Andrew Small is a senior transatlantic fellow with the Asia program at the [German Marshall Fund of the United States](#) and a non-resident senior policy fellow at the European Council on Foreign Relations. He also holds a visiting fellowship at the Australian National University's National Security College. His research focuses on U.S.-China relations, EU-China relations, and broader developments in Chinese foreign and economic policy. He was based in GMF's Brussels office for five years, where he established the Asia program and the Stockholm China Forum, GMF's biannual China policy conference. He previously worked as the director of the Foreign Policy Centre's Beijing office; as a visiting fellow at the Chinese Academy of Social Sciences, and was an ESU scholar in the office of Senator Edward M. Kennedy. He has testified before the U.S.-China Economic and Security Review Commission and both the Foreign Affairs Committee and the Development Committee of the European Parliament, and his articles and papers have been published in *Foreign Affairs*, the *New York Times*, *Foreign Policy*, and the *Washington Quarterly*, as well as many other journals, magazines and newspapers. He is the author of *The China-Pakistan Axis: Asia's New Geopolitics*, published by Hurst / Oxford University Press / Random House. Small was educated at Balliol College, University of Oxford.
