Keynote Speaker: Tomie Hahn

Essense—The Senses in Research and Creativity



Tomie Hahn is a performer and ethnologist whose activities span a wide range of topics including: Japanese traditional performing arts, Monster Truck rallies, issues of identity and creative expression of multiracial individuals, and relationships of technology and culture; interactive dance/movement performance; and gestural control and extended human/computer interface in the performing arts. She is a teacher/performer of shakuhachi and of nihon buyo, holding the professional stage name, Samie Tachibana. Hahn is also the director of the Center for Deep Listening at Rensselaer.

Hahn is the author of Sensational Knowledge— Embodying Culture through Japanese Dance, which won the 2008 Alan P. Merriam Prize from the Society for Ethnomusicology, recognizing the most distinguished, published, and English-language monograph in the field of ethnomusicology. Other recent publications include "Recipe for Mixing" in Other Tongues: Mixed-Race Women Speak Out, and "enso-maesthetics—emerging shapes," a graphic text response to Richard Shusterman's Body Consciousness: A Philosophy of Mindfulness and Somaesthetics.
