National Survey of Substance Abuse Treatment Services (N-SSATS): 2017

Data on Substance Abuse Treatment Facilities

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HIGHLIGHTS

This report presents results from the 2017 National Survey of Substance Abuse Treatment Services (N-SSATS), an annual census of facilities providing substance abuse treatment. Conducted by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), N-SSATS is designed to collect data on the location, characteristics, and use of alcohol and drug abuse treatment facilities and services throughout the 50 states, the District of Columbia, and other jurisdictions. It is important to note that values in charts, narrative lists, and percentage distributions are calculated using actual raw numbers and rounded for presentation in this report; calculations using rounded values may produce different results.

- The N-SSATS facility response rate in 2017 was 89 percent. The response rates in 36 states or jurisdictions equaled or surpassed the overall rate [Tables 1.1 and 6.1].
- A total of 13,857 facilities completed the survey. The 13,585 facilities included in this report had a one-day census of 1,356,015 clients enrolled in substance abuse treatment on March 31, 2017 [Tables 1.1 and 3.1].¹
- In the United States, there were 507 clients in treatment per 100,000 population aged 18 and older on March 31, 2017. The treatment rate was highest for drug abuse only (244 per 100,000 population aged 18 and older). Next were both alcohol and drug abuse (184 per 100,000) and alcohol abuse only (79 per 100,000) [Table 6.38].

Trends in Facility and Client Characteristics 2007–2017

- The number of substance abuse treatment facilities remained stable between the years 2007 and 2017. The number of eligible facilities responding to the 2017 survey was less than 1 percent lower in 2017 (13,585) than in 2007 (13,648) [Table 2.1]. The number of clients in treatment on the survey reference date (March 31) increased 19 percent from 1,135,425 in 2007 to 1,356,015 in 2017 [Table 3.1].
- The operational structure of the substance abuse treatment system (i.e., the type of entity responsible for operating the facility: private non-profit, private for-profit, or government—local, state, federal, or tribal) had some notable changes between 2007 and 2017. Private non-profit facilities decreased from 58 percent of facilities in 2007 to 53 percent of facilities in 2017. Private for-profit facilities increased from 29 percent in 2007 to 36 percent in 2017 [Table 2.2 and Figure 2].
- The proportion of facilities offering outpatient care increased slightly between 2007 and 2017, while the proportions offering the two other major types of care—residential (non-hospital) and

hospital inpatient—declined. Between 2007 and 2017, the proportions of clients in treatment remained relatively stable among the three major types of care [Tables 2.3 and 3.2 and Figures 3 and 5].

- Opioid treatment programs certified by SAMHSA for the provision of medication-assisted therapy with methadone and/or buprenorphine increased from 8 percent of all facilities in 2007 to 10 percent in 2017 [Table 2.4].
- The proportion of all clients receiving methadone increased from 23 percent in 2007 to 28 percent in 2017 [Table 3.2].
- The proportion of all clients receiving buprenorphine in substance use facilities increased from less than 1 percent in 2007 to 8 percent 2017 [Table 3.2].
- The proportion of clients in treatment for the three broad categories of substance abuse problems—both alcohol and drug abuse, drug abuse only, and alcohol abuse only—changed between 2007 and 2017. The proportion of clients in treatment for both drug and alcohol abuse decreased from 45 to 37 percent of all clients. The proportion of clients in treatment for drug abuse only increased from 36 to 47 percent, and clients in treatment for alcohol abuse only decreased from 19 to 16 percent [Table 3.3].
- The numbers of clients under age 18 declined from 85,518 in 2007 to 62,862 in 2017. The proportion of clients under age 18 in treatment in each type of care (outpatient, residential [non-hospital], or hospital inpatient) differed slightly from the proportion overall, and was stable between 2007 and 2017 [Table 3.4 and 3.2]

Facility Operation—March 31, 2017

- Private non-profit organizations operated 53 percent of all facilities and treated 49 percent of all clients [Tables 2.2 and 3.1].
- Private for-profit organizations operated 36 percent of all facilities and treated 41 percent of all clients.
- Local governments operated 5 percent of all facilities and treated 5 percent of all clients.
- State governments operated 2 percent of all facilities and treated 2 percent of all clients.
- The federal government operated 2 percent of all facilities and treated 3 percent of all clients.
- Tribal governments operated 2 percent of all facilities and treated 1 percent of all clients.

Type of Care—March 31, 2017

- Outpatient treatment was offered by 82 percent of all facilities and was received by 91 percent of all clients in treatment [Tables 4.1b and 5.1b].
- Residential (non-hospital) treatment was offered by 23 percent of all facilities and was received by 7 percent of all clients in treatment.
- Hospital inpatient care was offered by 5 percent of all facilities and was received by 1 percent of all clients in treatment.

Diagnosed Co-Occurring Mental and Substance Abuse Disorders—March 31, 2017

Among clients in treatment, 53 percent were diagnosed with a co-occurring substance abuse and mental disorder. Only in facilities operated by the Department of Defense were less than half of clients in treatment diagnosed with co-occurring substance abuse and mental disorders (47 percent); however, facilities operated by the Department of Veterans Affairs reported the highest proportion of clients in treatment with diagnosed co-occurring substance abuse and mental disorders—74 percent—the highest among all types of facility operation [Table 5.2].

Facility Size and Utilization Rates—March 31, 2017

- Facilities with opioid treatment programs (OTPs) had a median number of 285 clients. Outpatient facilities with OTPs had a median of 305 clients, while residential (non-hospital) facilities with OTPs had a median of 30 clients. Hospital inpatient facilities with OTPs had a median of 21 clients [Table 4.3].
- The median number of outpatient clients for OTPs offering methadone or buprenorphine maintenance or naltrexone treatment varied by facility operation. The median number of clients for all outpatient facilities with OTPs was 290; for private non-profit outpatient facilities with OTPs, the median was 315; for private for-profit outpatient facilities with OTPs, the median was 290; for local/county/community government-operated outpatient facilities with OTPs, the median was 272; for state government-operated outpatient facilities with OTPs, the median was 270; for federally operated outpatient facilities with OTPs, the median was 108; and for tribal government-operated outpatient facilities with OTPs, the median was 174 [Table 4.3].
- The median number of clients at facilities without OTPs (non-OTPs) was 36. Outpatient facilities had a median of 40 clients, while residential (non-hospital) facilities had a median of 19 clients and hospital inpatient facilities had a median of 14 clients [Table 4.4].
- The median number of outpatient clients for non-OTP facilities offering buprenorphine maintenance or naltrexone treatment varied by facility operation. The median number of clients for all non-OTP facilities was 20; for private non-profit facilities, 15; for private for-profit facilities, 30; for local/county/community government-operated facilities, 15; for state government-operated facilities, 22; for federal government-operated facilities, 26; and for tribal government-operated facilities, 10.
- Of all residential (non-hospital) beds designated for substance abuse treatment, 94 percent were in use. Of all hospital inpatient beds designated for substance abuse treatment, 98 percent were in use [Tables 4.6 and 4.7].

Medication-Assisted Opioid Therapy—March 31, 2017

- OTPs were available in 1,317 facilities (10 percent of all treatment facilities) in 2017 [Table 2.3].
- Private for-profit organizations operated 60 percent of OTPs [Table 4.19b].
- Of clients who were in OTPs that dispensed methadone, 61 percent were in private for-profit facilities [Table 5.4b].

CHAPTER 1

DESCRIPTION OF THE NATIONAL SURVEY OF SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT SERVICES (N-SSATS)

The 2017 National Survey of Substance Abuse Treatment Services (N-SSATS) was conducted between February and December 2017, with a reference date of March 31, 2017. It is the 40th in a series of national surveys begun in the 1970s. The surveys were designed to collect data on the location, characteristics, and use of alcohol and drug abuse treatment facilities and services throughout the 50 states, the District of Columbia, and other jurisdictions. The Center for Behavioral Health Statistics and Quality, Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, plans and directs the N-SSATS. This report presents tabular information and highlights from the 2017 N-SSATS. It is important to note that percentages in charts, narrative lists, and percentage distributions in tables may not add to 100 percent due to rounding.

N-SSATS is designed to collect information from all facilities in the United States, both public and private, that provide substance abuse treatment.⁴ (Additional information on N-SSATS, its history, and changes in the survey and survey universe over time is provided in Appendix A.) N-SSATS provides a mechanism for quantifying the dynamic characteristics and composition of the U.S. substance abuse treatment delivery system. N-SSATS collects multipurpose data that can be used to:

- assist SAMHSA and state and local governments in assessing the nature and extent of services
 provided in state-supported and other substance abuse treatment facilities and in forecasting
 substance abuse treatment resource requirements;
- update SAMHSA's Inventory of Behavioral Health Services (I-BHS), which includes all known drug and alcohol abuse treatment facilities, both public and private (see Appendix A);
- analyze substance abuse treatment services trends and conduct comparative analyses for the nation, regions, and states;
- generate the *National Directory of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Treatment Facilities*, a compendium of facilities approved by state substance abuse agencies for the provision of substance abuse treatment; and
- update the information in SAMHSA's Behavioral Health Treatment Services Locator, a searchable database of facilities that provide treatment. The Treatment Services Locator is available on the Internet at:

The jurisdictions include the territory of Guam, the Federated States of Micronesia, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands of the United States.

In this report, entities responding to N-SSATS are referred to as "facilities." As discussed later in the report, a "facility" may be a program-level, clinic-level, or multi-site respondent.

Data Collection Procedures for the 2017 N-SSATS

Field period and reference date

The survey reference date for the 2017 N-SSATS was March 31, 2017. The field period was from March 31, 2017, through December 4, 2017.

Survey universe

The 2017 N-SSATS facility universe totaled 17,029 facilities, including all 16,816 active treatment facilities on SAMHSA's I-BHS at a point four weeks before the survey reference date, and 213 facilities that were added by state substance abuse agencies or otherwise discovered during the first five months of the survey.

Content

The 2017 N-SSATS questionnaire contained 40 numbered questions (see Appendix B for the paper version of the questionnaire). Topics included:

- facility identification information;
- operating entity;
- primary focus;
- type of care provided, i.e.
 - outpatient treatment services (regular outpatient treatment, intensive outpatient treatment, day treatment or partial hospitalization, detoxification, methadone/buprenorphine maintenance or naltrexone treatment),
 - o residential (non-hospital) treatment services (long-term—more than 30 days, short-term—30 days or fewer, detoxification), and
 - hospital inpatient treatment services (inpatient treatment, inpatient detoxification);
- services offered (assessment and pre-treatment services, counseling, pharmacotherapies, testing, transitional services, ancillary services);
- clinical/therapeutic approaches;
- special programs or groups provided for specific client types;
- provision of treatment services in sign language and/or in languages other than English;
- detoxification from alcohol, benzodiazepines, opioids, cocaine, methamphetamines, or other drugs, and routine use of medication during detoxification;
- client outreach (outreach to persons in the community who may need treatment, provision of a facility website);
- licensure, certification, or accreditation agencies or organizations;
- payment options accepted, including use of a sliding fee scale and/or treatment at no charge;

- receipt of government funding;
- smoking policy;
- manner in which opioid dependence is treated, the operation of an opioid treatment program (OTP) certified by SAMHSA offering maintenance and/or detoxification, and medications used;
- number of clients in treatment on March 31, 2017 (total clients; clients by type of treatment; total clients under age 18; and clients receiving methadone, buprenorphine, or naltrexone);
- percentage of clients in treatment on March 31, 2017, for abuse of both alcohol and drugs, alcohol abuse only, and drug abuse only;
- percentage of clients in treatment on March 31, 2017, with diagnosed co-occurring mental and substance abuse disorders; and
- number of beds designated for residential (non-hospital) and hospital inpatient substance abuse treatment on March 31, 2017.

Data collection

There were three modes of data collection employed: a secure web-based questionnaire, a paper questionnaire sent by mail, and a telephone interview. About four weeks before the survey reference date of March 31, 2017, letters were mailed to all facilities to announce the survey. The letters also served to update records with new address information received from the U.S. Postal Service. During the last week of March 2017, a data collection packet (including the SAMHSA cover letter, state-specific letter of endorsement, state profile, information on completing the survey on the web, and a sheet of frequently asked questions) was mailed to each facility. To ease the burden on respondents, many of the data items that typically do not change from year to year were prefilled in the web-based questionnaire for those facilities that had completed the 2016 survey. Respondents could also request a paper questionnaire be sent to them.

During the data collection phase, contract personnel were available to answer facilities' questions concerning the survey. Support for facilities completing the questionnaire on the web was also available by e-mail. About two weeks after the initial data collection packet mailing, thank you/reminder letters were sent to all facilities. Approximately eight weeks after the initial packet mailing, non-responding facilities were mailed a second packet. About two weeks after the second packet mailing, non-respondents received a reminder telephone call. A third packet containing a hard copy questionnaire was mailed about nine weeks after the second packet mailing. Those facilities that had not completed the survey by June 12, 2017, received reminder calls and were asked to complete the survey by computer-assisted telephone interview (CATI).

Quality assurance

The web questionnaire was programmed to be self-editing; that is, respondents were prompted to complete missing responses and to confirm or correct inconsistent responses.

All mail questionnaires were reviewed manually for consistency and for missing data. Calls were made to facilities to resolve unclear responses and to obtain missing data. After data entry, automated

quality assurance reviews were conducted. The reviews incorporated the rules used in manual editing, plus consistency checks and checks for data outliers not readily identified by manual review.

Item non-response was minimized through editing and extensive follow-up. The item response rate for the 2017 N-SSATS averaged 98 percent across 270 separate items. Appendix C details item response rates and imputation procedures.

Facility status and response rate

Table 1.1 presents a summary of response rate information. There were 17,029 facilities in the survey universe. Of these facilities, 1,501 facilities (9 percent) were found to be ineligible for the survey because they had closed or did not provide substance abuse treatment or detoxification. Of the remaining 15,528 facilities, 13,857 facilities (89 percent) completed the survey and 13,585 (87 percent) were included in this report.

Response rates for Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands declined in 2017, compared with the previous year; both territories were affected by Hurricanes Maria and Irma in September 2017. Of Puerto Rico's 151 eligible facilities in 2017, 103 responded (68 percent), compared with 142 of 158 eligible facilities (90 percent) in 2016. Of the U.S. Virgin Islands' four eligible facilities, one responded in 2017, whereas all four responded in 2016.

Facility Selection for the 2017 N-SSATS Report

Table 1.1. The N-SSATS questionnaire is deliberately sent to some facilities that are excluded from this report, as explained below. For this cycle, 204 of the 13,857 questionnaire respondents provided information but were deemed out of the scope of this report and excluded from the analyses presented here. The excluded facilities and reasons for exclusion fell into three categories:

- 123 facilities were halfway houses that did not provide substance abuse treatment. These
 facilities were included in the survey so that they could be listed in the Directory and SAMHSA's
 Behavioral Health Treatment Services Locator.
- 54 facilities were solo practitioners. I-BHS and N-SSATS are designed to include facilities
 rather than individuals. Solo practitioners are listed and surveyed only if a state substance abuse
 agency explicitly requests that they be included in the survey. The excluded solo practitioners
 were not identified for inclusion by a state substance abuse agency.
- 27 facilities were jails, prisons, or other organizations that treated incarcerated clients exclusively.

In addition to the facilities that were excluded from the report, there were 68 facilities whose client counts were included in or "rolled into" other facilities' counts and whose facility characteristics were not reported separately. After the exclusion of 204 out-of-scope facilities and the roll-up of 68 facilities, 13,585 eligible respondent facilities remained to be included in the 2017 N-SSATS report.

Survey Response Mode

Figure 1. The proportion of facilities using the web survey to respond to N-SSATS has increased steadily since the option was introduced in 2002. The percentage of facilities responding via the web increased from 27 percent in 2003 to 92 percent in 2017. Mail response declined from 49 percent in 2003 to 1 percent in 2017. Telephone response, which represents follow-up of facilities that had not responded by mail or web, also declined, from 24 percent in 2003 to 6 percent in 2017.




Figure 1. Survey response mode: 2003-2017

Data Considerations and Limitations

As with any data collection effort, certain procedural considerations and data limitations must be taken into account when interpreting data from the 2017 N-SSATS. Some general issues are listed below; other considerations are detailed in Appendix A. Considerations and limitations of specific data items are discussed where the data are presented.

- N-SSATS attempts to obtain responses from all known treatment facilities, but it is a voluntary survey. There was no adjustment for the 11 percent facility non-response.
- N-SSATS is a point-prevalence survey. It provides information on the substance abuse treatment system and its clients on the reference date. Client counts reported do not represent annual totals. Rather, N-SSATS provides a "snapshot" of substance abuse treatment facilities and clients on an average day.
- Multiple responses were allowed for certain variables (e.g., services provided and specialized programs). Tabulations of these variables include the total number of facilities reporting each response.

Organization of the Report

The balance of this report is organized into the following chapters.

- Appendix C contains information on item response and imputation.

Terminology

The majority of tables in the report are organized by facility operation and type of care. Therefore, it is important to define these terms.

Facility operation indicates the type of entity responsible for the operation of the facility:

- private for-profit
- private non-profit
- government
 - o local, county, or community
 - o state
 - o federal (Dept. of Veterans Affairs, Dept. of Defense, Indian Health Service, other)
 - o tribal

Clients in treatment were defined as:

- hospital inpatient or residential (non-hospital) clients receiving substance abuse treatment services at the facility on March 31, 2017; and
- outpatient clients who were seen at the facility for a substance abuse treatment or detoxification service at least once during the month of March 2017, and who were still enrolled in treatment on March 31, 2017.

Type of care indicates the services the facility offers:

- outpatient
 - o regular outpatient
 - o intensive outpatient
 - o outpatient day treatment or partial hospitalization
 - o utpatient detoxification
 - o utpatient methadone/buprenorphine maintenance or naltrexone treatment
- residential (non-hospital)
 - o short-term (30 days or less)
 - o long-term (more than 30 days)
 - detoxification
- hospital inpatient
 - inpatient detoxification
 - o inpatient treatment

CHAPTER 2 TRENDS IN FACILITY CHARACTERISTICS

This chapter presents trends in facility characteristics for 2007 to 2017.

Number of Facilities

Table 2.1. The total number of substance abuse treatment facilities remained stable between 2007 and 2017. There was considerable turnover from year to year in the individual facilities responding to the survey: Between 85 and 91 percent of the facilities responding to a survey had also responded to the previous year's survey. Between 10 and 15 percent of the facilities from year-to-year closed, were no longer providing substance abuse treatment, or did not respond to the current year's survey. However, those facilities were replaced by similar facilities that had not responded in the previous year.


There was a net decrease of 814 responding facilities between 2016 and 2017, from 14,399 to 13,585 facilities. Of the facilities responding to the 2017 survey, 91 percent had also responded to the 2016 survey, and 9 percent were new to the 2017 survey or did not respond in 2016. Of the facilities that responded in 2016, 15 percent had closed, were no longer providing substance abuse treatment, or did not respond in 2017.

Facility Operation

Table 2.2 and Figure 2. The operational structure of the substance abuse treatment system (i.e., the types of entities responsible for operating facilities) had some notable changes between 2007 and 2017.

- Private non-profit organizations operated 58 percent of all facilities in 2007 compared with 53 percent in 2017.
- Private for-profit organizations operated 29 percent of facilities in 2007, increasing to 36 percent of facilities in 2017.
- Local, county, or community governments operated 6 percent of facilities in 2007, decreasing to 5 percent in 2017.
- State governments operated 3 percent of facilities in 2007, decreasing to 2 percent in 2017.
- The federal government operated 2 to 3 percent of facilities each year between 2007 and 2017.5
- Tribal governments operated 1 to 2 percent of facilities each year between 2007 and 2017.

Data for the federal agencies specified in the survey (the Department of Veterans Affairs, the Department of Defense, the Indian Health Service, and other unspecified federal agencies) are detailed in the tables.

Type of Care Offered⁶




Figure 3. Facilities by type of care offered and facilities with opioid treatment programs: 2007–2017

Table 2.3 and Figure 3. The proportion of facilities offering outpatient care increased slightly between 2007 and 2017, while the proportions offering the two other major types of care—residential (non-hospital) and hospital inpatient—declined between 2007 and 2017. OTPs, certified by SAMHSA, provide medication-assisted therapy with methadone, buprenorphine, and naltrexone. Facilities with OTPs can be associated with any type of care. Facilities with OTPs made up 8 to 10 percent of all facilities between 2007 and 2017 [Table 2.4].

- Outpatient treatment was provided by 81 to 82 percent of facilities during this period [Table 2.3].
- Residential (non-hospital) treatment was provided by 27 percent of facilities in 2007, decreasing to 23 percent of facilities in 2017.
- Hospital inpatient treatment was provided by 7 percent of facilities in 2007, decreasing to 5 percent of facilities in 2017.
- Outpatient treatment was provided by 90 to 93 percent of facilities with OTPs from 2007 to 2017.
- Residential (non-hospital) treatment was provided by 8 to 10 percent of facilities with OTPs from 2007 to 2017.
- Hospital inpatient treatment was provided by 7 to 12 percent of facilities with OTPs from 2007 to 2017.

Facilities That Use Medication-Assisted Opioid Therapy

Table 2.4. Medication-assisted opioid therapy (MAT) includes the use of methadone or buprenorphine for the treatment of opioid use disorder (OUD) and the use of naltrexone for relapse prevention in OUD. Methadone for OUD is available only at the OTPs that are certified by SAMHSA's Center for Substance Abuse Treatment. Buprenorphine may be prescribed by physicians or other authorized medical practitioners (physicians, physician assistants, and nurse practitioners) who have received Drug Addiction Treatment Act of 2000 (DATA 2000) specific training and received a waiver to prescribe the medication for treatment of OUD; some of these authorized medical practitioners are affiliated with facilities (either OTPs or other). All medical practitioners with prescribing privileges can prescribe injectable naltrexone.

- The proportion of OTPs providing methadone-only treatment decreased from 58 percent of all facilities with OTPs in 2007 to 32 percent of all facilities with OTPs in 2017.
- The proportion of OTPs providing only methadone and buprenorphine treatment decreased from 41 percent of all facilities with OTPs in 2007 to 39 percent in 2017. Between 2011 and 2017, the proportion of facilities with OTPs that offer methadone, buprenorphine, and injectable naltrexone increased from 10 percent to 23 percent; over the same period, the proportion of facilities offering only buprenorphine and injectable naltrexone increased from less than 1 percent to 2 percent.⁸

The question on extended-release injectable naltrexone (for example, Vivitrol®) was first added to the N-SSATS questionnaire in 2011.

- The proportion of facilities (either OTP or non-OTP) providing any buprenorphine services increased from 14 percent of all facilities in 2007 to 29 percent of all facilities in 2017.
- The percentage of all facilities providing any extended-release injectable naltrexone treatment increased from 8 percent in 2011 to 24 percent in 2017.

CHAPTER 3 TRENDS IN CLIENT CHARACTERISTICS

This chapter presents trends in client characteristics for 2007 to 2017.

Number of Clients

Table 3.1. The number of clients in treatment on the survey reference date increased by 19 percent, from 1,135,425 in 2007 to 1,356,015 in 2017.

Facility Operation




Figure 4. Clients in treatment (thousands), by facility operation: 2007–2017

Table 3.1 and Figure 4. Within the categories of facility operation, the proportions of clients in treatment demonstrated some gradual changes between 2007 and 2017.

- Private non-profit facilities treated 55 percent of clients in 2007, decreasing to 49 percent in 2017. (The number of clients in private non-profit facilities increased by 6 percent, from 619,954 in 2007 to 658,896 in 2017.)
- Private for-profit facilities treated 30 percent of clients in 2007, increasing to 41 percent in 2017. (The number of clients in private for-profit facilities increased by 63 percent, from 338,031 in 2007 to 550,992 in 2017.)
- Local government-operated facilities treated 8 percent of clients in 2007, decreasing to 5 percent in 2017. (The number of clients in local government-operated facilities decreased by 23 percent, from 85,953 in 2007 to 66,577 in 2017.)

- State government-operated facilities treated 4 percent of clients in 2007, decreasing to 2 percent in 2017. (The number of clients in state government-operated facilities decreased from 41,813 in 2007 to 28,529 in 2017.)
- Federal government-operated facilities treated 3 percent of clients in both 2007 and in 2017. (The number of clients in federal government-operated facilities decreased from 38,088 in 2007 to 34,435 in 2017.)
- Tribal government-operated facilities treated 1 percent of clients both in 2007 and in 2017.
 (The number of clients in tribal government-operated facilities increased from 11,586 in 2007 to 16,586 in 2017.)

Type of Care Received




Figure 5. Clients in treatment, by type of care received: 2007–2017

Table 3.2 and Figure 5. The proportions of clients in treatment for the major types of care—outpatient, residential (non-hospital), and hospital inpatient—were relatively stable between 2007 and 2017.

- Clients in outpatient treatment made up 89 to 91 percent of all clients each year. (The number of outpatient clients increased from 1,016,913 in 2007 to 1,238,654 in 2017.)
- Clients in residential (non-hospital) treatment made up 7 to 9 percent of all clients each year. (The number of residential [non-hospital] clients decreased from 103,709 in 2007 to 99,881 in 2017.)
- Clients in hospital inpatient treatment made up 1 to 2 percent of all clients each year. (The number of hospital inpatient clients increased from 14,803 in 2007 to 17,480 in 2017.)

Clients Receiving Medication-Assisted Opioid Therapy

Table 3.2 and Figure 5. Clients receiving methadone, buprenorphine, or naltrexone could be in any type of care—outpatient, residential (non-hospital), or hospital inpatient. Clients could receive methadone for OUD only in OTPs certified by SAMHSA to provide medication-assisted therapy with methadone and buprenorphine. However, clients could receive buprenorphine or naltrexone in any type of facility.

- The proportion of all clients receiving methadone increased from 23 percent in 2007 to 28 percent in 2017. (The number of clients receiving methadone increased from 262,684 in 2007 to 382,867 in 2017.)
- The proportion of clients receiving buprenorphine was less than 1 percent in 2007 and increased to 8 percent in 2017. (The number of clients receiving buprenorphine increased from 3,347 in 2007 to 112,223 in 2017.)¹⁰
- The number of clients receiving naltrexone was 23,065 in 2017 (2 percent of clients).¹¹

Substance Abuse Problem Treated

Table 3.3. The proportion of clients in treatment for the three broad categories of substance abuse problems—both alcohol and drug abuse, drug abuse alone, and alcohol abuse alone—demonstrated some changes between 2007 and 2017.

- The percentage of clients in treatment for both drug and alcohol abuse decreased from 45 percent in 2007 to 37 percent in 2017. (The number of clients in treatment for both drug and alcohol abuse was 509,919 in 2007 and 500,948 in 2017.)
- The percentage of clients in treatment for drug abuse alone increased from 36 percent in 2007 to 47 percent in 2017. (The number of clients in treatment for drug abuse alone increased from 412,400 in 2007 to 642,713 in 2017.)
- The percentage of all clients in treatment for alcohol abuse alone decreased from 19 percent in 2007 to 16 percent in 2017. (The number of clients in treatment for alcohol abuse alone increased from 211,094 in 2007 to 211,460 in 2017.)
- The percentage of clients in treatment for diagnosed co-occurring mental and substance abuse disorders increased from 37 percent in 2007 to 50 percent in 2017. (The number of clients in treatment for diagnosed co-occurring mental and substance abuse disorders increased from 416,260 in 2007 to 683,810 in 2017.)

Individual physicians, physician assistants, and nurse practitioners can receive special authorization from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services that allows them to prescribe buprenorphine for the treatment of opioid use disorder. These practitioners may prescribe buprenorphine to patients in an office setting or to patients at substance abuse treatment facilities. Only clients who received buprenorphine through a facility affiliated with an authorized practitioner are included in this report; it does not include clients who received buprenorphine through an independent DATA 2000-waivered practitioner.

In the 2017 survey, facilities reported client counts of those receiving naltrexone for opioid use disorder. In the 2011, 2013, and 2015 surveys, the reported counts of clients receiving naltrexone were limited to those receiving extended-release injectable naltrexone (Vivitrol®). This report does not include those who received naltrexone through other sources.

Clients Under Age 18 in Treatment

Table 3.4. The proportion of all clients who were under age 18 declined from 8 percent in 2007 to 5 percent in 2017.

- Of all clients under age 18, between 87 and 89 percent were in outpatient treatment from 2007 to 2017. (The number of outpatient clients under age 18 decreased from 74,500 in 2007 to 55,613 in 2017.)
- Of all clients under age 18, between 10 and 12 percent were in residential (non-hospital) treatment from 2007 to 2017. (The number of residential [non-hospital] clients under age 18 decreased from 10,134 in 2007 to 6,539 in 2017.)
- Of all clients under age 18, between 1 and 2 percent were in hospital inpatient treatment from 2007 to 2017. (The number of hospital inpatient clients under age 18 decreased from 884 in 2007 to 710 in 2017.)
- The proportion of clients under age 18 in treatment facilities with special programs or groups for adolescents decreased from 82 percent in 2007 to 74 percent in 2017. (The number of clients under age 18 in treatment facilities with special programs or groups for adolescents decreased from 70,275 in 2007 to 46,253 in 2017.)

CHAPTER 4 FACILITY CHARACTERISTICS AND SERVICES

This chapter outlines key characteristics of facilities and programs in 2017.

Facility Operation and Type of Care

Table 2.2. Facilities were asked to designate the type of entity responsible for the operation of the facility.

The proportions of all facilities by facility operation were:

Facility percentages sum to more than 100 percent, because a facility could provide more than one type of care.

Approximately three quarters (76 percent) of private non-profit facilities provided outpatient care and about one third (31 percent) provided residential (non-hospital) care. In contrast, 90 percent of private for-profit facilities provided outpatient care and 13 percent provided residential (non-hospital) care.

Diagnosed Co-Occurring Mental and Substance Abuse Disorders

Table 4.2. Facilities were asked to estimate the proportions of clients in treatment for both alcohol and drug abuse, for alcohol abuse only, and for drug abuse only. They were also asked to estimate the proportion of clients with diagnosed co-occurring mental and substance abuse disorders.

- On March 31, 2017, almost all facilities (92 percent) had clients in treatment for both alcohol and drug abuse, 84 percent had clients in treatment for drug abuse only, and 78 percent had clients in treatment for alcohol abuse only.
- On March 31, 2017, most facilities (92 percent) also had clients in treatment with diagnosed co-occurring mental and substance abuse disorders.

Facility Size

Facilities with OTPs

Table 4.3. Facility size is defined by the number of clients in substance abuse treatment on the survey reference date. There was a median of 285 clients in substance abuse treatment at facilities with OTPs on March 31, 2017.

The median number of clients by facility operation ranged from 174 clients in facilities with OTPs operated by tribal governments to 302 clients in private non-profit facilities with OTPs.

By type of care, the median number of clients in treatment at facilities with OTPs on March 31, 2017, was:¹⁴

Facilities without OTPs

Table 4.4. Facility size is defined by the number of clients in substance abuse treatment on the survey reference date. The median number of clients in substance abuse treatment at a facility without an OTP (a non-OTP facility) on March 31, 2017, was 36 clients.

The median number of clients in facilities without an OTP ranged, by facility operation, from 29 clients in tribal government-operated facilities to 55 clients in facilities operated by the federal government.

Table 4.5a. Outpatient facilities operated by federal and state governments reported client counts within the largest size class in greater proportion than outpatient facilities operated by other entities—30 percent had 120 or more clients in treatment on March 31, 2017, compared with 27 percent of all outpatient facilities.

Table 4.5b. Residential (non-hospital) facilities operated by tribal governments reported client counts within the smallest size class in greater proportion than residential (non-hospital) facilities operated by other entities—66 percent had fewer than 15 clients in treatment on March 31, 2017, compared with 35 percent of all residential (non-hospital) facilities.

Table 4.5c. Inpatient facilities operated by the federal government reported client counts within the smallest size class in greater proportion than among inpatient facilities operated by other entities—80 percent had fewer than 15 clients in treatment on March 31, 2017, compared with 53 percent of all inpatient facilities.

Facility Capacity and Utilization Rates

Facilities were asked to report the number of residential (non-hospital) and hospital inpatient beds designated for substance abuse treatment. Utilization rates were calculated by dividing the number of residential (non-hospital) or hospital inpatient clients by the number of residential (non-hospital) or hospital inpatient designated beds. Because substance abuse treatment clients may also occupy non-designated beds, utilization rates could be more than 100 percent.

Table 4.6. There were 2,752 facilities that reported having 91,601 residential (non-hospital) beds designated for substance abuse treatment on March 31, 2017. The utilization rate was 94 percent, and ranged from 92 percent in facilities operated by private for-profit organizations and local governments to 133 percent in facilities operated by tribal governments.¹⁵

Table 4.7. There were 473 facilities that reported having 12,707 hospital inpatient beds designated for substance abuse treatment on March 31, 2017. The utilization rate was 98 percent, and ranged from 78 percent in facilities operated by local governments to 110 percent in facilities operated by private for-profits.¹⁶




Figure 6. Residential (non-hospital) and hospital inpatient utilization rates:

Tables 4.6–4.7 and Figure 6 show the distribution of facility-level utilization rates for residential (non-hospital) beds and for hospital inpatient beds. Facilities with hospital inpatient beds (98 percent)

had generally higher utilization rates than facilities with residential (non-hospital) beds (94 percent). Of facilities with residential (non-hospital) beds, 46 percent had utilization rates of between 91 and 100 percent; 10 percent had utilization rates above 100 percent. Of facilities with hospital inpatient beds, 28 percent had utilization rates between 91 and 100 percent, while 18 percent had utilization rates above 100 percent.

Services Provided

Tables 4.8 and 4.9b. Facilities were asked about the types of services they provided. Services were grouped into the six broad categories shown below.

Assessment and pre-treatment services were offered by 99 percent of all facilities.

- Screening for substance abuse was provided by 96 percent of all facilities.
- Comprehensive substance abuse assessment or diagnosis was provided by 93 percent of all facilities.
- Screening for mental disorders was provided by 74 percent of all facilities.
- Outreach to persons in the community who may need treatment was provided by 61 percent of all facilities. By contrast, 87 percent of tribal facilities offered outreach services.
- Screening for tobacco use was provided by 66 percent of all facilities.
- Comprehensive mental health assessment or diagnosis was provided by 52 percent of all facilities.
- Interim services for clients when immediate admission was not possible were provided by 47 percent of all facilities. By contrast, 75 percent of federal government-operated facilities offered interim services.

Testing services were provided by 90 percent of all facilities.

- Drug or alcohol urine screening was provided by 86 percent of all facilities.
- Breathalyzer or other blood alcohol testing was provided by 64 percent of all facilities. By contrast, 86 percent of federal government-operated facilities provided breathalyzer or other blood alcohol testing.
- Screening tests for TB, HIV, hepatitis B and C, and STDs were provided by between 22 and 38 percent of all facilities.

At least one pharmacotherapy was provided by 58 percent of all facilities; rates were higher in federal government-operated facilities (84 percent).

- Medications for psychiatric disorders were the most frequently available pharmacotherapies, and were provided in 44 percent of all facilities.
- Buprenorphine was provided by 29 percent of all facilities.
- Non-nicotine medications for smoking cessation were provided by 21 percent of all facilities.
- Injectable naltrexone was provided by 24 percent of all facilities.

Transitional services were provided by 99 percent of all facilities.

- Discharge planning was provided by 97 percent of all facilities.
- Aftercare/continuing care was provided by 87 percent of all facilities.

Ancillary services were provided by more than 99 percent of all facilities.

- Substance abuse education was provided by 97 percent of all facilities.
- Case management services were provided by 83 percent of all facilities.
- Mental health services were provided by 68 percent of all facilities.

"Other" services were provided by 37 percent of all facilities.¹⁷

- Treatment for other non-substance addiction disorders was provided by 29 percent of all facilities.
- Treatment for gambling disorders was provided by 24 percent of all facilities.
- Treatment for Internet use disorder was provided by 13 percent of all facilities.

Clinical/Therapeutic Approaches

Table 4.10. Facilities were asked to indicate if they used any of 15 specific clinical/therapeutic approaches.

Two approaches were each used "always or often" by nearly all facilities:

- Substance abuse counseling was used "always or often" by 94 percent of facilities.
- Relapse prevention was used "always or often" by 87 percent of facilities.

By treatment approach, the proportion of facilities that used the approaches at least sometimes ("always or often" or "sometimes") were:

- Some approaches were "rarely" or "never" used by more than half of all facilities:
- Rational emotive behavioral therapy was "rarely" or "never" used by 51 percent of facilities, and it was unfamiliar to an additional 4 percent of facilities.
- The matrix model was "rarely" or "never" used by 47 percent of facilities, and it was unfamiliar to an additional 9 percent of facilities.
- Community reinforcement plus vouchers were "rarely" or "never" used by 80 percent of facilities, and it was unfamiliar to an additional 8 percent of facilities.
- Computerized substance abuse treatment was "rarely" or "never" used by 82 percent of facilities, and it was unfamiliar to an additional 3 percent of facilities.

Programs or Groups for Specific Client Types

Table 4.11b. Facilities were asked about the provision of treatment programs or groups specifically tailored for the client types listed below. Overall, 83 percent of facilities offered at least one specifically tailored program or group. The proportions of facilities providing specifically tailored programs or groups were:

Treatment Services in Sign Language for the Deaf and Hard-of-Hearing and in Languages Other Than English

Table 4.12b. Facilities were asked about the provision of substance abuse treatment services in sign language for the deaf and hard-of-hearing. They were also asked if treatment was provided in languages other than English, if this treatment was provided by a staff counselor or by an on-call interpreter, and in what languages staff counselors provided treatment.

- Substance abuse treatment services in sign language for the deaf and hard-of-hearing were offered in 33 percent of all facilities. Facilities operated by local and state governments were most likely to offer these services (63 and 52 percent, respectively).
- Substance abuse treatment services in languages other than English were provided in 49 percent of all facilities, ranging from 29 percent of tribal and federal government-operated facilities to 73 percent of local government-operated facilities.
- Of facilities providing services in languages other than English, 27 percent used only staff counselors who spoke other languages; another 26 percent of facilities used both staff counselors and on-call interpreters.
- In facilities where staff counselors provided services in languages other than English, Spanish was the most frequently spoken language (92 percent of those facilities and 25 percent of all facilities). Services in American Indian/Alaskan Native languages were provided by 2 percent of all facilities where staff counselors provided services in languages other than English. All Indian Health Service-operated facilities and most tribal government-operated facilities where staff counselors provided services in languages other than English offered services in American Indian/Alaskan Native languages (100 and 87 percent, respectively).

Detoxification Services

Table 4.13. Facilities that provided detoxification services were asked to indicate whether or not they detoxified clients from specified substances, and whether or not medication was routinely used during detoxification. The number of facilities providing any type of substance detoxification services was 2,661 out of a total of 13,585 facilities.

Of the 2,661 facilities that offer detoxification, the proportions offering detoxification from the following specific substances were:

•	Opioids	91 percent
•	Alcohol	68 percent

Medications were routinely used during detoxification in 87 percent of the facilities providing detoxification services.

Client Outreach

Table 4.14. Facilities were asked if they had a website providing information about their substance abuse treatment programs.

Websites providing information about a facility's substance abuse treatment programs were maintained by 84 percent of all facilities. Website availability ranged from 55 percent among facilities operated by the federal government to 90 percent among facilities operated by private non-profit organizations.

Outreach to persons in the community who may need treatment was provided by 61 percent of all facilities, and by 87 percent of tribal government-operated facilities.

Facility Licensing, Certification, or Accreditation

Facilities were asked to report licensure, certification, or accreditation by specified agencies or organizations. These included the state substance abuse agency; state mental health department; state department of health; hospital licensing authority; the Joint Commission; CARF; NCQA; COA; HFAP; and other federal, state, or local agencies or organizations.¹⁹

Table 4.15b. Overall, 94 percent of all facilities reported that they were licensed, certified, or accredited by one or more agencies or organizations.

State substance abuse agencies licensed, certified, or accredited 82 percent of facilities offering residential (non-hospital) treatment, 80 percent of facilities offering outpatient treatment, and 56 percent of facilities offering hospital inpatient treatment.

CARF: Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities; NCQA: National Committee for Quality Assurance; COA: Council on Accreditation; and HFAP: Healthcare Facilities Accreditation Program

State mental health departments licensed, certified, or accredited 42 percent of facilities offering outpatient treatment, 41 percent of hospital inpatient facilities, and 32 percent of residential (non-hospital) facilities.

Payment Options

Table 4.17b. Facilities were asked to indicate whether or not they accepted specified types of payment or insurance for substance abuse treatment. They were also asked about the use of a sliding fee scale and if they offered treatment at no charge to clients who could not pay.

The proportions of all facilities reporting acceptance of specific payment options were:

Facilities operated by tribal and federal governments accepted cash or self-payment (41 and 37 percent, respectively) in lower proportions than facilities operated by any other type of entity. Private for-profit and federal government-operated facilities accepted Medicare, Medicaid, or state-financed health insurance in lower proportions than facilities operated by any other entity.

Acceptance of Access to Recovery vouchers was reported in 35 states or jurisdictions. The proportion of facilities accepting Access to Recovery vouchers ranged from 1 percent in North Carolina to 69 percent in Idaho [Table 6.25b].

ITU (IHS/Tribal/ Urban) funds (85 percent) were accepted by facilities operated by the Indian Health Service in greater proportion than facilities operated by any other entity.²¹

Use of a sliding fee scale was reported by 59 percent of all facilities, ranging from 17 percent of facilities operated by the federal government to 81 percent of facilities operated by local governments.

Treatment at no charge for persons who cannot afford to pay was offered by 44 percent of all facilities, ranging from 19 percent of private for-profit facilities to 78 percent of facilities operated by tribal governments.

Access to Recovery (ATR) funds were available in CT, ID, IL, IA, MA, MI, MO, NC, OH, OR, and WA for 2017. However, the ATR vouchers were accepted for substance use treatment payment in 24 additional states. See Table 6.25a for the number of facilities accepting ATR vouchers by state.

Through a contract, tribes can receive the money that the Indian Health Service (IHS) would have used to provide direct health services for tribal members. Tribes can use these funds to provide directly, or through another entity, a broad range of health services. This option was part of P.L. 93-638 and is commonly known as "638 contracting."

Facility Funding

Table 4.18. Facilities were asked if they received federal, state, or local government funds or grants to support their substance abuse treatment programs.

Overall, 53 percent of facilities reported receiving government funds to support substance abuse treatment programs. The proportions were highest in facilities operated by local or tribal governments (87 and 84 percent, respectively). Of facilities operated by private non-profit organizations, 72 percent reported receiving public funds, whereas 17 percent of facilities operated by private for-profit organizations reported receiving public funds.

Facilities Using Medication-Assisted Opioid Therapy

OTPs are certified by SAMHSA to provide medication-assisted therapy in the treatment of opioid use disorder (OUD). Currently, methadone and buprenorphine are the only opioid medications approved for the treatment of OUD. Injectable naltrexone is approved for relapse prevention in OUD. Only OTPs may use methadone for the treatment of OUD. Facilities with DATA 2000-waivered practitioners may prescribe buprenorphine. Any authorized personnel (physicians, physician assistants, etc.) may prescribe or administer injectable naltrexone.

Table 4.19a. Of all 13,585 facilities, 10 percent (1,317 facilities) had OTPs, 29 percent (3,900 facilities) offered buprenorphine for medication-assisted opioid therapy, and 24 percent (3,197 facilities) offered injectable naltrexone for medication-assisted opioid therapy.

- Methadone was provided at 97 percent of OTP facilities. Of the 1,317 facilities with OTPs, 32 percent (418 facilities) provided methadone only, and 65 percent (853 facilities) provided methadone as well as buprenorphine and/or injectable naltrexone.
- Of the 3,900 facilities offering buprenorphine, 22 percent (863 facilities) were in facilities with OTPs. The majority (3,037 facilities, or 78 percent) of facilities that offered buprenorphine as a medication-assisted opioid therapy were facilities other than OTPs.
- Among the 3,197 facilities offering injectable naltrexone, 12 percent (376 facilities) were in facilities with OTPs, and 88 percent (2,821 facilities) were in facilities that did not have OTPs.

Table 4.19b. The majority of facilities with OTPs that offered methadone only were private for-profit facilities (63 percent). In contrast, private non-profit facilities comprised the largest share of facilities with OTPs that offered methadone and injectable naltrexone (86 percent).

- Of all facilities that offered buprenorphine, 89 percent were either private non-profit or private for-profit facilities (47 and 42 percent, respectively). Federal government and local government-operated facilities each accounted for 4 percent of facilities that offered buprenorphine.
- Of all facilities that offered injectable naltrexone, 86 percent were either private non-profit or private for-profit facilities (51 percent and 36 percent, respectively), 5 percent were operated by the federal government, and 5 percent were operated by local government.

Tables 4.1b and 4.19b. Private for-profit organizations operated 60 percent of facilities with OTPs, but operated only 36 percent of all substance abuse treatment facilities.

Table 4.20b. Most facilities with OTPs offered outpatient treatment (92 percent). Of facilities with OTPs, 90 percent offered outpatient methadone/buprenorphine maintenance or injectable naltrexone treatment, and 47 percent offered outpatient detoxification.

Tables 4.16b and 4.21b. A greater proportion of facilities with OTPs, as compared with all facilities combined, were licensed, certified, or accredited by a state department of health (64 vs. 47 percent), the Joint Commission (26 vs. 20 percent), CARF (68 vs. 29 percent), or state substance abuse agencies (91 vs. 80 percent).

Counseling Services Offered by Facilities

Table 4.22. Individual counseling (99 percent of facilities) was the most frequent form of counseling reported. Next were group counseling (95 percent), family counseling (85 percent), and marital/couples counseling (66 percent).

Facility Smoking Policy

Table 4.23. Of the 13,517 facilities that responded to the question about smoking policies, 57 percent permitted smoking in designated outdoor areas, whereas 35 percent of facilities did not permit smoking anywhere outside or within any building.

Chapter 5 Client Characteristics

This chapter describes key characteristics of the 1,356,015 clients in substance abuse treatment on March 31, 2017. Clients in treatment were defined as: 1) hospital inpatient and residential (non-hospital) clients receiving substance abuse treatment services on March 31, 2017, and 2) outpatient clients who were seen at the facility for substance abuse treatment or detoxification service at least once during the month of March 2017, and who were still enrolled in treatment on March 31, 2017.

Facility Operation and Type of Care

Table 5.1c. Facilities were asked to designate the type of entity responsible for the operation of the facility.

The proportions of clients in treatment on March 31, 2017, by facility operation were:

Table 5.1c. Overall, a greater proportion of outpatient clients were in facilities operated by private non-profit organizations relative to private for-profit organizations (47 percent and 42 percent, respectively). However, the majority of clients in outpatient methadone/buprenorphine maintenance or naltrexone treatment (61 percent) were in facilities operated by private for-profit organizations.

Diagnosed Co-Occurring Mental and Substance Abuse Disorders

Table 5.2. Facilities were asked to estimate the proportions of clients in treatment on March 31, 2017, by substance abuse problem treated (alcohol abuse only, drug abuse only, or both alcohol and drug abuse).

On March 31, 2017, 37 percent of clients were in treatment for both alcohol and drug abuse, 47 percent were in treatment for drug abuse only, and 16 percent were in treatment for alcohol abuse only.

By facility operation, the highest proportion of clients in treatment for abuse of both alcohol and drugs was in tribal government-operated facilities (56 percent). For abuse of drugs only, the highest proportion of clients was in private for-profit facilities (59 percent); for abuse of alcohol only, the highest proportion was in federal government-operated facilities (34 percent).

Clients Under Age 18 in Treatment

Table 5.3. Facilities were asked how many clients in treatment on March 31, 2017, were under age 18.

There were 62,862 clients under age 18 in substance abuse treatment on March 31, 2017, accounting for 5 percent of the total 1,356,015 clients in treatment on that date.

Of the 62,862 clients under age 18, the majority (55,613 clients, or 88 percent) were in outpatient treatment, while 6,539 clients (10 percent) were in residential (non-hospital) treatment, and 710 clients (1 percent) were in hospital inpatient treatment.

Medication-Assisted Opioid Therapy

Tables 5.4a-b. Facilities were asked how many clients in treatment on March 31, 2017, received medication-assisted opioid therapy (MAT) drugs for detoxification or maintenance purposes. MAT includes the use of methadone and buprenorphine for the treatment of opioid use disorder (OUD), and the use of naltrexone for relapse prevention in OUD. Methadone is available only at OTP facilities that are certified by SAMHSA's Center for Substance Abuse Treatment. Buprenorphine may be prescribed by practitioners who have received DATA 2000-specific training and received a waiver to prescribe the medication for treatment of OUD; some of these practitioners are affiliated

with facilities (either OTPs or other). All physicians or approved medical personnel with prescribing privileges can prescribe naltrexone.²³

- Of the total 1,356,015 clients in treatment, 413,930 (31 percent) received MAT in OTP facilities.
- There were 382,867 clients receiving methadone in OTP facilities. Of the clients receiving methadone, 234,844 clients (61 percent) were provided treatment at private for-profit OTPs and 126,797 clients (33 percent) were provided treatment at private non-profit OTPs.
- There were 27,665 clients receiving buprenorphine in OTP facilities and 84,558 clients receiving buprenorphine in non-OTP facilities.
 - Of the clients receiving buprenorphine in OTPs, 16,597 clients (60 percent) were provided treatment at private for-profit OTPs and 8,161 clients (29 percent) were provided treatment at private non-profit OTPs.
 - Of the clients receiving buprenorphine in non-OTP facilities, 49,668 clients (59 percent) were provided treatment at private for-profit non-OTPs and 26,876 clients (32 percent) were provided treatment at private non-profit non-OTPs.
- There were 3,398 clients receiving naltrexone in OTP facilities for OUD and 19,667 clients receiving naltrexone in non-OTP facilities.
 - Of the clients receiving naltrexone in OTPs, 2,105 clients (62 percent) were provided treatment at private non-profit OTPs and 883 clients (26 percent) were provided treatment at private for-profit OTPs.
 - Of the clients receiving naltrexone in non-OTP facilities, 9,651 clients (49 percent) were provided treatment at private non-profit non-OTPs and 7,413 clients (38 percent) were provided treatment at private for-profit non-OTPs.

Only clients who received buprenorphine through a facility affiliated with an authorized practitioner are included in this report; it does not include clients who received buprenorphine through an independent DATA 2000-waivered practitioner. This report also does not include clients who received naltrexone through other sources.

CHAPTER 6 STATE DATA

This chapter breaks down data presented in earlier chapters by state or jurisdiction. The Chapter 6 tables correspond thematically to many of the tables presented in Chapters 4 and 5. Note that facilities operated by federal agencies are included in the states in which the facilities are located, although these facilities may have clients from other states.

Table 6.1 details the 2017 N-SSATS response rate.

Tables 6.2a-b present data on facilities and clients in treatment by state or jurisdiction for 2007 to 2017.

Tables 6.3a through 6.30 present facility data for 2017.

Tables 6.31a through 6.37 present client data for 2017.

Tables 6.38 and 6.39 present the number of clients aged 18 or older in treatment—according to substance abuse problem and receiving medication-assisted opioid therapy, respectively—per 100,000 population, by state or jurisdiction.

Survey Response

Table 6.1. The overall response rate for the survey was 89 percent. Response rates in 36 states or jurisdictions equaled or surpassed the overall rate.

Trends

Tables 6.2a-b. California and New York had the largest numbers of both facilities and clients in treatment for every odd year from 2007 through 2017.²⁴ On March 31, 2017, California had 10 percent of all facilities and 9 percent of all clients, and New York had 6 percent of all facilities and 8 percent of all clients.

In terms of total numbers of facilities in every odd year from 2007 through 2017, Illinois and Florida ranked among third and fourth. Michigan, Pennsylvania, Texas, and Washington have also consistently ranked within the top ten.

In terms of total numbers of clients in every odd year from 2009 through 2017, Florida and Pennsylvania have ranked as third or fourth. Illinois, Massachusetts, Maryland, and Michigan have also consistently ranked within the top ten.

Since 2013, the full N-SSATS questionnaire has alternated with an abbreviated version, fielded in even-numbered years, that does not collect client counts. Therefore, this report draws only on client counts collected in odd-numbered years between 2007 and 2017.

Clients in Treatment per 100,000 Population Aged 18 and Older




Figure 7. Clients in treatment per 100,000 population aged 18 and over: March 31, 2017




Figure 8. Clients in treatment per 100,000 population aged 18 and over: March 30, 2007

Table 6.38 and Figures 7–8. For the United States, there were 507 clients in treatment per 100,000 population aged 18 and over on March 31, 2017. The rate was highest for clients in drug abuse only (244 per 100,000 population), followed by both alcohol and drug abuse (184 per 100,000 population) and alcohol abuse only (79 per 100,000 population). Figure 7 maps the rates of clients in treatment by state by quartile in 2017. Figure 8 maps the rates of clients in treatment by state by quartile in 2007. It has been included in this section for comparison.

APPENDIX A N-SSATS BACKGROUND

Survey History

N-SSATS has evolved from national survey efforts begun in the 1970s by the National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA) to measure the scope and use of drug abuse treatment services in the United States. The sixth of these surveys, conducted in 1976, introduced the data elements and format that have formed the core of subsequent surveys. These include organizational focus, service orientation, services available, clients in treatment by type of care, and hospital inpatient/residential capacity. The 1976 survey, called the National Drug Abuse Treatment Utilization Survey, was repeated in 1977 and 1978.

In 1979, the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism (NIAAA) became a co-sponsor of the survey, alcoholism treatment facilities were added, and the study was re-named the National Drug and Alcoholism Treatment Utilization Survey. This survey was repeated in 1980 and 1982. In 1984, a one-page version called the National Alcoholism and Drug Abuse Program Inventory was used. In 1987, the full version of the survey was re-instated and re-named the National Drug and Alcoholism Treatment Unit Survey (NDATUS). NDATUS was conducted annually from 1989 to 1993.

In 1992, with the creation of SAMHSA, responsibility for conducting the survey shifted to SAMHSA's Office of Applied Studies (now the Center for Behavioral Health Statistics and Quality). The survey was re-designed, and it was conducted annually as the Uniform Facility Data Set (UFDS) survey from 1995 to 1998. During these years, the survey was conducted by mail with telephone follow-up of non-respondents. The 1999 survey year was a transition year during which the survey was re-designed and an abbreviated telephone survey of treatment facilities was conducted. In 2000, a re-designed full mail survey was re-instated with telephone follow-up; it was re-named the National Survey of Substance Abuse Treatment Services (N-SSATS). The reference date for the annual survey had always been the end of September or beginning of October. After the 2000 survey, the reference date was changed to the end of March, and no survey was conducted during 2001.

In 2000, the use of an Internet-based questionnaire was tested; beginning in 2002, all facilities were offered the opportunity to respond via the Internet.

Since 2013, the full N-SSATS questionnaire (with client counts) has alternated with an abbreviated version of the questionnaire. The full questionnaire, fielded in odd-numbered years, collects data on programs and clients; in alternate (even-numbered) years, an abbreviated N-SSATS questionnaire collects the program information needed to update the substance abuse section of the Behavioral Health Treatment Services Locator and collects information on other facility-related topics.

N-SSATS in the Context of the Behavioral Health Services Information System (BHSIS)

N-SSATS is one of the components of SAMHSA's Behavioral Health Services Information System (BHSIS). The core of BHSIS is the Inventory of Behavioral Health Services (I-BHS), a continuously updated, comprehensive listing of all known substance abuse treatment facilities and mental health treatment facilities. The other substance abuse component of BHSIS is the Treatment Episode Data Set (TEDS), a client-level database of admissions to and discharges from substance abuse treatment. Together, the components provide national- and state-level information on the numbers and characteristics of individuals admitted to alcohol and drug treatment programs and describe the facilities that deliver care to those individuals.

I-BHS is the list frame for N-SSATS. Facilities in I-BHS fall into two general categories and are distinguished by the relationship of the facility to its state substance abuse agency. These categories are described below.

Treatment facilities approved by state substance abuse agencies

The largest group of facilities (14,084 in 2017) includes facilities that are licensed, certified, or otherwise approved by the state substance abuse agency to provide substance abuse treatment. State BHSIS representatives maintain this segment of I-BHS by reporting new facilities, closures, and address changes to SAMHSA. Some facilities are not licensed, certified, or otherwise approved by the state agency. Some private for-profit facilities fall into this category. The approved facility group also includes programs operated by federal agencies—the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA), the Department of Defense, the Indian Health Service—and opioid treatment programs certified by SAMHSA. I-BHS records for federally operated facilities are updated annually through lists provided by these agencies.

Treatment facilities not approved by state substance abuse agencies

This group of facilities (2,945 in 2017) represents the SAMHSA effort since the mid-1990s to make I-BHS as comprehensive as possible by including treatment facilities that state substance abuse agencies, for a variety of reasons, do not fund, license, or certify. Many of these facilities are private for-profit, small group practices, or hospital-based programs. Most of them are identified through periodic screening of alternative source databases. (See *Special efforts to improve survey coverage*.) State substance abuse agencies are given the opportunity to review these facilities and to add them to the state agency-approved list, if appropriate.

Survey Coverage

The use of I-BHS as the list frame for N-SSATS imposes certain constraints related to the unit of response and the scope of facilities included. In addition, the expansion of I-BHS in recent years to provide a more complete enumeration of substance abuse treatment facilities means that year-to-year comparisons of the numbers of facilities reporting to N-SSATS must be interpreted with caution.

Unit of response

N-SSATS is designed to collect data from each physical location where treatment services are provided. Accordingly, SAMHSA requests that state substance abuse agencies use the point of

delivery of service (i.e., physical location) as the defining factor for a facility. Because of the different state administrative systems, however, there are some inconsistencies in implementation. For example, in some states, multiple treatment programs (e.g., detoxification, residential, and outpatient) at the same address and under the same management have separate state licenses. These are treated as separate by the state substance abuse agency, and are given separate I-BHS ID numbers. In other states, multiple sites are included as a single entity under a parent or administrative unit. In many of these cases, individual sites can report services data in N-SSATS, but client data are available only at a higher administrative level. Beginning in 1995, efforts have been made to identify facility networks and to eliminate duplicate reporting by networks. For most facilities, reporting levels remain consistent from year to year. However, beginning in 1998, an emphasis was placed on collecting minimum information from all physical locations, and this resulted in an increase in the number of facilities.

Special efforts to improve survey coverage

The great majority of treatment facilities in I-BHS are administratively monitored by state substance abuse agencies. Therefore, the scope of facilities included in I-BHS is affected by differences in state systems of licensure, certification, accreditation, and the disbursement of public funds. For example, some state substance abuse agencies regulate private facilities and individual practitioners while others do not. In some states, hospital-based substance abuse treatment facilities are not licensed through the state substance abuse agency.

To address these differences, SAMHSA conducted a large-scale effort during 1995 and 1996 to identify substance abuse treatment facilities that, for a variety of reasons, were not on the inventory. About 15 source lists were examined, and facilities not on the inventory were contacted to ascertain whether or not they provided substance abuse treatment. As expected, this yielded a number of hospital-based and small private facilities that were not on the inventory. (These facilities were surveyed in 1995 and 1996, but they were not included in the published results of the survey until 1997.) Analysis of the results of this effort led to similar but more targeted updates before subsequent surveys. Potential new facilities are identified using data from the American Business Index, the annual American Hospital Association survey, and SAMHSA's National Mental Health Services Survey, the source lists that yielded the most new facilities in 1995 and 1996. Survey participants, who are asked to report all of the treatment facilities in their administrative networks, also identify additional facilities during the survey itself. All newly identified facilities are initially included as not approved by the state substance abuse agency. State substance abuse agencies are given the opportunity to review these facilities and to add them to the state agency-approved list, if appropriate.

Expansion of survey coverage to include all sites within networks at which treatment was provided yielded a net increase of about 2,600 facilities between 1997 and 1998. These additions were not necessarily new facilities, but were facilities not previously included in the survey as separate sites. Between 2007 and 2017, the number of facilities eligible for inclusion in this report varied between 13,339 and 14,399. The total number is deceptive, however. There was significant turnover as facilities closed and others opened (see Table 2.1).

Data collection

Until 1996, state substance abuse agencies distributed and collected the facility survey forms. Beginning in 1996, data collection was centralized; since that time, SAMHSA has mailed survey forms directly to and collected forms directly from the facilities and has conducted follow-up telephone interviews with the facility director or his/her designee. In 2000, SAMHSA introduced an online trial web version of the questionnaire for a few facilities in addition to the hard copy questionnaire. The web version of the questionnaire was fully implemented in 2002. The proportion of facilities using the web survey to respond to N-SSATS has increased steadily since its full inception in 2002.

Non-response

Beginning in 1992, SAMHSA expanded efforts to obtain information from non-responding facilities. A representative sample of non-respondents was contacted and administered an abbreviated version of the survey instrument via telephone. In 1993 and later years, this effort was extended to all non-responding facilities. In 1997, a series of measures was introduced to enhance the survey response rate. These included advance notification and improved methods for updating address and contact information. Between 2004 and 2016, use of these methods and intensive telephone follow-up resulted in an annual follow-up rate (i.e., facilities in the sample either completed the survey or were determined to be closed or otherwise ineligible) of 92 to 96 percent. In 2017, the final response rate, counting survey-eligible facilities, was 89 percent.

Exclusions

In 1997, facilities offering only DUI/DWI programs were excluded; these facilities were reinstated in 1998.

Facilities operated by the Bureau of Prisons (BOP) were excluded from the 1997 survey and subsequent surveys because SAMHSA conducted a separate survey of correctional facilities.²⁵ During that survey, it was discovered that jails, prisons, and other organizations treating incarcerated persons only were poorly enumerated on the inventory. Beginning in 1999, these facilities were identified during the survey and excluded from analyses and public use data files.

I-BHS and N-SSATS are designed to include specialty substance abuse treatment facilities rather than individuals. Solo practitioners are listed on I-BHS and surveyed in N-SSATS only if the state substance abuse agency explicitly requests that they be included.

Beginning in 2000, halfway houses that did not provide substance abuse treatment were included on the inventory and in N-SSATS so that they could be listed in the National Directory of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Treatment Facilities (formerly the National Directory of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Treatment Programs) and on the Behavioral Health Treatment Services Locator (https://findtreatment.samhsa.gov). These facilities are excluded from analyses and public use data files.

Changes in Survey Content

Table A.1 shows the major content areas for the survey from 1998 to 2017. Since 1992, SAMHSA has made adjustments each year to the survey design, both to minimize non-response and to include areas of emerging interest. For example, questions on the number of clients in treatment receiving buprenorphine were added in 2004. Questions about clinical/therapeutic methods, standard practices, and Access to Recovery grants were added in 2007. Questions about facility smoking policy were added in 2011; questions about outpatient facility operating capacity were modified in 2012; questions about injectable naltrexone (Vivitrol®) as a pharmacotherapy were added in 2011; questions about work activity and means to accomplish them, as well as the question asking for client counts of those prescribed extended-release injectable naltrexone (Vivitrol®), were added in 2013; and in 2017 the questions asking for client counts of those prescribed Vivitrol® were changed to request client counts of those receiving naltrexone for opioid use disorder.

There have also been changes within content areas. For example, in response to concerns about over-reporting of programs or groups for specific client types, the survey question was revised in 2003 to distinguish between those facilities that accepted specific client types and those facilities that offered specially designed programs or groups for that client type. As a result, the number and proportion of facilities offering programs or groups for each of the specified client types decreased. Surveys from 2003 and later are believed to more accurately represent the number and proportions of facilities providing programs or groups for the specified client types. In addition, over time more categories have been added to the specific client types (e.g., persons who have experienced trauma, active duty military, and members of military families in 2012 and young adults, persons who have experienced sexual abuse, and persons who have experienced intimate partner violence, domestic violence in 2013). Because of the increase in client types, the question was split in 2013. The portion asking if specific client types were served was limited to adolescents, adult women, and adult men. In addition, programs or groups were described as "specifically tailored." In 2014, the first part of the question was revised again to collect another level of detail (i.e., the age range of males and females served, if any). The client types of adolescents, adult women, and adult men were added back to the second part of the question.

Since 2013, the full N-SSATS questionnaire (with client counts) has alternated with an abbreviated version of the questionnaire. This abbreviated questionnaire, first introduced in 2014, collects the facility, program, and services information that are needed to update the Behavioral Health Treatment Services Locator. It omits Section B, which includes the client counts. Other changes to the 2014 questionnaire included reinstatement of the "primary focus" question, which had been dropped from the 2013 questionnaire; in addition, the question asking if a facility operates an opioid treatment program (OTP) was revised: The informational bullets describing OTPs were reworded, and the response categories were more explicit about whether or not the facility operates an OTP, as well as whether or not methadone and/or buprenorphine are used. In 2015, the OTP question was again revised to ask facilities how they treat opioid addiction; the response categories were even more specific about how they used, or did not use, methadone, buprenorphine, or extended-release injectable naltrexone (Vivitrol®) and whether or not the facility was a federally certified OTP. In 2017, reference to Vivitrol® was deleted, and the question referred simply to naltrexone.

APPENDIX C ITEM RESPONSE AND IMPUTATION FOR 2017 N-SSATS

This Appendix contains Table C1, a list of item response rates for questions from the N-SSATS 2017 questionnaire. Item non-response was minimized through careful editing and extensive follow-up.

The item response rate for the 2017 N-SSATS averaged 98 percent across 270 separate response categories.

Item non-response was 10 percent or more for only 11 of 270 separate response categories.

When available, client values and admissions values from up to five previous surveys were used to impute the missing counts. If historical data were not available, the average client value, stratified by state and facility operation, was used to impute the missing client counts. Missing client counts were imputed for each type of service (i.e., hospital inpatient detoxification, hospital inpatient treatment, residential [non-hospital] detoxification, etc.) and summed to the larger service type totals (total hospital inpatient clients, total residential [nonhospital] clients, and total outpatient clients), and finally to total clients.

Several facilities report client counts for themselves (parent) as well as for other facilities (children) within their family of substance abuse treatment facilities. Instead of reporting only the aggregate client count, we attempted to disaggregate and redistribute or unroll the parent facilities' total client count wherever possible to reflect the number of clients served by each facility within the family of facilities. Our procedure was to first calculate the mean client count per type of care received (hospital inpatient, outpatient, and residential) for the facilities in N-SSATS that reported only for themselves. We then used these means to determine how to distribute the clients reported by a parent facility to its children facilities based on the type of facilities and the types of clients indicated by the family of facilities. Therefore, numbers reported may be an actual number reported by the facility itself or they may be an unrolled estimate based on the unrolling procedures. All totals sum to the actual reported numbers.
