is only available in paper format, you can make a photocopy of the journal article. The catalog record will show the location of the journal.

[Art Abstracts](#) (1984-present)

Art Abstracts offers many full-text electronic art journal articles from over 400 art and architecture journals. Subjects include advertising art, architecture, art history, decorative arts, graphic arts, interior design, museology, non-western art, painting, photography, ceramics, sculpture, textiles, film, and folk art.

[ArtBibliographies Modern](#)

ArtBibliographies Modern covers art from the modern era (1850-present), with a particular concentration on photography. It contains abstracts from over 500 journals, exhibition catalogs, and dissertations. Coverage: 1984-present.

[Bibliography of the History of Art](#)

BHA covers the history of post-classical western art and architecture. It contains journal article abstracts, exhibition catalogs, festschriften, dissertations, microform publications, newspapers and auction catalogs. BHA includes the contents of the databases RILA and RAA.

[Design and Applied Arts Index](#)

DAAI is one of the best databases to search for designers and the design world. It includes over 100,000 articles from more than 450 design and craft periodicals published 1973-1998, and an education database that has data on nearly 2,800 universities and colleges that offer courses in design.

[Grove Art Online](#)

Grove contains encyclopedic entries on art movements, techniques, artists, art theory and image links. It is the electronic version of the 34 volume set of the Grove Dictionary of Art.

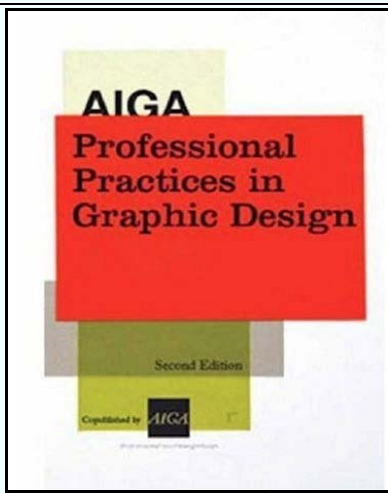

[Art in America](#)

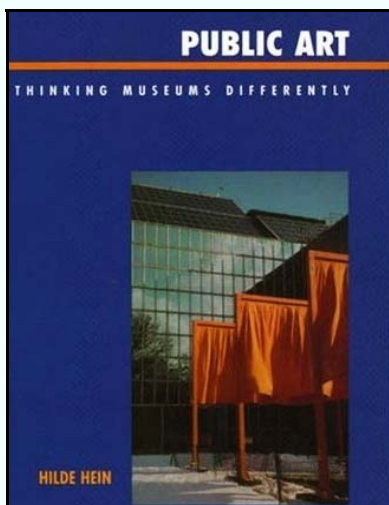

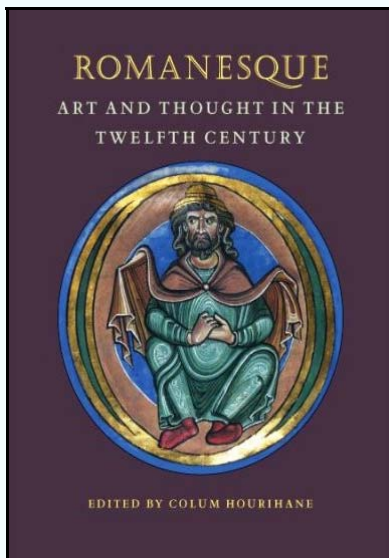

Checkout:

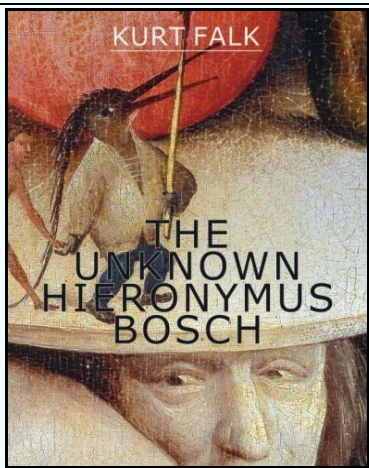
Go to the Circulation desks to checkout (1st floor of every library). Checkout periods are by the semester. Books will be due the last day of the semester.

Renewing Books/ Viewing Your Account:

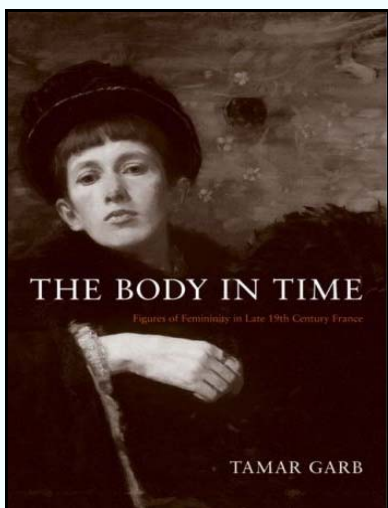

How to Find Books & Exhibition Catalogs

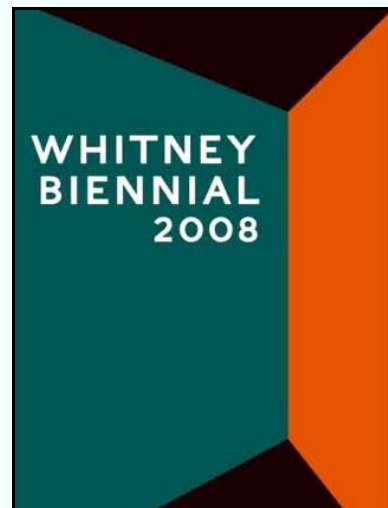

Borrowing Books and Journal Articles from other Universities

If UNT does not own a book, journal article or other material you need for your research, it can be borrowed through the borrowing program [Inter-Library Loan](#) <http://www.library.unt.edu/ill>. Click on the link above and then "create an ILLIAD account". Once you have created your ILL account you can begin requesting materials.

For Your Classes

E-Reserves and Regular Reserves

Faculty can put E-Reserves and regular paper materials on reserve for their students. E-Reserves reside on the UNT Libraries server and are password protected. Paper reserves are housed behind the Reserves desks on the first floor of the Willis and Science & Technology Libraries. Professional Development and Publishing

Journal Article Alerting Services

Set email alerts to automatically receive the latest e-journal articles published in your areas of interest! Just click the "journal alert" link in many art journal databases (see the "[art databases for journal articles](#)" section below), and fill out the form. It is usually necessary to perform a search on your topic before you will see the ability to save the search as an Email Alert.

Art Grants

Search [Grant Select](#) for over 10,000 funding opportunities from more than 4000 foundations, nonprofit organizations, research institutes, state agencies, and universities. *Once in the database, choose "search" on the left navigation bar. Then choose a discipline from the drop down menu.
