The <u>OMB/NARA *Managing Government Records Directive* (M-12-18)</u> requires Senior Agency Officials for Records Management (SAORM) to provide an annual report to NARA. NARA uses the reports to determine the overall progress of the Federal Government in meeting the goals of the *Directive* transitioning to electronic recordkeeping.
