

Do You Work on Campus?

Why file taxes?

- Filing taxes determines:
 - how much \$\$ you owe the U.S. government
 - OR how much \$\$ the U.S. government owes you (refund)
- All F, J, M and Q visa types are required to file U.S. federal taxes
- Noncompliance may affect future immigration status (H1B, etc.)
- If you don't file by the due date, fines, penalties and interest may accrue
- DUE DATE: APRIL 15 of each year
 - In April of 2021, we file taxes for 2020



Do I have to file?

iM;

Present in the U.S. in previous tax year? **YES!**



F, J, M, or Q visa holders and their spouses and dependents **YES!**

Received taxable earnings or income in previous tax year (Jan. 1 – Dec. 31) **YES!**



Do I file as a Nonresident Alien or as a Resident Alien for tax purposes?

International students and scholars are generally considered **nonresident aliens** for tax purposes.

The **Substantial Presence Test** will determine your tax residency.

We are determining tax filing status ONLY.

Nonresident alien or Resident alien

terminology is for tax purposes.

This does NOT refer to visa or immigration status.

How do I know if I am considered a Resident Alien for tax purposes?





The <u>Substantial Presence Test</u> determines your tax residency

Glacier Tax Prep will also help determine your tax residency by calculating your U.S. entry and exit dates

How to file as a Resident Alien

- If the substantial presence test/Glacier confirms your tax filing status as a resident alien, you may use Turbo Tax or other online filing services
- We encourage filing with Bob Widmer's Tax Clinic

How to File as a Nonresident Alien

- USE GLACIER it's FREE and created for international students
- DO NOT use TurboTax
- U.S. source income anything over \$0 is taxed!
 - Wages (on-campus jobs)
 - Taxable stipends, grants, scholarships, etc. in excess of tuition and fees (Form 1042-S)
 - U.S. Account interest, rental properties, investments, etc.





- Glacier helps international students with filing U.S. federal tax forms
- Glacier is easy and efficient to use; includes detailed FAQ and e-mail assistance
- First 699 Glacier access codes are free (cost is minimal if codes exhausted)
- Must print and mail forms to address in the instructions as provided by GTP
 - Nonresident Aliens CANNOT e-file
 - GTP does not file the documents for you.
 - You must print and mail the documents created in GTP.



Documents Needed to File with Glacier

- ✓ Passport
- ✓ Visa/immigration status information; I-20 or DS 2019
- ✓ Individual Taxpayer Identification Number (ITIN) or Social Security Number (SSN)
- ✓ All U.S. entry and exit dates
- ✓ Forms W-2 (if employed) Available each year by January 31
- √ 1042-S (mailed each year by March 15 if applicable)
- ✓ 1099 (if received)



Form W-2

- Wages earned for taxable year
- Provided by employer/UNT System Tax Office
- Available each year by January 31
- Work on campus? Select digital W-2 option in myunt.edu
 - Ask your supervisor for more information



Form 1042-S

- Form 1042-S includes income received from scholarship(s) in excess of tuition and fees
- Only students who have received scholarships in excess of tuition and fees will receive form 1042-S.
- Mailed by March 15 each year to your Mailing Address on record (MyUNT)

EXAMPLE SCENARIO

I received form 1042-S.

I was not employed during the tax year.

I do not have a social security number.

This is my only income.

What do I do?

- File for an ITIN!
- An ITIN (Individual Taxpayer Identification Number) is required to file taxes

Dependents of Nonresident Aliens

- Married nonresidents cannot file joint returns
- Spouses and dependents have the same filing requirements



Form 8843

- All nonresident aliens and dependents (regardless of age) file
 Form 8843
- Informational statement required by the U.S. government for all nonresident aliens.
- Mail form 8843 in separate envelopes:
 - If filing taxes, include with tax return
 - Each additional person in household requires separate form and envelope

EXAMPLE SCENARIO

I didn't have any income.

I didn't have a job.

I didn't receive a scholarship.

I didn't receive form 1042-S.

What do I do?

COMPLETE FORM 8843!

ITIN/SSN is NOT required for Form 8843. However, you may include your ITIN/SSN on the form if you have one.

Please Note: EACH household individual filing ONLY Form 8843 MUST send the form in a separate envelope. This includes ALL dependents, including children under 18 yrs.

Do not include more than one Form 8843 per envelope.

Form 8843

Missed a year? Misfiled as a resident?

- No worries! You can fix it!
