

BA IN INTERNATIONAL STUDIES WITH A CONCENTRATION IN REGIONAL STUDIES DEGREE IN THREE ACADEMIC MAP 2018-2019 CATALOG YEAR

The Bachelor of Arts in International Studies with a Concentration in Regional Studies is an interdisciplinary major that allows students to examine a wider range of global cultures. Students are asked to choose two world regions: Asia, Latin America, Europe or Africa & the Middle East. The language they choose to take must match one of their two regions. For example, Africa & the Middle East for the region and either Arabic or French for the language. They also have the opportunity to glimpse into a different concentration by taking 9 hours from either International Security & Diplomacy, International Business & Economics, or Peace Studies.

There are 42 hours in this major, 39 of which are advanced (3000 or 4000 level). Additionally students will complete a total of 18 hours in their chosen language and 6 of those hours are advanced giving the student a total of 45 advanced hours. In many cases students are able to complete a minor in their chosen language by taking one more advanced course and earning grades of C or better in each class.

We encourage students to participate in Study Abroad programs when possible and especially to seek out and obtain internships. Several of our students have been lucky enough to do internships abroad and accomplish both simultaneously! Our alumni work in multiple related fields both nationally and internationally. They can be found in government, education, business, and the military. Students today will be global leaders tomorrow!
