	Please explain your response: As a small EOP component, our one part-time RMO and myself as SAORM, have been stretched exceedingly thin this year. Three of my six GS-15 directors retired with short notice, with a long process to replace two and no authorization to replace the third. We also experienced the lapse in appropriations and a continued multitude of critical mission-related support priorities for the Administration's trade agenda. While we have acquired a part-time administrative assistant to help with records management (successfully transferred all permanent non-electronic records to NARA in FY2018), this has not enabled us to appropriately focus on the necessary high-level activities. We are not likely to acquire additional resources due to budget considerations. Having just completed the RMO's mid-year performance review, we intend to work together over the next year to refocus our efforts. Our priorities are: (1) mandatory records management training for all employees, (2) documented training of senior agency leadership, and (3) work with OA/EOP to manage all permanent electronic records in electronic format.
